CIO LEADER LAUDS BASIN SENTIMENT

A view that a "healthy sentiment" existed for the CIO in the Klamath basin was expressed here over the weekend by Adolph Germer, prominent labor leader who was interviewed Friday.

Germer, organizational director for the International Woodworkers of America (CIO), stopped in the city on a routine tour of various IWA headquarters in the northwest. He was to visit McCool, Calif., from here before returning to Seattle.

"The situation is very promising here in the basin," he stated. The labor leader disclosed that the IWA will intervene in a pending National Labor Relations board hearing regarding collective bargaining in Weyerhaeuser Timber company woods operations in this region. The AFL several weeks ago petitioned to be certified as the agent and it was believed that a hearing would be scheduled.

The IWA, he said, represents employees in most of the Weyerhaeuser operations in the northwest and it would "cause confusion" if a rival union should be named as bargaining agent here.

The big labor official, who has been active in the labor movement since 1894, denied recent rumors that the IWA had levied special assessments for the defense of Harry Bridges, CIO leader who was recently found guilty and whose deportation was recently recommended.

The IWA, Germer asserted, has no authority to levy assessments without a referendum of members. Such a referendum was never made, he said.

MRS. HOLLIDAY PASSES AWAY HERE SUNDAY

Mrs. Marian May Holliday, 64, for the past 20 years a resident of Klamath county, died at Klamath Valley hospital early Sunday afternoon following a brief illness. Death was attributed to a heart condition.

Mrs. Holliday was born in Prescott, Mass., November 10, 1876. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Thresher. On July 5, 1896, she became the bride of Charles Lee Holliday in San Diego, Calif. The couple came here with their children in 1912, and Mr. Holliday operated a dairy farm in Langell valley, and also the first cheese factory in the southern part of the county. Later he purchased considerable property on the Keno highway, moving on that land in 1920. He operated a large dairy herd and also ran the Holliday dairy located across from the new postoffice building on Seventh street. He died of pneumonia on March 9, 1931.

Since her husband's death, Mrs. Holliday has made her home with her son, Lee, and later resided in West Klamath. She was primarily interested in the welfare of her family but found time to do many kind and thoughtful deeds for her neighbors and friends. Mrs. Holliday donated the property for the West Klamath playground and was very much interested in children of that section. She was also active in the Parent-Teachers association and the Methodist church.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday at 1:30 p. m. from Ward's Klamath Funeral home with interment in Linkville cemetery at the side of her husband. The Rev. Victor Phillips will officiate.

3-FLAGS HIGHWAY CONVENTION HELD

ALTURAS, Calif., Oct. 27 (AP)—Next year's Three-Flags highway association convention—the twelfth—will be held at John Day, Ore., home of the organization's new president, Judge J. Allen.

The choice of the 1942 meeting place was made as the association closed its convention here, a two-day meeting devoted largely to considering methods of speeding completion of an inland highway from Banff, Canada, to Ensenada, Mexico.

The convention took the view that the route, relatively invulnerable to attack in event of war, has considerable military value, and for that reason, as well as because most of the unfinished sections are on government land, should rank high in the federal highway program.

William McGowan of Burns, Ore., was elected vice president, and Forrest Cooper of Lakeview, Ore., was retained as secretary.

A resolution endorsing the proposed exchange of Curry county, Ore., for Modoc county, Calif., was passed during the Saturday session.

Invitations Ready For Execution at Salem Thursday

SALEM, Oct. 27 (AP)—Black-bordered invitations to the execution next Thursday morning of James Harvey Thomas, 19, will be mailed by the state prison tonight to newsmen and other witnesses. Deputy Warden E. C. Halley said today.

Halley said that Thomas, convicted of slaying Douglas Smith, salesman, near Arlington, is bearing up well, although he was "pretty nervous" Saturday night. Smith, when shot by Thomas, was on his way from Idaho to Aberdeen, Wash., where his mother was on her deathbed. Smith had picked up Thomas, a hitch hiker and deserter from the navy.

Thomas, who would be the third person to die in the lethal gas chamber unless Governor Charles A. Sprague commutes the sentence to life in prison, has not yet been moved to the death cell, adjoining the lethal chamber. Persons awaiting execution usually are taken to the cell on the eve of execution, but they are taken there earlier if they show signs of breaking under the strain.

Governor Sprague has no comment other than that he is studying the case. Thomas' parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Thomas of Holyoke, Utah, are in Salem and have made several appeals to the governor for clemency.

Both remaining games on the Klamath Pelicans grid slate this fall will be tough, Coach Buck Hammer told the Quarterback club Monday noon as the downtown grid backers' organization held its weekly meeting in the Willard hotel.

Memory of last year's surprising defeat by Grants Pass was evidently in the mind of the heavyset blonde pilot as he pointed to the fact that in the last five years the Cavemen have beaten the Klamaths twice. The Pelicans meet the Cavemen in the valley Friday night.

A report by Backfield Coach Joe Peak indicated Bend, the Klamath's last opponent of the season, will be much, much tougher than they appeared early in the fall. Peak, who watched the Lava Bears absorb a 32-13 trimming by Medford last week, said the Bendmen completely outplayed the Tigers all through the first half.

He said that Medford's first 13 points were unearned and that but for the Tornado's superior physical condition, Bend could easily have won the game. Peak was particularly impressed by the work of Clovis, big Bend right end who caught all of the Bears' passes.

Hammer told Quarterbackers he differed with the ruling of Umpire Fred Flock, who disqualified George Dmetrakos in the fourth quarter of the Eureka game Friday night but left Maurer, Logger halfback, in the game after the paid had become involved in a fist fight. The Eurekaan should have been ejected also, Hammer said.

The Quarterbackers voted to sponsor a Klamath railroad jaunt to Bend on Armistice day for the season's windup and decided to finance the expenses of the KUHS band if high school authorities were willing.

Roosevelt Asks CCC, NYA Merged Under McNutt

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (AP)—President Roosevelt asked today that plans be drafted to consolidate the civilian conservation corps and the national youth administration and to transfer all CCC administrative duties from the war department to the federal security agency headed by Paul V. McNutt.

Mr. Roosevelt asked McNutt to draft plans for the consolidation "through proper legislative channels," in cooperation with Budget Director Harold D. Smith, and to "prepare and carry into effect" arrangements for transferring the administrative duties of the CCC to McNutt's agency.

Two Tornadoes Kill 14 Persons in Arkansas

MONTICELLO, Ark., Oct. 27 (AP)—At least nine persons were killed and an undetermined number injured by a tornado which struck Hamburg in extreme southeast Arkansas early today.

The dead were identified as: Mr. and Mrs. Shelby Jordan and baby.

Mr. and Mrs. Ulysses Walker. Mrs. Charley Kelly.

A Mr. Thornburg and baby. An unidentified person.

Hamburg is a rural community of about 1500 persons.

Five persons were killed and at least 15 injured earlier in the night when a tornado dipped into a rural section near Dardanelle in north central Arkansas.

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
