SEATTLE, Oct. 6 (AP)—All the "fluke" ninth inning baseball breaks weren't confined to Ebbets field, Brooklyn, yesterday, the Seattle Rainiers lost a tough game to Sacramento in the president cup series the same way.

The two teams, with Seattle holding a 2-1 game edge, were southbound to Sacramento today to resume their four-of-seven games at Sacramento tomorrow night. Sacramento won in the 11th yesterday, 3 to 2.

In the ninth, Dick Barrett had two strikes on Bill Endicott, the tying run was on third base and two were out. Barrett uncorked a wild pitch. Clyde Klutts streaked for the plate and beat Catcher Bob Collins' desperate throw to Barrett, tying the score.

In the 11th, after Barrett had been lifted for a pinch hitter, Chet Wicczorek doubled off Ira Scribner, Barrett's successor. Wicczorek then came home on Klutts' single to win the game.

The Rainiers won a double-header Saturday for their two victories.

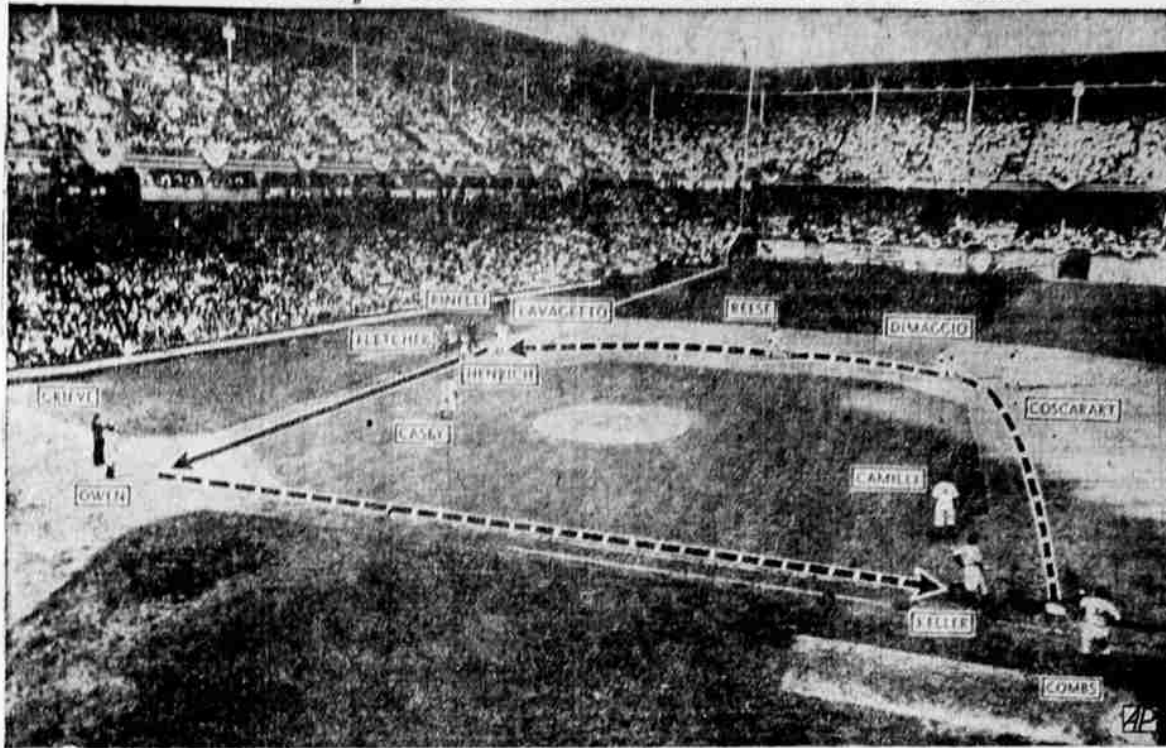
Dorris held the advantage on yardage gained and punting. Next week the Dorris lads will tangle with last year's County B champs, Henley, which doused them 32-0 last year.

