

KLAMATH MEN CONVICTED ON U. S. CHARGES

Two more Klamath white men have been sentenced in federal court at Medford for selling liquor to Indians.

They are August Wall, 49, who got 11 months for selling whiskey to James Chocktoot, and D. W. McEvoy, 81, who received a two-year sentence. Both were fined \$10.

Lawrence Gardner, 38, local negro, was acquitted. He was charged jointly with Wall.

Wall was convicted by a jury which deliberated about three hours. His attorney, Frank Ferrell of Medford, pleaded that Wall had lived here six or seven years without getting into trouble. The government reported he had been sentenced to 10 months for liquor smuggling in San Diego in 1930.

A defense motion to suppress evidence was upheld in Medford federal court in the case of Harry W. Hull, 65, Chiloquin, charged with selling liquor to Indians.

Hull's attorney, George M. Roberts, argued that since the offense charged is a misdemeanor and since the arresting officers did not themselves see the commission of the alleged sale, the arrest was illegal. He contended also that a search of Hull's home at Chiloquin was in violation of the fourth amendment of the constitution.

Edward B. Twining, assistant U. S. attorney, at first disagreed with Roberts' assertions, but later the government moved for dismissal of the case. Hull was discharged from custody.

Eden Promises Aid To Russians, Says Supplies Flowing

MANCHESTER, Eng., Oct. 25 (AP)—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden declared confidently today that Britain would overcome many geographical difficulties in fulfilling the "immensely formidable task" of giving promised aid to Russia.

"The government indeed have but one purpose which is yours and Stalin's too—how best to accomplish Hitler's defeat," Eden asserted.

He added, however, that he could not enlighten his audience on when Britain is going to strike or even "at least, that we shall strike."

In the middle east, Eden continued, British reinforcements and supplies have been speeding continuously "to the unbroken allied front stretching from the Caucasus through Persia (Iran), Iraq, Palestine and Egypt to the western desert."

FIFTH DEGREE TO BE GIVEN BY GRANGERS

Klamath Pomona grange degree team will exemplify the fifth degree of the grange at Henley school gymnasium Tuesday, October 28, at 8 p. m., according to announcement of Pomona Master R. H. Anderson, who urges all fourth degree members who have not taken the higher degree to be present for the event.

Anderson states that as several members of the fifth degree team will shortly be inducted into the army forces of their country, that this exemplification of the fifth degree will likely be the last to be held for at least a year, and he urges, for this reason, that officers of the subordinate grange make a special effort to build up a large class of candidates, and if necessary to provide transportation for them to Henley.

The Pomona master states that he would like to impress upon all subordinate grange members that in order to become a voting member in the Pomona grange it is necessary to take the obligations of the fifth degree, and this degree is also necessary before advancement can be made to the sixth and seventh degrees. Attention is called to the fact that election of Pomona grange officers will take place on November 8, and taking the fifth degree Tuesday will qualify grange members to vote for the new Pomona officers.

The masters and secretaries of all subordinate granges are requested to be present at the Tuesday evening exemplification in order to sign applications of candidates. Fifth degree members generally are also urged to be present.

WRECKAGE OF ONE LOCATED NEAR FRESNO

ROOSEVELT FLAYS NAZI EXECUTIONS

Germans in countries temporarily under the Nazi heel revolts a world already injured to suffering and brutality. Civilized peoples long ago adopted the basic principle that no man should be punished for the deed of another.

"The Nazis might have learned from the last war the impossibility of breaking men's spirit by terrorism. Instead they develop their 'lebensraum' and 'new order' by depths of frightfulness which even they have never approached before."

Japan Declares U. S. "Bluffing"

TOKYO, Oct. 25 (AP)—The assertion by Frank Knox, United States secretary of the navy, that a collision with Japan is inevitable unless she abandons her "plans of expansion" was characterized by the Japanese press today as a bit of American bluffing.

"Knox is trying to bluff Japan," declared an editorial in the newspaper Hochi. "We are carrying on Japan's decided policies regardless of bluffing by Americans."

"Knox's speech is his usual blunder of attempting to threaten Japan," said Chugai. "We have to be very careful with the United States attitude, as threatening and appealing arguments go on side by side in order to work out a clever plot."
