

NAZIS CRASH THROUGH LINE NEAR ROSTOV

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aced Moscow, Gen. Gregory K. Zhukov, who took Timoshenko's place in defense of the capital, apparently had checked the head-on drive of strongly reinforced Nazi forces from west of the city. German bombers renewed their attacks on Moscow last night, causing damage and casualties, but much of the Soviet government already had been moved to this Volga bank town, determined to carry on.

Marsal Semeon Budyenny and Marshal Klementi Voroshilov, northern front commander, were given the task of forming new fighting forces from the vast reserve of Soviet manpower as Russia served notice she would never quit.

S. A. Lozovsky, vice foreign

commissar and government spokesman for the press, declared the removal of basic commissariats from Moscow gave proof of "not weakening, but strengthening of the defense."

"The Soviet government and people fully realize the gravity of the situation," the spokesman said, "but the government and the people do not doubt the final outcome of the war."

"Hitler promised to end the war before winter, then throw enormous forces against England. He failed in both."

"The arrival in Kuibyshev signifies the Soviet government and people will fight to the end."

Lozovsky told foreign correspondents that Marshal Budyenny and Voroshilov already had the organization of reserve fighting forces under way, and added:

"In a very short time enormous numbers will be added to the trained men who continue the fight."

War May Make Oregon Center of Flax Industry

PORTLAND, Oct. 24 (AP)—The war may make Oregon the vital supply region for flax, S. J. Smith of St. Paul, Ore., secretary-treasurer of the St. Paul Flax Growers' cooperative, said last night.

He pointed out that 95 per cent of the U. S. flax supply has been cut off by the war and that flax is a necessary defense product. The government already has considered an expansion program in Oregon.

Expansion would take care of itself in the state, he opined, were it not for a bottleneck in the form of processing facilities. The state could double its production on present acreage if retting and scutching plants were built to take care of it.

Senators Agree To Seek Repeal of Combat Zone Ban

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—Top-ranking senate leaders were reported today to have agreed that they should work for repeal of the neutrality law provision preventing American merchants from entering belligerent ports or combat areas.

An administration poll showed 55 senators would back their efforts.

Democratic Leader Barkley and Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) of the senate foreign relations committee conferred regarding neutrality revision last night. Although neither would comment, other reliable informants said they had decided that the house-approved armed ship bill should be broadened so as to permit American merchantmen to sail any sea in the world.

It was reported that Barkley and Connally, taking encouragement from the senate poll, had agreed that it would be better to do a complete job of neutrality revision at once instead of passing the ship arming measure and then considering further amendments later on.

The third route through Persia, Knox noted, involves a sea voyage of 12,000 miles. He said that even when supplies were delivered there great difficulty would be encountered in moving them inland and it would be necessary to build all facilities through the country.

He spoke in low tones, but intensely, and stressed to his hearers the necessity for performing what he has called a "miracle" in munitions output.

Japan Asks U. S. To Take Sincere Stand in Asia

TOKYO, Oct. 24 (AP)—Domei, Japanese news agency with close official connections, quoted "observers" today as saying that the success of negotiations between Japan and the United States "now entirely depends on the sincere attitude of the United States" and that Japan doubts that the United States is sincere.

In the same radio broadcast, Domei quoted its sources as saying that the situation had worsened as a result of economic pressure, including the freezing of Japanese assets.

The United States must realize the limit to concessions which Japan can make, the Domei commentary continued.

The "observers" said that United States "acceptance" of Premier General Tojo's policy of ending the war in China and establishing the "prosperity sphere in East Asia" would be the "most important factor" in sweeping away the dark clouds that now hover over Japanese-American relations.

She was standing outside holding her child when the explosion occurred. She ran, but a rock struck her on the leg, injuring her. The child struck the ground when Mrs. Bonney fell but was unhurt.
