FOREST FIRE FILMS MADE AT M'DONALD

LAKEVIEW — Six thousand feet of colored film were taken near the McDonald Logging company camp last Friday and Saturday by the troupe of Paramount cameramen and technicians for the movie, "Forest Ranger," which will probably be released next July.

Ground scenes were taken throughout the week with the main fire scene being staged on Saturday when three miles of slash was set off at that time. Over 1800 gallons of diesel oil were used in preparing for this fire. A back fire scene was also staged with 30 McDonald company loggers participating. One scene was also filmed of the McDonald company bulldozer.

Two planes, piloted by Bob and Dick Johnson, arrived in Lakeview from Missoula, Montana, on Friday with Frank Derry, instructor in parachute jumping who planned to make the parachute jump.

The planes returned to Missoula Sunday morning and the rest of the troupe has returned to Hollywood where the main part of the picture will be filmed. None of the main characters in the picture were on location here.

Southern Oregon To Try New Seeds

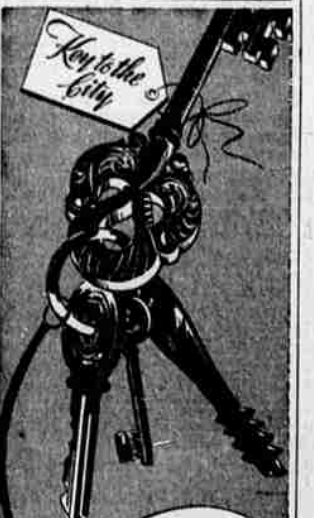

14,000 CIVILIANS SET FOR AIR TEST

PORTLAND, Oct. 27 (AP) — Army planes flew into the rugged Pacific northwest from the east coast, the middle west and the south today for extensive air maneuvers that will involve more than 14,000 civilian volunteers and a blackout of western Oregon.

In simulated bombing attacks beginning tomorrow they will test civilian and military defenses from the Canadian border to northern California.

Already three planes have crashed and three others are missing en route from Windsor Locks, Conn., to the maneuvers. All went down in the Sierra Nevada mountains of California and Nevada after becoming lost in fog. Only one death, however, has been reported.

Army officers warned that further accidents might occur in the mountainous terrain of western Oregon and Washington, especially if the weather continued cloudy.

Wage Increases in Willamette Lumber Eyed

EUGENE, Oct. 27 (AP) — Employers will discuss proposed wage increases in the Willamette valley lumber industry with a three-man federal conciliation service board tomorrow.

The board members, Ernest P. Marsh, Dean Ballard and C. W. Gillis, also plan to talk with representatives of the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers union. The unionists are asking a minimum of 75 cents an hour and a paid vacation.

Some lumbermen think the shift of the industry southward may be accelerated by defense pressure. Lumbering is expanding and plywood is like a tail on the kite to lumbering.

Peeler logs comprising only a small percentage of even the best timber stands, plywood can not develop until loggers tap the forests. In a word, plywood experts point out, it is next to impossible to take only peeler logs.

But as improved conditions increase lumbering in the more or less untouched Oregon forests—notably those of southern Oregon—plywood follows, for in these forests stand a wealth of peeler logs, heretofore out of reach.

Some also reason that diversion of cargo ships to war lanes will change the lumbering picture in a way that will hasten the growth of plywood. Heretofore it has been most economical

Oregon's Plywood Growth Outstrips Washington's

ROSEBURG, Oct. 27 (AP)—In these days of hurry-up defense industry construction, the growth of plywood in Oregon hasn't appeared sensational. But even the defense industries haven't beaten it much, Oregon plywood operators said today.

Five years ago there were two plywood factories in Oregon. Today there are nine and the Roseburg Plywood company is preparing to construct the tenth on a 600-acre site adjacent to the city.

Oregon has outstripped Washington—cradle of the plywood industry—in mill increase. A couple of years ago there were 17 plywood units in Washington to two in Oregon. Now there are 21 in Washington and nine in Oregon with a tenth about to be built. At least two of Washington's mills are just across the Columbia river and draw on Oregon for almost all their supplies.

Third Freighter Launched Sunday At Portland

PORTLAND, Oct. 27 (AP) — The third liberty freighter launched at Portland under the emergency shipbuilding program skidded into the Willamette river yesterday from ways of the Oregon Shipbuilding corporation.

Christened the William Clark, after one of the leaders of the Lewis and Clark expedition, the ship put the Portland plant ahead of others in the country, none of which have launched a third freighter.

Captain Howard L. Vickery, federal maritime commission member, praised workmen for their speed, but pleaded for even more speed in outfitting the ships that they might soon enter service.

"Captain Vickery expects this yard and the other two we are operating to deliver one ship a day, 365 ships a year, a world's record. We can do it if he can furnish us the steel and materials," Henry J. Kaiser, head of the corporation, said.
