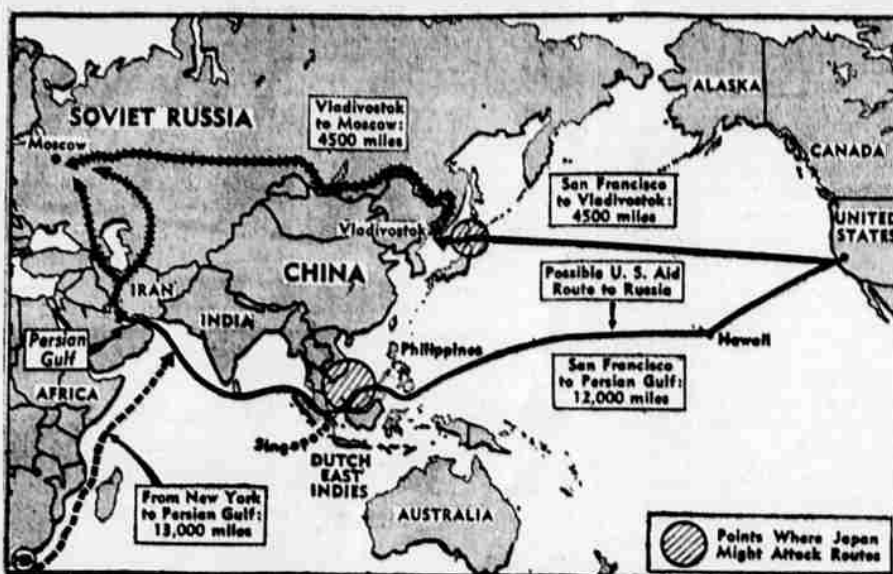

GRAIN BUYING EBBS AFTER EARLY GAINS

CHICAGO, Oct. 6 (AP)—After an early spurt that carried soy bean prices up about 3 cents, wheat 1 cent and other grains fractionally, buying subsided today. All gains were reduced and wheat at times fell slightly below Saturday's close while corn declined fractionally. Wheat closed unchanged to 1c higher compared with Saturday, December \$1.21 1/2, May \$1.25 1/2; corn 1-1/2c lower, December 80c, May 85c; oats unchanged to 1c off; soy beans 2-3/4c higher; rye 1c off. Late short covering lifted bean prices again just before the close, with final quotations at the day's best level.

Many interesting stories of their activities on the Warspite were told by the seamen. During their stay here they motored to Crater Lake, and last week drove to Reno for a brief visit. "England has plenty of man power," the seamen asserted in conversation with friends here. "What England needs now is equipment of all kinds." The young men reside in or near Selkirk, Scotland, where Mrs. Mentch's parents made their home. Mrs. Mentch's father was killed in the first World war. At this time Mrs. Mentch has seven cousins and uncles serving in the British navy and army.

DEFENSE INVENTORY OF TRUCKS STARTED

As part of the transportation planning for national defense, a national defense inventory of trucks and busses began in most states on September 25, and in the others a few days later. Federal Works Administrator John M. Carmody announced. "Trucks and busses have become a notably significant part of the nation's transportation system," Carmody explained in emphasizing the importance of the inventory in the planning for national defense. The size of truck and bus operations in the country is indicated, he said, by the fact that more than 6,000,000 questionnaire cards are required in the canvass which is being conducted by the state motor vehicle registration agencies. He declared that information given on each individual card will be held in the strictest confidence, and will be used only in planning for national defense. The specific purpose of the inventory, Carmody stated, is to set up detailed central and regional records of all trucks, freight trailers, and busses. These facts would be for possible use in emergencies in organizing highway transportation for more effective service in the assembly of defense-industry materials, delivery of military and civilian supplies, relief of dock and terminal congestion, and movement of passenger traffic. The inventory is being made at the request of the war department and the national defense advisory commission. It is to be conducted under the general direction of the highway traffic advisory committee to the war department through the public roads administration and the works progress administration, units of the federal works agency, in cooperation with the war department.

MERRILL CLUB RELINQUISHES CITY LIBRARY

MERRILL — The Merrill library, which for many years has been sponsored and maintained by the Merrill Library club, this week by vote of the members became a branch of the county library system. In the future no reading fees will be charged and the books now on the shelves owned by the library club and those that will be sent to Merrill from the county library, will be available to the public free of charge.

The decision was reached after members who have conferred for several months on the contemplated change decided that the library was not serving as many readers as it should. Books owned by the library club will remain the property of the club. The club will be responsible as in the past for salary of the librarian and other incidentals necessary to upkeep except mending of the books, which will be taken care of by experienced readers.

Mary McComb, county librarian, was present at the meeting to iron out the final details and by-laws of the club will be amended to legalize the vote. Eighteen of the members present favored the change, and there were two opposing votes. The library since about 1906 has been the incentive of a program of work for the members and it is listed as the only self-supporting library in the state. A reading fee of 35 cents a month was charged non-members.

The membership which more than a year ago purchased the old Christian Science church to be used as a club house will continue with a financial program to raise funds for remodeling the building and for other necessary club expenses.

A dance is planned for the evening of October 8, with Mrs. O. V. Reeves, Mrs. H. C. Bradbury and Mrs. E. A. McCollum as the central committee. Mrs. Claude Moreland was appointed as chairman on music and Mrs. A. J. King will serve on publicity. Mrs. Homer Heaton, Mrs. R. L. Dalton and Mrs. King will confer with legal counsel relative to the by-laws amendment. Mrs. Scott McKendree, chairman of the book committee, will be assisted by Mrs. Castleman, Mrs. Clifford Taylor, Mrs. Hugh O'Connor, Mrs. H. R. Anderson and Mrs. W. J. Grove in conferring with the county librarian on books needed in Merrill.
