

DEARMOND PUT UP FOR MAYOR OF LAKEVIEW

LAKEVIEW — Dave DeArmond, member of the town council, was unanimously nominated to serve as mayor of Lakeview, during the 1942-44 period, at the regular nominating convention to name candidates for city office, which was held at the county court house, Mayor F. Carl Fetsch, whose term expired this year, announced that he would not be a candidate to succeed himself. No other name was placed in opposition to that of DeArmond and the secretary was instructed to cast a unanimous ballot.

With only a small number present the names of only five men were advanced for the two vacancies occurring as the result of the expiration of the term of Councilmen Dave DeArmond and R. L. Ackerman at the end of this year.

Nominated from the floor as councilmen were L. D. Ohlson, R. L. Ackerman, Frank Cotter, Phil Shulte and Con Taylor. In a close run-off election, as prescribed by the city charter to elect the candidates for each office, Frank Cotter, L. D. Ohlson, Phil Shulte and Con Taylor were elected as council nominees.

George Johnson, incumbent city recorder was nominated to succeed himself, and O. C. Gibbs, former city recorder, was also named to run for the position. Whether either or both of them planned to qualify has not been learned.

Larry Fitzgerald, incumbent city treasurer, was nominated without opposition to succeed himself and received a unanimous ballot.

Defense Board Considers More Food, Greater Speed In Agriculture Production

More food and greater speed in production, particularly of certain agricultural products, was the gist of an all-day session of the county defense board with representatives of the state defense board and county agricultural organizations.

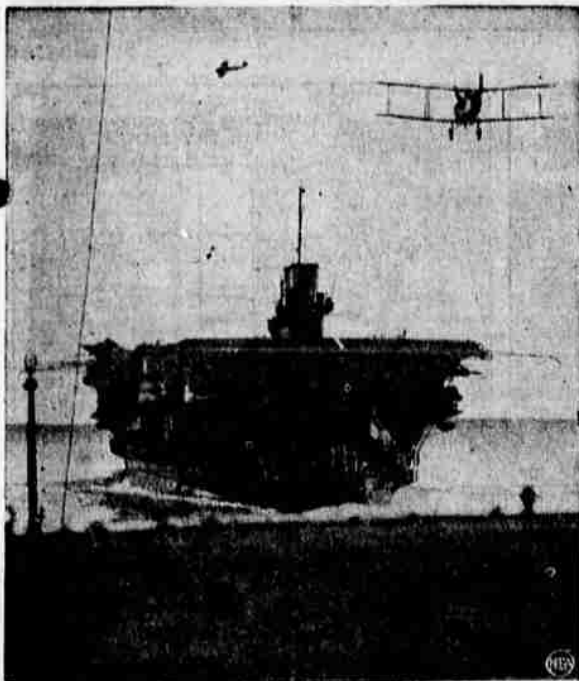
Present from the state USDA defense board was Lynn H. Douglas, of the forest service, who opened the meeting by outlining the emergency nature of the meeting and the great need of additional supplies of certain farm commodities, such as milk and dairy products, eggs, meats of all kinds and vegetables. George G. Cummings, representing the state AAA office, discussed the state setup pointing out that the carrying out of this project was placed upon the shoulders of the state defense board and that this board in return was carrying the request to the county defense boards. Paul Carpenter, extension agricultural economist, discussed the seriousness of the situation and the extreme necessity of every farmer being interviewed personally through means of the county set-up in order that all possible increase might be secured.

In the morning, the county USDA defense board met with the members of the state board and set up tentative county goals of the needed commodities, and in the afternoon, considerable time was devoted to making adjustments in these tentative increases. The following increases in commodities were finally arrived at as possible in the county and greatly needed in carrying out a successful national defense program: milk, 10 per cent; milk cows, 5 per cent; eggs, 15 per cent; cattle and calves, 10 per cent; hogs, 25 per cent; chickens, 15 per cent; turkeys, 15 per cent; oats, 10 per cent; barley, 40 per cent; flax seed, 20 per cent; vegetables for fresh shipment, 20 per cent and farm gardens, 10 per cent. In all cases the increases requested for 1942 are comparable with 1941 except the increase of cattle, where the increase would be as comparing 1942 with 1940. In as much as no increase in sheep and lambs was requested, it is thought that some decrease might be expected. It was stated that the dairy

is working in that area at present.

