

# Regional Meet Held in Spokane

Conference Follows Installation of Three New Soroptimist Clubs

By auto, plane and railway, Soroptimists and Venturists went to the seventeenth annual conference of the Northwest Region of Soroptimist clubs held in Spokane, October the eighteenth and nineteenth.

Attending this convention were President Ruby Lyle, Delegates Gwendolyn Wright and Rose Poole, Vice President Coral J. Sabo, Alice Lamm, Laura Bertram, and Regional Secretary Ida M. Odell from the Soroptimist club, and President Margaret West and Dorothy Teed and Dorothy O'Sullivan from the Venture club.

Contributing to the enjoyment of the conference was the delightful fall weather which welcomed the guests from all over the northwest.

Preceding the conference, Region Director Lois Bell Sandall, accompanied by Federation President Jean Bennett chartered three new clubs, Olympia on the fifteenth, LaGrande on the sixteenth and Lewiston, Idaho on the seventeenth. Leaving the charter party late in the evening, visiting Soroptimists drove down to the conference at Spokane, arriving about two o'clock in the morning. Federation President Jean Bennett had made a promise to the northwest region some weeks ago that provided three new clubs were brought into the federation through this district, she would fly west for the installation from her home in Washington, D. C. The northwest region was able to bring in four clubs, starting with Marshfield in September, and true to her promise the president came to help in the installations.

The conference opened with a welcome from Mayor Sutherland and response from the Spokane club president, Elizabeth Murray. "What slight inconvenience has this war caused us?" asked Mrs. Paul Buck in her address on defense savings bonds, to the Toastmistress club Monday evening, October the twentieth, at the chamber of commerce. "And what have you done to help defend America? Some of us have been doing Red Cross work, but so far most of us have done nothing but talk this war. We have not considered ourselves individually responsible. We, the people, are making the same mistake France, Czechoslovakia, Holland, and Norway made."

Mrs. Buck brought out very strongly that the war may be too far off to touch us now, but that is exactly where we want to keep it. She also stressed the many great freedoms of our great nation that we take so much for granted, forgetting that our forefathers battled, sacrificed and suffered that we might enjoy them today.

Urging the purchase of defense bonds would curb undesirable inflation, she said, "In buying these bonds, therefore, you are doing your duty towards the nation, and providing for your own future and that of your loved ones."

She also brought out that "We cannot expect to participate in the benefits of a democratic government without assuming our part in its responsibilities, therefore, each bond we buy is not only helping our government, but buying a share in our America."
