THREE RECEIVE SENTENCES FOR DRUNK DRIVING

Execution Date Not on Friday For First Time

SALEM, Oct. 23 (AP)—James Harvey Thomas, 19, sentenced to die in the state lethal gas chamber a week from today, is the first man ever sentenced in Oregon to die on any day other than Friday, prison officials said today.

Friday also is the customary execution day in most other states.

Thomas, unless Governor Charles A. Sprague commutes the sentence to life imprisonment, will die for slaying Douglas Smith, salesman, near Arlington. Smith, who picked up Thomas when the latter was hitchhiking, was en route from Idaho to his mother's deathbed in Aberdeen, Wash.

Prison officials said that Thomas, who believes the governor will commute the sentence, is bearing up well. If he continues to do so, he will not be taken to the prison death cell until the night before the execution, which is scheduled for 8:30 a. m. Thursday.

Governor Sprague has given no indication that he would take any action.

Boy Scout News

(Editor's note: This is another in a series of articles on the Boy Scout movement and its various phases of activity.)

BOY SCOUT ADVANCEMENT PROGRAM

Since the purpose of the advancement program is to make the scout better able to serve his community, perhaps we should study the different ranks by which the boy advances in scouting.

When a boy first joins a scout troop he is instructed in certain fundamental phases of scouting. First he must be able to tie and explain the uses of nine knots, including the square knot.

Then, as in any organization, the new member must know the motto, "Be Prepared"; the slogan, "Do a Good Turn Daily"; the salute, the handclasp, and the meaning of the badge and uniform. The Boy Scouts of America represent the largest uniformed body outside the army, navy or marine corps in the United States. Nearly one million and a half boys were scouts in 1940.

Next the boy must know the composition and history of the flag of the United States. He must also know the customary forms of respect due the flag.

All this instruction is given within the patrol by the other scouts.

As soon as a boy has learned the above work and passed his twelfth birthday, he then appears before his scoutmaster who reviews him in all the previous work and then listens while the boy repeats and explains the scout oath and law.

It is worthwhile to set down here the scout oath:

To my duty to God and my country, and to obey the Scout law; to help other people at all times; to keep myself physically strong, mentally awake, and morally straight.

The Scout Law

1. A Scout is Trustworthy. A scout's honor is to be trusted. If he were to violate his honor by telling a lie, or by cheating, or by not doing exactly a given task, when trusted on his honor, he may be directed to hand over his scout badge.

2. A Scout is Loyal. He is loyal to all to whom loyalty is due; his scout leader, his home, and parents and country.

3. A Scout is Helpful. He must be prepared at any time to save life, help injured

He is generous to those in need, and helpful to worthy objects. He may work for pay but must not receive tips for courtesies or good turns.

10. A Scout is Brave. He has the courage to face danger in spite of fear and to stand up for the right against the coaxings of friends or the jeers or threats of enemies, and defeat does not down him.

11. A Scout is Clean. He keeps clean in body and thought, stands for clean speech, clean sport, clean habits, and travels with a clean crowd.

12. A Scout is Reverent. He is reverent toward God. He is faithful in his religious duties, and respects the convictions of others in matters of custom and religion.
