The builder was recently put on the Building Trades council (AFL) list for allegedly using non-union labor on the \$30,000 tourist cabin job. Mann is the operator of the Bratton establishment.

KNOX COMMENDS JUNIOR CHAMBER

In an article written exclusively for "Future," the national monthly magazine for junior chamber members, Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox thanks the members of this young men's organization for their help in offering to obtain recruits for our "First Line of Defense." Throughout the nation these groups are helping not only the navy but the army, air corp, marine corp, coast guard and civilian defense in making up their long needed list of recruits. A test recruiting advertising campaign was instituted some months ago in three midwestern states and the success of this venture has made possible the extension through 25 states with a national campaign now being worked out. Secretary Knox brought out in his article the necessity of the junior chamber members to show the young interested applicants the advantages of naval training and the enlistment procedure that is required.

A few facts that might prove interesting to those who desire a future in the United States navy are these outlined by the secretary. At present there are 262,000 enlisted men in the navy, new enlistments are needed currently at the rate of 13,000 a month and this will be stepped up to 15,000 after January 1, 1942 in order that there will be men to man the new ships that are being launched almost daily. An enlistment in the regular navy calls for a six year period with the requirement ages being 17 to 31, an applicant must have 20 teeth, his background must be sound and his general state of health good.

The requirements for enlistment in the Naval Reserve are somewhat less exacting than those of the regular navy, however Secretary Knox emphasizes that when enlisted and on active duty, there is no difference in service, treatment, pay or general consideration between those who enlist in the naval reserves and the regular navy. Length of service in the reserves is limited to the duration of the national emergency and the age requirements are from 17 to 50. In line with national junior chamber policy, the Klamath county chapter urges any young man interested in a naval career to contact the local navy recruiting officers in the post-office building.

Blonde's Diary Aids in Probe Of Slaying

FARMINGTON, Me., Oct. 29 (AP)—A diary kept by blonde Florence Buzzell, 20, whom Fred Wheeler, 50, wealthy cattleman and father of four children, is charged with slaying, aided authorities in their investigation of her fatal shooting, Attorney General Frank T. Cowan said today.

The pretty secretarial school student had filled several volumes in recent years with descriptions of "her progress in education and her experiences," the attorney stated, adding that the account was complete up to the time of her mysterious death five months ago. He said it contained the names of "numerous men."

"The state," he declared, "still is following certain information that was contained in the diaries but at the present time the contents are being kept confidential."

State Police Chief Henry Weaver said that Wheeler had financed the girl's schooling at Gates Business college in Augusta and that he apparently was jealous because another man was "wooing and winning the girl away from him."

Weaver made the statement as he ordered a three-state search that culminated a few hours later last night with the cattleman's arrest.
