

Review Presented Library Meeting

Mrs. Victor O'Neill Gives Excellent Program Before Klamath Falls Women's Group

An outstanding program, and one which others will find difficult to rival in sheer entertainment as well as interest, was that given before the Klamath Falls Women's Library club on Monday afternoon in the main auditorium of the public library by Mrs. Victor E. O'Neill who reviewed Forrest Wilson's, "Crusader in Crinoline," the biography of Harriet Beecher Stowe.

The name of Harriet Beecher Stowe is certainly not unfamiliar to anyone having read books "since they were eight," but the life of this outstanding woman, the New England background, the manner in which she wrote, "Uncle Tom's Cabin," proved delightful listening. And none can do it better than Mrs. O'Neill who had done considerable research into the family background of Mrs. Stowe about whose book President Lincoln is said to have said, "caused a war."

Those who were prevented from hearing Mrs. O'Neill will regret that they missed this review which officially opened the year's programs of Library club. Mrs. O'Neill has been most gracious in the past, donating her time and study to the organization which appreciates it immensely as was noted by the members who crowded about her following her presentation.

The next lecture of the group is scheduled for November the tenth when a lecture will be given by Dr. Victor P. Morris, University of Oregon, according to Mrs. Matt Rauw, program chairman.

Annual Meet Is Announced

Oregon Music Educators to Gather in Salem Over Weekend

The fifth annual meeting of the Oregon Music Educators, which has grown to a membership of 125 during its four years of organization, will be held at the Willamette university in Salem on Friday and Saturday, October the twenty-fourth and twenty-fifth, with an unusually interesting program prepared for the occasion.

The Friday evening dinner will be served at the Golden Pheasant, followed by meetings of the various committees, the one on instrumental to be in charge of Miss Lillie E. Darby, supervisor of music in the Klamath Falls elementary schools, who served as the first president of the organization, holding the office for two terms.

One of the most interesting features on the Saturday program will be an elementary choir demonstration by Bernard Meier of Walla Walla, Washington, when about fifty children will take part, all of whom are being brought to Salem by a number of their parents in private cars.

A primary demonstration of rhythm and song will be presented by Maude Garnett of the University of Oregon, who will make her first appearance at the Educators meeting. A materials symposium of choral work on Saturday will also be under the direction of Miss Darby.

On Saturday afternoon Principal A. L. Gralapp of Klamath Union high school, who is considered one of the outstanding men in education in the state, will speak on "Budgeting for the Music Department." Mr. Gralapp will also attend the state principals' meeting in Salem this weekend.

Clifford A. Elliott of McMinnville, who is closing his second term as president of the Music Educators, will preside at the meeting and at the business session late Saturday afternoon when there will be election of officers. The Oregon Music Educators are now affiliated with the Music Educators National conference.