This Play Gave the Yanks the Third Series Game



Two runs in the eighth inning gave the Yankees a 2-1 triumph over the Dodgers in the third world series game in Brooklyn. This diagram provides a box seat view of how the American leaguers did it. With one run already scored, Tommy Henrich was on third, Joe DiMaggio on first and one out when Charley Keller slammed a single to center to set the base runners in action. Henrich played it safe near third as Keller's hit sailed into left center, but DiMaggio was off at the crack of the bat. Solid lines denote path of Henrich into plate with winning run, dotted lines the route of Keller and DiMaggio.

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PLAY BY PLAY

First Inning Yankees

After working the count to two balls and one strike, Sturm opened with a single to left center and now has hit safely in every game of the series.

With the count two strikes and one ball, Rolfe grounded to Reese who threw to Coscarart forcing Sturm, but the relay to Camilli was slow and wide preventing a doubleplay.

Henrich, who had struck out yesterday for what would have been the final out of the ball game except that Owen failed to catch the ball, waited out a base on balls in his first trip at bat and Owen missed the fourth ball which rolled into the Yankee dugout almost duplicating the dramatic situation yesterday.

After waiting out a full count, DiMaggio fanned and Owen threw to Riggs to catch Rolfe sliding into third for a double play.

No runs, one hit, no errors, one left.

First Inning Dodgers

After waiting out a full count, Walker flied to Keller who made a running catch near the left field foul line.

On the first pitch Riggs tipped the ball foul and it struck Dickey, who fell to the ground in obvious pain while Manager McCarthy and the Yankee players crowded around him.

He apparently had been hit in the groin. After lying on the ground a few minutes, Dickey was helped to his feet by his teammates, tightened up his chest protector, donned his mask and play was resumed.

With the count two balls and one strike, Riggs shot a hot grounder to Gordon and was thrown out.

After getting the count to two and two, Reiser tripped against the wall in front of the center-field bleachers, running into third base standing up.

The crowd roared as Camilli came to bat.

Camilli swung at and missed one strike, then raised a high fly to Rizzuto who took it almost on the foul line in the grass behind third base.

No runs, one hit, no errors, one left.

Second Inning Yankees

Fans still were coming into the park as the second inning got under way and by this time it was practically full.

Keller worked the count to three and two, fouled a pitch and then drew a walk, the ball again getting away from Owen and rolling several yards back of the plate but he retrieved it in plenty of time to keep Keller from taking an extra base.

After looking at one ball, Dickey singled sharply along the ground into right center and Keller, running at full speed, slid safely into third.

With the count one and one on Gordon, Wyatt made a wild pitch far over Owen's outstretched glove and Keller scored while Dickey went to second.

Gordon drove a single off Coscarart's glove and Dickey scored as the ball continued into deep right.

Rizzuto bounced the first pitch to Riggs who tossed to Coscarart forcing Gordon.

Bonham struck out.

After taking one strike, Sturm bunted toward third base and was thrown out by Riggs to Camilli.

Two runs, two hits, no errors, one left.

Second Inning Dodgers

After getting three straight balls, Medwick fouled off three

pitches and finally walked.

Reese picked out a two and two pitch and flied high to DiMaggio.

Owen received another tremendous ovation from the crowd as he came to bat.

With the count three balls and one strike on Owen, Bonham gave him what looked like a high pitch and Owen tossed aside his bat and ran halfway to first before the umpire waved him back and informed him it was a strike. Manager Durocher protested briefly but Owen returned to the box and raised a high fly to Keller.

Coscarart bounced to Bonham who threw to Sturm for the out. No runs, no hits, no errors; one left.

Third Inning Yankees

Rolfe walked on five pitches. Wyatt walked clear in behind the plate to protest to Umpire McGowan on the called ball and was joined by Durocher but the pitcher returned to the mound and Durocher to the dugout.

Henrich flied deep to Reiser and Rolfe held first.

DiMaggio fanned. It was his second straight strikeout.

