

PROFS FAVOR STRONG MEANS TO BEAT AXIS

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Oct. 24 (UP)—Stanford faculty members, by a ratio of approximately 6 to 1, favor stronger American intervention if needed to defeat the axis powers, according to results of a poll announced Thursday night by a sponsoring faculty committee.

The committee said ballots were sent to 83 members of the academic council active and emeritus and to other members of the regular teaching staff in the three professorial ranks. Three hundred and forty one replies were received.

The committee announced the following results:

1. "Do you support the foreign policy of our government in the measures which have already been taken against the axis powers? (Food and munitions to enemies of the axis; lend-lease act; exchange of destroyers for military bases; military expedition to Iceland; north Atlantic patrol; embargo on war supplies to Japan)?"

Yes, unqualified 83.7 per cent; yes, qualified 2.3; a little on the yes side 0.29. Total yes, 86.51. No, unqualified 8.80; no, qualified 1.76; a little on the no side 0.59. Total no, 11.15. (Remainder responses unclassified.)

2. "Do you favor the measures now proposed to defeat the axis powers, namely: revision of neutrality legislation and further lend-lease legislation?"

Yes, unqualified 80.94; yes, qualified 0.88; a little on the yes side 0.29. Total yes, 82.70. No, unqualified 14.08; no, qualified 0.88; a little on the no side 0.29. Total no, 15.25. (Remainder responses unclassified.)

3. "Would you favor stronger measures if they should be needed to defeat the axis powers?"

Yes, unqualified 75.37; yes, qualified 2.64; a little on the yes side 0.29. Total yes, 78.30. No, unqualified 12.61; no, qualified 3.23; a little on the no side 1.17. Total no, 17.01. (Remainder responses unclassified.)

Hungry Spooks Will Enjoy This Tasty Meat Pie

When spooks are invited to a Halloween buffet supper party they take along their appetites. So be prepared.

CHICKEN AND TONGUE PIE

One 4½-pound boiled chicken with soup stock from the cooking, 6 ounces boiled tongue, 12 small boiled white onions, 12 small boiled potato balls, 1½ quarts chicken sauce, 1 cup boiled carrots sliced crosswise in slices 3/8-inch thick.

Heat together 1 cup cream, 1½ cups milk, 1 quart chicken stock. Melt together in another pan, 1 cup butter and 1 table-spoon flour to make a paste. Slowly pour into the paste the heated liquid, stirring constantly to make a thick sauce, and cook until done. Season with salt and pepper to taste, and a dash of onion juice. Then strain the sauce to eliminate any small lumps which may have formed.

Pastry crust: Use any good pie crust mixture. Grate into it a small amount of cheese, mixing it with the dough before spreading it over the filling.

Filling: Remove meat from chicken bones. Cut in strips 1½ inches long by 1 inch wide. Measure 2½ cups of meat. Slice the tongue in 1 inch slices, cut each slice in strips 1 inch long and ½ inch wide. Measure 1 cup. Use only this amount.

Mix the measured chicken and tongue and vegetables carefully into the hot chicken sauce. Season. Pour into a casserole baking dish, filling it to the top. Roll pie crust 1 inch thick and cover the pie with it, making a deep fluted edge. Prick with a fork and cut about eight small slits in it. Bake in hot oven until pastry crust is done and golden brown, or bake in individual dishes.

INDIVIDUAL PEAR SALADS

Select two nice large fresh pears, peel, cut in halves, re-

move cores, and scoop out some of the center to allow for filling. Sprinkle with a little lemon juice. Cut a thin slice from the bottom of each half so it will rest firmly in the lettuce nest.

Prepare 1 cup of pineapple and grapefruit cubes, each cut 1 inch thick. Sprinkle with 2 teaspoons powdered sugar. Cut 8 more pineapple cubes to use

as a garnish. Section 2 oranges, free from membrane, allowing 16 sections to an orange. Pit 2 small stewed prunes and cut in half lengthwise. Make 4 cream cheese balls about 1 inch thick and roll in chopped pecans.

Arrange on platter with cream cheese balls in nest of lettuce leaves in center, and 4 lettuce nests of 1 pear filled with mixed fruit.

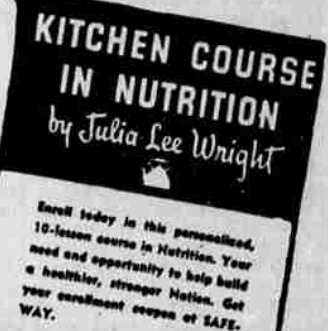
