State Police Warn 8202, Make 1824 Arrests in Month

SALEM, Oct. 24 (AP)—State police arrested 1,824 persons and warned 8,202 others during September for violating motor vehicle laws, fines and sentences for these offenses totaling \$9,613 and 2,315 days.

There were 44 persons arrested for drunken driving, 412 for having no driver's license, 341 for having faulty lights, 113 for speeding and 227 for violating rules of the road.

There were 257 arrests for general law violations, fines and sentences totaling \$1,605 and 83.67 years in prison. Of the total, 75 of the arrests were for drunkenness, 73 for larceny, 17 for liquor violations, 11 for fraud, and nine for assault.

Cider's Spice Is Extra Nice for Hallowe'en Party

Bright red apples and Hallowe'en parties always go together, along with cider. Heated and spiced, it makes a friendly old-fashioned party beverage.

Hot Spiced Cider
(One gallon)
Two inches of thick cinnamon, 1 tablespoon whole cloves, 1 tablespoon whole allspice, 2 blades of mace, 1 gallon cider, 11 pounds brown sugar, 1 teaspoon salt.

The spices in a cheese-cloth bag and place in cider. Add brown sugar and salt. Bring slowly to boiling point and simmer (do not boil) for 12 to 20 minutes, depending upon how concentrated a mixture is desired. Remove spice bag and serve hot.

Here are two apple recipes good for Hallowe'en.

Glassed Spiced Apples
(Six servings)
Two cups sugar, 14 cups water, two 2-inch pieces stick cinnamon, 1 teaspoon whole cloves, 1 cup lemon juice, 1 blade mace, 1 whole black pepper, lemon or orange peel, 6 small apples.

Mix sugar and water in a fairly deep pan with a large base. Add spices and the peel after putting them in a loosely tied bag. Bring all to a rapid boil, skim carefully, then add lemon juice. Into this mixture place pared and cored apples. Simmer gently, turning apples frequently but taking care not to break them. When apples are clear, remove from syrup and place on individual serving dishes. Remove spice bag and boil syrup until it sheets from the spoon. Pour it over apples, and let cool. A topping of whipped cream and a garnish of chopped nuts or maraschino cherries adds to the richness of this dessert.

Spicy Apple Souffle
(Serves eight)
One-third quick-cooking tapioca, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 cups milk, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, 2 tablespoons butter, 11 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 cup grated raw apple, 3 egg yolks beaten until thick and lemon colored, 3 egg whites.

Combine tapioca, sugar, salt and milk in top of double boiler. Place over rapidly boiling water, bring to scalding point (allow 3 to 5 minutes), and cook 5 minutes, stirring frequently. Add butter, spices, lemon juice and apple. Cool slightly while beating eggs. Add egg yolks and mix well. Fold into stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into greased baking dish. Place in pan of hot water and bake in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) 50 to 60 minutes, or until souffle is firm. Serve hot with whipped cream.

Two Well Diggers Asphyxiated When Air Pump Fails

VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 24 (AP)—A fresh air pump on a gasoline engine being used in a well digging operation failed last night and two diggers were asphyxiated at the bottom of the 25-foot shaft.

Fred Lackaff, 49, veteran Vancouver auto camp operator, and Pat Roth, 27, Spokane, lost their lives. Mrs. Lackaff discovered the unconscious forms about 8 p. m. and summoned a neighbor, Elton Fosberg, 27. Fosberg scrambled down a ladder, roped the bodies together and hustled back to the surface. He was violently ill by the time he got into clear air but recovered rapidly and helped pull the victims up. Artificial respiration was of no avail.

Fosberg said sand got into the pump, causing it to divert carbon monoxide fumes into the well which was on the Lackaff auto camp 10 miles north of here.

Plan Sunday Night Buffet Supper As Party Event

Hallowe'en week opens the party season and time for Sunday night buffet suppers is here.

Your buffet menu can be very simple—sliced cold meat loaf, potato salad, jellies and relishes, hot biscuits, stewed fruit, cake and coffee—or it can be more ambitious. Mrs. Rae Wisdom, hostess for a successful eastern group of restaurants, recently described what she called a perfect Sunday buffet menu: Cold roast turkey, creamed oysters and ham in patty shells, tray of assorted salads (tomato with cottage cheese and chives, avocado pear and orange and asparagus tip), ripe olives, radishes, carrot

juice and berry halves. Add rum or rum flavoring if desired. This makes about 3 cups of sauce, enough for 6 servings if you allow 1 cup per serving, or enough for 9 servings if you plan on 1/3 cup per person. Use a large, firm table for your buffet, small tables about your living room.

Buffet Hostess Hints
1. When planning the arrangement of your table, consider balance and convenience of serving. Try to separate large dishes such as platters of turkey, assorted salads, and so on, with smaller dishes containing relishes and lighter things.

2. Keep one course on one side of the table. Allow one side for the main course, the other for the dessert course. This avoids traffic congestion as guests pass around.

3. Have plates, silver and napkins in logical positions. See that large dinner plates are situated on the right of the main hot dish, which should occupy the end of the table opposite coffee service. Be sure that napkins are near large plates, so each guest can help himself to a plate and carry the napkin under it.

4. Carry out the colors of your centerpiece flowers in the colors of your little after-dinner mints.