LOST HUNTER FINDS FELLOW WANDERER

SHASTA—The strange circumstance of one lost hunter meeting another lost hunter beside a campfire in the middle of a long night, disagreeing over directions and parting to go opposite ways, was related by Charles Burns of San Diego, Calif., who wandered 30 hours in the Bly country, according to friends here.

Burns, who with Mrs. Burns and their daughter, Mrs. Mildred Douglas of Redlands, Calif., was visiting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ivan Crumpacker on Madison street, went on a hunting trip with S. F. Morrison of Prospect, Ore., October 12 and the two became separated during a snow squall.

When the sun came out after the flurry, Burns said it seemed to be in the east although it was 5 o'clock in the afternoon. He kept moving until after dark, he said, and some time in the night came upon the campfire of "Tiny" Wilson, who was also lost.

The two argued about directions and finally separated, with Burns stopping some time later to build his own fire and wait for daylight.

Monday morning Burns encountered a party of hunters and got directions and a package of doughnuts without revealing he was lost.

Later in the day he got further directions from other hunters, and finally, about 7 p. m. he came to his camp. He estimated he had walked 50 miles. His legs were slightly swollen but he suffered no other ill effects.

Burns is an experienced woodsman and could not account for losing his bearings. He was much embarrassed by the incident when he learned a large searching party had covered the territory Monday night looking for him and Wilson.

The Burns party and Mrs. S. F. Morrison started home Wednesday, intending to visit Crater lake en route.

Funeral Services Held for Father Of Referendum

PORTLAND, Oct. 20 (P)—Funeral services were held today for Robert Glenn Smith, 76, who instituted the first bills for initiative and referendum measures in Oregon.

He proposed the laws at the 1895 session of the legislature when he was a representative from Jackson county. The measures were not enacted until 1902.

Smith, who was born in Jacksonville, Ore., had practiced law in Portland for the past 22 years. The widow, a daughter, Helen Smith of New York, and a sister, Mrs. Mabel Fenton, Oswego, survive.

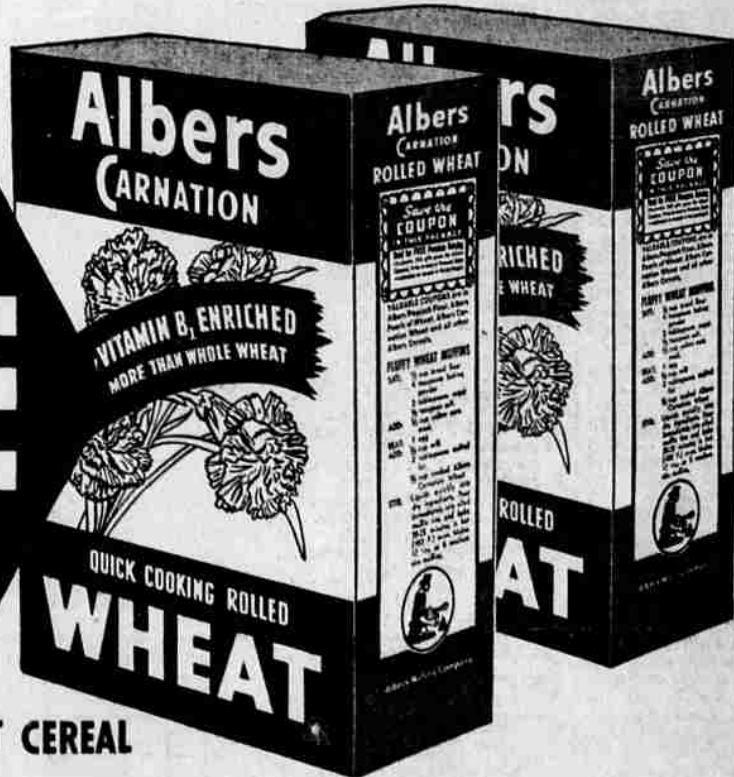
