

# HOME CANNING ENTRIES TO BE JUDGED FRIDAY

With a lively interest being displayed by local grange members in the second annual Oregon grange-Oregon sugar home canning contest, entries for Klamath county will be judged at office of the home demonstration agent on October 24 at 2 p. m. Mrs. W. M. Williams, home economics chairman for the grange, estimates that scores of entries will be submitted to judges in the three contest classifications, which include canned fruit, preserves and jelly.

Prizes for the state finals, which will be held at state grange headquarters in Portland, October 27, include a Frigidaire, a Stewart-Warner Scotch Maid electric range, a Maytag Master electric washer, 12 aluminum pressure cookers and a quantity of White Satin sugar.

There will be 324 county prizes totaling over five tons of White Satin sugar for county winners. Besides, all first place winners in each county contest will go to the state finals in Portland. The total value of county and state prizes is nearly \$1400.

Mrs. Williams invites all grange members to get a copy of the contest rules from her or from the state grange office in Portland. A list of the rules and of the prizes is also posted in the Henley grange hall.

A special feature of the contest, of particular interest to the men of the grange, is in the nature of a consolation contest for grange men only who, besides competing for the general prizes, may compete for a special prize consisting of a trout rod, tapered line, reel, and flybox. Many men grangers are threatening to turn cooks, according to Mrs. Williams, to win this special consolation prize.
