JAYCEES CONSIDER PLANS FOR PLUNGE

The subject of the new swimming pool was brought up before the members of the junior chamber of commerce during their regular Monday night business meeting and a full explanation of the new contemplated redwood construction was given by Don Sloan. This method is being checked by members of the city recreation committee and if found to be practical, the junior chamber will lend its efforts to see that the pool is started. As pointed out in previous articles \$11,400 has been raised already towards the construction of this project and with redwood used instead of cement, that money would be sufficient to carry through the plans. Sloan pointed out that a concrete pool with all necessary bath houses and facilities would cost in the neighborhood of \$25,000, and this amount would require three or four more years to accumulate with the present budget setup.

President Joe Bally appointed the following nominating committee to make up a list of candidates for offices in the organization: past presidents, Sam Mushen, Martin Swanson, Charles Mack and Rudy Jacobs. Election of officers takes place the first Monday in December and a list of the candidates must be filed with the secretary at least twenty days before the election day. In order to cooperate with the state and national organizations and make the elections of these organizations coincide with the locals, an amendment to the Klamath chapter's charter was voted on and will be submitted to the members at a later date. This calls for the annual election to be held in May instead of in December.