On the first pitch Keller grounded to Coscarart and was thrown out.

No runs, no hits, no errors, one left.

Third Inning Dodgers

After fouling the first pitch back into the press box, Wyatt lined a double into the left field corner.

With the count one and one, Walker lined to DiMaggio, Wyatt holding second.

After taking one strike, Riggs belted a liner that struck Bonham on the right leg below the knee and caromed off toward the third base line for a single, Wyatt reaching third, Bonham limped a little and Rolfe came over and talked to him for a minute but he prepared to go on pitching.

On the first pitch, Reiser drove a high fly which Henrich took a few feet from the scoreboard in right field, Wyatt scoring after the catch.

After getting the count to three and two, Camilli struck out.

One run; two hits; no errors; one left.

Fourth Inning Yankees

Dickey knocked the first pitch back at Wyatt, the ball hitting him on the shin, but he picked it up and threw to Camilli for the out. He apparently was not hurt.

After getting the count to three and two Gordon walked, and Wyatt came running in from the mound waving his glove and shouting in protest. In a heated argument with Umpire McGowan, Wyatt threw his glove on the ground and stamped and yelled. Durocher joined in the dispute, kicked the dirt and gestured with his arms while standing chin to chin with the umpire. The Dodge infielders came up close but after several minutes of debate Durocher returned to the dugout. As Wyatt walked back to the mound, he threw the ball high in the air and let it lie on the dirt. Then he started digging a hole in the mound by kicking his cleated right foot. Finally he picked up the ball and started to pitch.

He threw three straight balls to Rizzuto before the umpire called a strike. Then Rizzuto walked on the next pitch.

When Bonham, after taking one strike, tried to bunt and checked himself as the ball went wide, McGowan first appeared to signal a ball and then waved

a strike. This brought Manager McCarthy running from the Yankee dugout and also Coach Art Fletcher from the third base coaching box to make a brief protest.

Bonham fanned on the next pitch.

After getting the count to two and two Sturm grounded out to Camilli unassisted.

No runs, no hits, no errors; two left.

Fourth Inning Dodgers

As the Yankees took the field Fletcher came up to the plate again to talk to the umpire and then retired to the dugout.

On the second pitch Medwick lined to DiMaggio in left center. Reese took one strike and then smashed a liner which Keller caught on the run in left center.

After getting two balls Owen lifted a high foul to Rolfe between the third base coaching box and the field seats.

No runs, no hits, no errors; none left.

Fifth Inning Yankees

With the count two strikes and one ball, Rolfe knocked a roller to Camilli back of first and he threw to Wyatt for the putout.

Henrich picked out the first pitch and shot a home run over the right field fence, 40 feet high and 300 feet from the plate. It was his first of the series.

DiMaggio looked at two balls and then drove a high fly to Reiser in deep center. DiMaggio made a big turn for second base on the fly and as he headed back to the dugout he exchanged heated words with Wyatt, who on his previous time at bat had thrown a high inside pitch which made DiMaggio drop almost to the dirt. The two started for each other and almost every member of the two teams and the umpires raced to keep them apart. Peace was restored with nothing except conversation being exchanged and the field cleared for resumption of the game.

Keller struck out after getting the count to three and two.

One run; one hit; no errors; none left.

Fifth Inning Dodgers

The crowd booed the Yankees as they took the field.

With the count two strikes and one ball Coscarart raised a high fly to DiMaggio in left center and the crowd booed and hooted as he caught it.

The jeers turned to cheers as Wyatt came to bat.

Wyatt again fouled off a ball back into the stands, and then flied to DiMaggio.

Walker was passed on four pitches.

With the count one and one, Riggs raised a high foul which Rolfe came in to take in front of the Yankee dugout.

No runs, no hits, no errors; one left.

Sixth Inning Yankees

Dickey grounded to Reese who made a bad throw pulling Camilli off the bag for an error.

On the first pitch, Gordon smashed a hot grounder to Reese who started a double play, Reese to Coscarart to Camilli.

