

HEATING RATES UP AT HEARING ON OCTOBER 17

A hearing will be held in Klamath Falls on Friday, October 17, in connection with proposed new rates of the Klamath Heating company. It was announced Wednesday by Ormond R. Bean, commissioner of public utilities of Oregon. Bean will conduct the hearing personally at the county courthouse, beginning at 10 a. m.

Klamath Heating company, which renders steam heating service in Klamath Falls and its environs, filed new tariffs with the PUC on October 2.

While the base rates for all scheduled in the new tariff remain substantially the same, the tariff seeks to establish an applicable hogged fuel price differential, according to the PUC announcement. The rates of the proposed tariff, if accepted, would be based on the price of hogged fuel. The present rates, in effect for more than eight years, when the price of hogged fuel is 50 cents per unit of 200 cubic feet, with certain graduated increases when the price of hogged fuel is above 50 cents a unit, and corresponding decreases as the prices reced below that level.

In support of its tariff, the company has submitted information tending to show that for many years it has not made a fair rate of return on the depreciated value of its property used in public service, and that in some years it has actually had an operating loss. The company's reported investment in the utility plant is \$291,636.14. The company's figures show an operating loss of \$1,880.26 for 1938 and a net operating income for the first eight months of 1941 of \$1,013.75. The commissioner's analysis for the first eight months of 1941 as compared with the similar term of 1940, shows only a slight increase in revenues, whereas operating expenses, especially production expenses, show a substantial increase over 1940.

The commissioner has ordered a 30-day suspension of the proposed tariff in order to provide for a hearing and consideration of the rates, which would advance in the case of advances in hogged fuel prices.

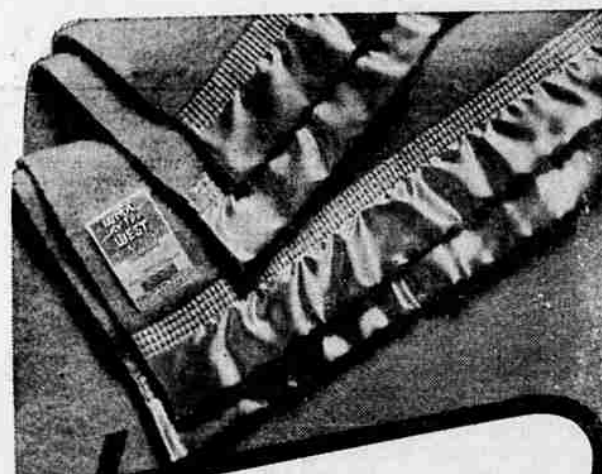
