KLAMATH GATE LEADS CRATER LAKE TRAVEL

The south, or Fort Klamath entrances to Crater Lake national park led all others in travel into the park during the 1941 season, according to national park service figures released recently.

A total of 30,315 cars carrying 101,414 persons were checked through the south entrance during the year, over 3000 more than in 1940. The west entrance from Medford was second with 23,736 cars.

California led in the number of cars and visitors from states outside Oregon. Washington was second and Illinois third.

A car from every state in the union and the District of Columbia passed through the gates in 1941.

Each of the 48 states, the District of Columbia, Canal Zone, Hawaii, Philippine islands and Puerto Rico were represented in the list of car registrations besides 43 foreign cars. South Africa, China and Finland each had one car.
