

COACHES AND SCHOOL HEADS HOLD MEETING

SPRAGUE RIVER—The regular monthly meeting of the Klamath County Principals and Coaches was held Tuesday, October 8, in the Pelican cafe and the circuit court room.

The first business of the evening was the report of the declaratory committee by Chairman Otis Johnson. The annual contest will be held at the Henley high school on Friday, November 15. The contest will have five divisions: Oratory, story telling, extemporaneous speaking, dramatic interpretation and humorous interpretation. It is expected that all Klamath county high schools will enter participants.

The five schools participating in football voted to contribute to an athletic insurance fund to be used for injuries sustained in the regular sports program. The schools participating are Malin, Henley, Merrill, Bonanza and Chiloquin.

LeRoy Coyner of Bonanza was nominated and recommended as the representative from this district to the Oregon High School Activities association. He expects to attend the annual meeting in Portland this December.

The big discussion of the evening was the determination of the proper method of selecting the basketball championship for the following year. Chairman Max Marvin of the schedule committee presented three plans: A two game home and home schedule; a one game schedule or a tournament. After much bickering, the group voted for a two game home and home schedule.

Sprague River and Gilchrist favored strongly the tournament idea since their distant location discouraged a great deal of traveling. The two teams will be given some kind of opportunity to determine their worth, it was decided.

Carroll House of Henley led the discussion over the adoption of a new county high school report card similar to the one used by Klamath Union high school. Hearty arguments greeted each plan suggested with the final result that the new card will be optional as to its use.

Superintendent Fred Peterson gave a talk on the method of determining janitors' salaries. Many questions were asked and cleared up on the issue. Peterson also announced that the Christmas holidays will be from December 20 to 28.

Wayne Scott, coach of the Klamath Wildcats, announced that the Wildcats are still in need of games and several of the coaches planned to meet the Klamath high eleven.

Arnold Gralapp, superintendent of Klamath Union high, made a few remarks along the various lines of discussion.

Roland Parks, president of the principals and coaches, urged the various members to bring problems and questions for a round-table forum, which will be a part of each meeting.

Opera singers are really day laborers in the arts and they, too, need three squares a day. Hilda Burke, blonde American soprano with the Metropolitan, likes substantial fare and gives us a few of the recipes she and her husband, Desire Deferre, stage manager of the Met, use in their own home.

VEAL STEW WITH DUMPLINGS

(Serves 4 to 6)
One pound veal cut in small cubes, 2 cups hot water, 1 cup diced potatoes, 1 cup diced carrots, 1 cup of chopped celery, 1 cup chopped onions, 1 cup lima or peas, 1 bay leaf, 1 can tomato sauce, and 1 teaspoon salt.

Dredge the meat in flour, brown in hot fat. Add hot water, cook slowly 1 hour. Add diced vegetables and seasonings; continue cooking 1 hour. Add tomato sauce, bring to boil, drop dumplings from spoon. Cover tightly and steam 12 to 15 minutes.

Dumplings

One cup flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup milk, 2 tablespoons melted butter. Sift ingredients together, gradually stir in milk, add butter, and drop into boiling stew a tablespoon at a time.

RICE AND NUT LOAF

(Serves 4 to 6)
One-half cup uncooked brown rice, 1 egg, 4 tablespoons chopped parsley, 1 cup soft bread crumbs, 1 cup chopped nuts, 1 cup melted butter.

Cook rice in water until soft. Stir in well-beaten egg. Thoroughly mix nuts, chopped parsley, crumbs. Add to rice. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 1 hour. Baste with melted butter several times. Serve with an egg sauce.

Egg Sauce

Two tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 1/2 cups milk, 2 hard-cooked eggs, 1 tablespoon parsley.

Melt butter in saucepan, stir

in flour; when thoroughly blended add milk which has been brought to a boil. Season with salt and pepper. Bring mixture to a boil, then simmer gently for 5 minutes. Remove from fire and add coarsely chopped hard-cooked eggs and parsley. Pour over loaf.