With the count two strikes and one ball, Rizzuto lined a single to left.

Bonham struck out for the third straight time.

No runs, one hit; one error; one left.

Sixth Inning Dodgers

On the first pitch Reiser almost knocked Gordon down with a smashing grounder but the Yankee great second sacker threw him out.

After looking at one ball, Camilli raised a high fly to Keller.

Medwick slapped the first pitch back to Rizzuto and was thrown out.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Seventh Inning Yankees

After getting the count to three and two Sturm topped a weak grounder to Coscarart who threw to Camilli for the putout.

With the count three and two on Rolfe, the attention of the fans and players suddenly was

attracted to left field where a piece of bunting draped over the railing in the upper deck of the stands caught fire and fell blazing to the ground. Fortunately it missed falling on the people in the boxes below.

Rolfe then fouled off a pitch and raised a short fly which Reese took near the left field foul line just back of third.

Henrich fanned.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Seventh Inning Dodgers

On the first pitch—Reese raised a pop fly to Sturm back of first.

Owen also hit the first pitch and grounded out to Rizzuto.

Billy Herman, Brooklyn's injured second baseman, began loosening up in the Dodge bullpen.

Galan, a left handed swinger, batted for Coscarart.

On the first pitch Galan popped foul to Sturm just a step away from first base.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Eighth Inning Yankees

Herman went to second base for the Dodgers and received an ovation from the crowd.

DiMaggio was booed at length as he came to bat.

After getting the count to two and two and fouling a couple of pitches, DiMaggio singled sharply to center for his first hit of the ball game.

Keller hit a hot grounder to Herman who wheeled to start a fast double play, Herman to Reese to Camilli.

On the first pitch Dickey grounded out Herman to Camilli.

No runs, one hit, no errors, none left.

Eighth Inning Dodgers

Wyatt slapped a hot grounder to Gordon back of second and the ball took a sudden hop but he managed to throw to Sturm in time for the putout.

Walker ripped a grounder single between Sturm and Gordon.

Riggs bit at the first pitch and raised a high foul to Sturm in the first base coaching box.

Reiser fanned on a two and two pitch.

No runs, one hit, no errors, one left.

Ninth Inning Yankees

SERIES SIDELIGHTS

BROOKLYN, Oct. 6 (AP)—Baffling, bewildering, Brooklyn. That's the only description of the Yankee half of the ninth inning in which the Dodgers retired two batters, then saw the American leaguers score four times after the third batter had struck out on a non-stop pitch that escaped the catcher and rolled to the grandstand.

Here is what some of the principals had to say:

Hugh Casey, the Brooklyn pitcher: "I've lost ball games in many ways but that is the first time I ever lost one by striking a guy out."

Mickey Owen, Dodge catcher: "It wasn't a strike. It was a low inside curve that I should have had. But I guess the ball struck my glove and by the time I got hold of it I couldn't have thrown anybody out at first. It was an error."

Tommy Henrich, the Yankee outfielder whose strikeout started it all: "It was a bad ball. It had me fooled completely and I couldn't stop my swing. I didn't know where the ball went. I just started to run. I'm not left handed for nothing."

Joe McCarthy, Yankee man-

ager, called the incident a "break" but added that "breaks don't count, it is what you do after you get them that does."

Leo Durocher, customarily the loud lip but extremely limp-lipped after the debacle, blamed policemen rushing to keep the fans off the diamond for getting in Owen's path.

But it was a wild afternoon all the way. Seven pitchers saw service and one southpaw Larry French, made only a single toss. It was a wild pitch and Phil Rizzuto, trying to advance, was thrown out to retire the side.

The day before French also appeared as a reliever and pitched to Yankee Catcher Bill Dickey who rapped into a double play. Both times he was removed for pinch-batsmen.

Other oddities included a fire in a photographers' coop which the lensmen had to extinguish themselves although there were hundreds of fire ladders about, and a baseball scribe's coat (without anyone in it) floating down from the grandstand roof and enveloping a spectator below.

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
