Dalles' Win Cuts Undefeated Preps

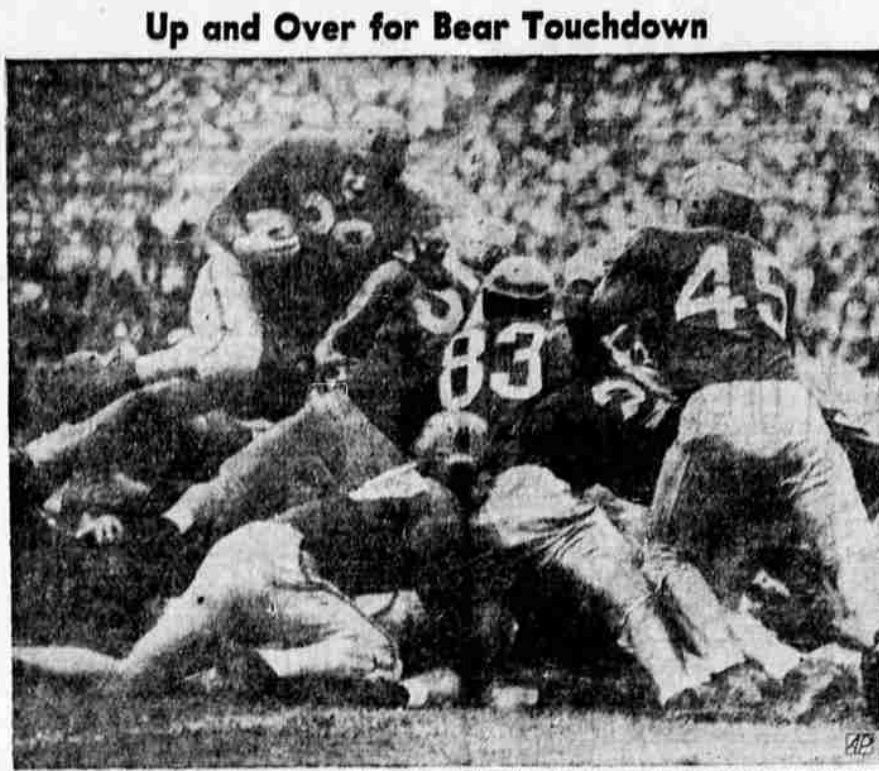
Hood River Plastered, 19-14; Mac-Hi Plasters La Grande, 22-0

Chicago Notches Fifth Straight As Green Bay Wallops Detroit

CHICAGO, Oct. 27 (AP)—The Green Bay Packers will learn next Sunday whether they've been on a wild goose chase since the National Football league season began. . . . The incomparable Don Hutson and his mates knocked over Detroit and Cleveland before bowing to the undefeated Chicago Bears in Green Bay five weeks ago. Since then the Bears and Packers have bowled over every thing in sight, marking time until their second encounter. . . . If the Bears win they will be virtually certain of representing the west in the championship playoff.

Lutheran Gridders Scalp West Washington 25-6

Pacific Lutheran College moved to within a game of the Washington intercollegiate football conference championship Saturday night, and the northwest conference learned from an outsider that it was possible to beat Willamette.

PLC took Western Washington's scalp, 25 to 6, in a little Bellingham affair that gave Marvin Tommermark a chance to

run 137 yards and pass for another 167. The PLC halfback and little all-American completed seven out of eight tosses while his high scoring mate, Marv Harshman, fullback, garnered 13 points to make his season's total 62.

PLC scored in the first minute of play on a pass from Tommermark to end Paul Polillo; but Western Washington remained in the running the rest of the first quarter, tying the score with a 55-yard march just before the end of the period. But it was all PLC from that time on. The Willamette disclosure was made by the University of Idaho, which plastered the Salem school with a 33 to 6 defeat to end the Willamette victory run at five games. The river was receding slowly.

Jennings Wins NW Golf Meet

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 27 (AP)—Lou Jennings, Portland, won the Pacific Northwest championship of champions golf tournament for the second consecutive year yesterday. . . . Jennings, who went to the quarter-finals in this year's national amateur tourney, fired a one-under-par 143 on the Portland club course, establishing a new record for the tournament, which is open to champions of all northwest clubs.

B League Schools To Pay Higher Dues

MEDFORD, Oct. 27 (AP)—B league high schools are forced to pay more than their just share in new membership dues of the Oregon High School Activities association, A. L. Beck, president of the Jackson County B League association, said Saturday.

The new dues are set at \$10 a school plus two cents a pupil to 1000 pupils and three cents a pupil thereafter, he said.

STOCK MARKET DROPS OFF ON BLUE MONDAY

NEW YORK, Oct. 27 (AP)—It was Blue Monday in the stock market today and bids were reduced in virtually all departments. . . . Chilling sentiment, brokers said, was more concern over the impact of taxes on forthcoming corporate incomes; growing labor rifts affecting the defense program, and fears the Russian war crisis was coming to a head to the disadvantage of the defending reds.

American Tobacco "B" and common broke about 10 points each after a delayed get-away of more than an hour when both were off some eight points each. These hit new lows for the year along with Reynolds "B." Liggett & Myers common and "B" also were down substantially. . . . Steels, well in the rear column during most of the session, steadied when this week's mill output was officially estimated up 2.1 points at 99.9 per cent of capacity, a new peak. . . . Sears Roebuck revived as directors voted an extra dividend of \$1.25 on top of the regular 75-cent disbursement on the common. Extra and special payments of Phillips Petroleum and Atlantic Refining brought support to these stocks.

On the offside the greater part of the proceedings, General Motors, Bethlehem, General Motors, Great Northern, Montgomery Ward, J. I. Case, Douglas Aircraft, Westinghouse, Allied Chemical, Philip Morris and Standard Oil (NJ). Transfers were around 500,000 shares. Bonds slipped with stocks and commodities skidded.
