HITLER PEACE OFFER TO BE GIVEN, CLAIM

CAIRO, Oct. 7 (AP) — Adolf Hitler will make a new peace offer to Britain and the United States as well before the year's end, according to information reaching here.

Hitler, according to one American recently arrived from German-controlled territory, expects to be able within this time to announce that Russia has been put out of the war and to state that he is going ahead with his "new order" on the continent and ignore England except to carry out reprisals against her for any bombing done to Germany.

The Germans expect that England after a period of such a stalemate would accept a peace, this informant said.

The peace offer forecast is given considerable credence in both British and American diplomatic quarters here, but both are certain that the offer will be rejected and that the war will go on.

The information comes from various sources. The American arriving from German territory said that high Nazi officials whom he had known for years indicated that the olive branch dangled again before the British people would this time be backed up with arguments which the Germans thought would make them consider accepting it.

According to this information, Hitler will concentrate Ger-

many's full war-waging power against Russia in the next six weeks in the hope of making sufficient gains to tell the world he has put the soviet out of the combat and crushed bolshevism. Attacks on Britain and the Near East would be held to a bare minimum, while all possible strength would be turned on Russia.

Non-Agricultural Employment Hits Peak in August

PORTLAND, Oct. 7 (AP) — Private non-agricultural employment in the United States was at 39,542,000, an all-time peak, Labor Secretary Frances Perkins reported here Monday.

She said the number employed was 3,640,000 more than in August, 1940.

Miss Perkins listed weekly factory payrolls in August as \$297,940,000, a gain of \$97,766,000 over the preceding August.
