DIVERSION OF SPUDS SET TO BOOST PRICES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (P)—The agriculture department announced today a program for the diversion of up to 5,000,000 bushels of Irish potatoes into starch and dextrine in a move designed primarily to boost producer prices.

For the present, the program will be operated in Maine, Minnesota, Idaho and Oregon and will be similar to potato diversion programs in effect in 1937 and 1940.

The department said prices of potatoes to growers, in virtually all commercial areas since July have remained well below the level of other farm products and that September prices received by farmers in all states averaged 64.4 cents per bushel or about 68 per cent of the parity goal.

Growers would receive 30 cents from the agriculture department and 60 cents per U. S. standard barrel from starch manufacturers for potatoes diverted under this program. Potatoes must grade U. S. No. 2 or better. Only those farmers who cooperated with the 1941 AAA crop program may take advantage of this program.

The department said that in addition to supporting potato prices, the program would help supply a large industrial demand for starch, large quantities of which normally are imported from Europe and The Netherlands East Indies.
