

25 CHILDREN ENROLLED IN WPA NURSERY

Enrollment at the WPA nursery school now conducted at Mills school, has reached 25 children, according to Dave Bridge, city recreation officer. The children range from two to five years and represent low income families, Bridge stated. Two teachers and a cook are furnished by the government. The housing, heat and lights are furnished through the courtesy of J. P. Wells, superintendent of city schools, and members of the school board. Some commodities are furnished by the state welfare bureau. The Elks lodge of Klamath Falls has made a substantial donation to help purchase greens and vegetables for the children. Castberry drugs have given an eight months' supply of cod-liver oil and the Klamath Packing company and members of the American Association of University Women have also helped this worthwhile project, Bridge reported.

These boys and girls are given care from 8:30 a. m. to 3 p. m., Monday through Friday of each week. The daily schedule reads as follows: 8:30 to 9:30 a. m., arrival, inspection, drink of water, bathroom; 9 to 10 a. m., free play indoors or out; 10 a. m., cod-liver oil, tomato juice; 10:15 to 10:30 a. m., music, story telling; 10:30 to 11:30 a. m., play indoors or out; 11:30 to 11:45, bathroom, washing face and hands, rest; 11:45 to 12:30, dinner, bathroom; 12:30 p. m. to 2:15 p. m., nap; 2:15 to 3 p. m., bathroom, milk, lunch, home.

At the present time these youngsters, states Dave Bridge, are deeply in need of play equipment. Tricycles, scooters and toys of any kind will be greatly appreciated. Anyone having any used toys to donate can call the recreation office, 7112, and they will be picked up and delivered to the nursery school.
