COURSES ADDED TO VOCATIONAL PROGRAM HERE

The third and fourth Klamath defense vocational schools are underway following inauguration of the machine shop class in Klamath Union high school Thursday night.

Day and night welding classes were begun last week under the direction of Bill Needham and Bud Leverich. Both courses are being held in basement gymnasium quarters. Radio and aircraft sheet metal classes, started last summer, have been moved upstairs.

Actual operation of all four schools, designed to train men for technical work in defense industries, rounds out the current program of the city's defense council which began last spring with the announcement of the sheet metal course. It brings to the city an investment of over \$30,000 in equipment and, in effect, gives the Klamath area the nucleus of a vocational junior college.

The two new courses, like the others, are financed through the state bond for vocational education. The entire Klamath operation is under the supervision of Defense Coordinator Clem Clarke.

According to Charles Ringette, machine shop instructor, the class will be able to handle only 10 students until the balance of the shop's heavy equipment is moved into place. The class will have an eventual capacity of 20.

Students are trained sufficiently to qualify as a machine operator which includes a working knowledge of lathe, drill press, milling machine, shaper, and planer operations. Unlike radio, sheet metal and welding schools, only one class at night is being held in machine shop.

While graduates of the 12-week course are not guaranteed a job, operators who have completed the course in other sections have virtually been immediately employed in north-west defense industries.

Both day and night classes are being held in welding with approximately 10 students per session.

Enrollees in either school must be between the ages of 18 and 35 unless they have had some previous experience.

Applicants may sign up at the Oregon state employment service, 242 Main street.

OREGON PLANS MANY EVENTS FOR NAVY DAY

According to David B. Simpson, state chairman of Navy day on October 27, plans for the most significant observance in the history of the occasion are proceeding apace. Under the supervision of the American Legion, local committees in all outlying towns are making elaborate preparations for calling the attention of the public to the ideals, traditions, history and purposes of our first line of defense.

The help of many of the state's civic and fraternal organizations has been enlisted, and it is expected that during and around Navy day they will have special meetings devoted to the navy. In all communities, store windows and displays are being installed and arrangements have been made for speeches and special programs to be presented to schools throughout the state.

The high point of the day's festivities is expected to be the mass patriotic meeting at the civic auditorium in Portland, at which the public will be invited to witness the swearing in ceremony of a company of Oregon boys for naval service. The company is being raised by the American Legion as one of that organization's contributions to the country's defense. The idea of making the enlistment of the company of Oregon boys a part of the Navy day observance came directly from Secretary of the Navy Knox, who made the suggestion to Joseph K. Carson Jr., state Legion commander.

Upon Carson's promise of full cooperation to Knox, the Legion began preparations for the project, and Legionnaires now report that progress toward raising the required number of men is more than satisfactory. The swearing in of the men will be done by the officer in charge of navy recruiting in this district, Lieut. G. F. DeGrave.

Other features of the Navy day program will be addresses by Governor Sprague and Carson, and other entertainment which is being arranged by a Legion committee headed by H. J. Erickson of Portland, first district commander.

Navy day was originated in 1922 and has been annually sponsored by the Navy league since. The date, October 27, was selected as a tribute to Theodore Roosevelt, whose birthday it is. "Teddie" was the first American to realize the importance of a strong naval policy to this country, and it was under his guidance that the United States was first recognized as a great sea power.

Simpson, in discussing the Navy day observance, said, "In addition to paying a deserved tribute to the sea heroes of the nation, and recalling the splendid part the navy has played in making and keeping up a sovereign state, the Navy day observance has proved a valuable means of fostering a better understanding of the navy and its work. Such information, in a country where government is by the people, is essential to the formation of correct judgments affecting naval policy, and in this work of disseminating information the Navy day observance has played a considerable part."
