CUMMINS TO BE COPCO PRESIDENT

A. S. Cummins of Chicago will succeed Hance H. Cleland as president of The California Oregon Power company, according to announcement Thursday by company officials. Cummins has a background of 30 years' experience in the public utility industry and has had intimate knowledge of the operations of The California Oregon Power company since 1926. He has already arrived in Medford with his wife and daughter. Cummins will immediately take over the duties of Hance Cleland, who resigned recently to accept a similar position with the San Diego Consolidated Gas and Electric company.

John C. Boyle, vice president in charge of operations, was made vice president and general manager. Boyle has been with Copco since May 1, 1910, when he was employed as engineer on Copco No. 1 dam and power house in northern California, after which he built the Link River dam at Klamath Falls.

Boyle was made division manager of the Klamath division in 1921 and came to Medford as vice president in charge of operations in September, 1929.

M. D. Field and G. L. Jackson will continue as vice president and treasurer and vice president in charge of sales, respectively. E. L. Lenox will continue to serve as secretary.

SOCE Registration To Close Oct. 11

ASHLAND, Oct. 10.—Registration for the fall term at the Southern Oregon College of Education will close on October 11, according to Marshall E. Woodell, registrar. Students interested in enrolling at the college will find little difficulty in making up back assignments if they register this week.

OREGON SERVICE BOARDS PRAISED

SALEM, Oct. 10 (AP)—Oregon's selective service organization is "right on top," according to Lt. Comdr. E. B. Erickson, field inspector from national headquarters, who is Thursday completing inspection of state selective service offices.

"That Oregon is probably as efficiently administered and operated as any state in the union is the report I believe I shall be able to send back to Washington," he declared.

The fact that the state's selective service budget submitted recently received only few and minor changes in national offices indicates, Erickson said, that selective service administration here is in close conformity with that desired by national leaders.

"Oregon has had only two appeals to the president, which suggests that local boards and local appeal boards are earnestly attempting to be just," Erickson said, declaring the record below the national average.

For the past six years, the inspector said, Lt. Col. Elmer V. Wootton, Oregon's selective service director, has been one of a group of officers taking special training in preparation for such national emergency as that which has brought the system in operation.
