

FOOTBALL BRIEFS

SEATTLE, Oct. 28 (AP)—With five hard games—and three losses—behind them, some of the University of Washington varsity football players will get to take it a bit easier this week. Coach Jimmy Phelan indicated he would let some of the reserves see how they could fare against Montana here Saturday to give a bit of relief to some of the Huskies who have been "carrying the load."

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 28 (AP)—Coach Tex Oliver ordered another long drill on offensive blocking for the University of Oregon football team today. Oliver said the Webfoot line was outplayed decisively by the UCLA front wall in last week's game, and promised, "there will be plenty of work done this week—and how."

PULLMAN, Wash., Oct. 28 (AP)—The Washington State Cougars, who abandoned their passing attack last Saturday to defeat Oregon State, started to work today to work up a new defense for the University of Oregon Saturday at Eugene.

With his entire football squad in suits despite the pounding of Saturday's fracas, Coach Babe Hollingberry concentrated on offense with a combination of the previous passing attack by Billy Sewell and the running attack of the OSC game. /Felix Fletcher, who was knocked out in the game Saturday, was back in suit and without apparent after effects.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 28 (AP)—Oregon State college football players got down to heavy work today in preparation for Saturday's game here against University of Idaho.

The Beavers scrimmaged today after a light workout yesterday. Coach Lon Stiner said another scrimmage would be held tomorrow.

George Peters, quarterback who suffered a shoulder bruise in the defeat by Washington State last week, was on the sidelines, but Stiner said he would be ready to play Saturday. George Zellick, end, injured in an earlier game, also was expected to be in shape.

MOSCOW, Idaho, Oct. 28 (AP)—The University of Idaho Vandals, who Saturday smashed down the Willamette university's previously undefeated football team started work again today with three of the regulars on the sidelines.

Both of the starting halfbacks, Ray Davis and Earl Chandler, are out. Davis has a bad toe and Chandler a bruised shoulder. Ve-to Berillus, end, who injured his back, was the third first stringer missing.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 28 (AP)—Hoping for sunshine today to begin preparations for the California Bears' invasion, gridgers at the University of California at Los Angeles were handed some bad news. Word from the hospital was that Bob Simpson, regular right end, Stu McKenzie, first string left tackle, and Denn Strawn, who scored the winning touchdown against Oregon, would play no more this season because of injuries.

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 28 (AP)—California's football team goes through a heavy scrimmage today against the trusty Q-T formation plays of UCLA. The Bears face them at Los Angeles Saturday.

Coach Stubb Allison groomed Jack Leibold and Ray Dunn to hold down the first-string end positions against the Bruins. Regulars Stu Lewis and John Ferguson received leg injuries against USC last week, and may not be able to play Saturday.

PALO ALTO, Calif., Oct. 28 (AP)—There's no doubt now about Pete Kmetovic's back injury, which team physicians feared might keep the speedy halfback out of action for the remainder of Stanford's football schedule.

"Kmetovic is probably the healthiest kid on the squad," Dr. E. F. Roth declared today. Kmetovic was instrumental in the Indians' important victory over Washington last week. He played almost the entire game, his first action since he was hurt against Oregon State several weeks ago.

STOCK MARKET EDGES UPWARD BY FRACTIONS

NEW YORK, Oct. 28 (AP)—Stocks generally ran a faint recovery temperature in today's market and favorites edged up fractions to a point or so. Transfers were around 550,000 shares.

Corporation earnings statements and pleasing dividend declarations were the bulwarks of buying contingents, brokers said. These tended to offset the darkening labor picture, growing tax worries and lack of conviction regarding the ability of the reds to stem the Nazi Russian drive.

Selling dried up in the weak tobacco of Monday but some of these, including American Tobacco "B" and Reynolds "B," again touched new lows for the year before attracting assistance.

U. S. Steel was given a lift in anticipation of a cheerful earnings disclosure later in the day. Bethlehem and Youngstown did relatively well.

Atlantic Refining posted a new 1941 top and Standard Oil of Ind. improved. On the advancing side most of the time were Atlantic Coast Line, Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Great Northern, Goodrich, Sears Roebuck, Eastman Kodak, Glenn Martin, Savage Arms and Anaconda.

Western Union and Postal Telegraph preferred stepped forward when the senate interstate commerce committee unanimously recommended a merger of these two telegraph systems. Approval had already been given by a sub-committee.

When the initial rally failed to broaden trade, it edged away to a trickle, prices held steady until selling in the December delivery, regarded as the liquidation of holdings by uncertain and nervous owners, sent the market below yesterday's finish.

Some of the selling was attributed to a broker who frequently operates for elevator interests and was interpreted as fear that elevator storage space would shortly be at a premium.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1 cent a bushel higher than yesterday's finish, December \$1.12 1/2, May \$1.18 1/2-1.19; corn 4 1/2 to 4 3/4 higher, oats unchanged to 4 1/2 higher, soybeans 1 1/2 higher to 1 3/4 higher, rye unchanged to 1/2 lower, and lard 12-15 cents advanced.
