DEFENSE ASKS MORE HOGS IN LAKE COUNTY

SILVER LAKE — Lake county's part in the national food for defense program for 1942 was discussed by Victor Johnson, county agent, at a meeting of producers at Silver Lake Monday. Johnson cited the expressed opinion of our national leaders that it is largely the job of the United States to feed the warring nations of Europe as well as to make available to the people of this nation ample food for better nutrition.

Ranchers of Lake county, Johnson said, have been assigned the task of producing and marketing for slaughter 15 per cent more beef than in 1941 and 20 per cent more hogs. Gardens should be increased 50 per cent. As there are prospects for a shortage of milk and eggs, production of these foods must be increased as much as possible.

The county defense board recommends slaughter of fewer sheep next year, as the number of sheep in the county is decreasing. On the other hand, the number of cattle in the county is now greater than ever before.

near Eureka, will return south soon. An aircraftman in the British Royal Air Force receives \$1.10 a day in wages.



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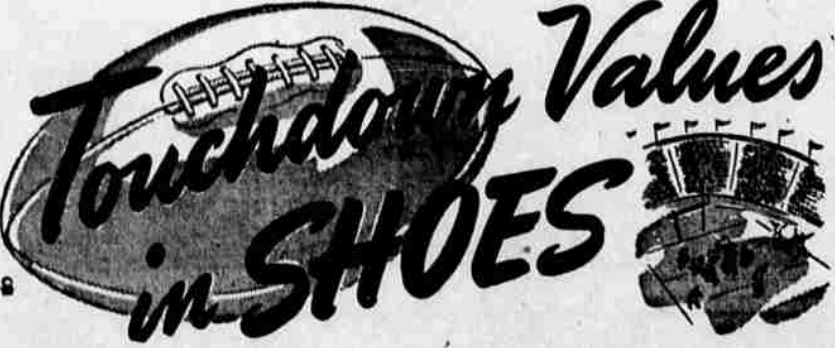
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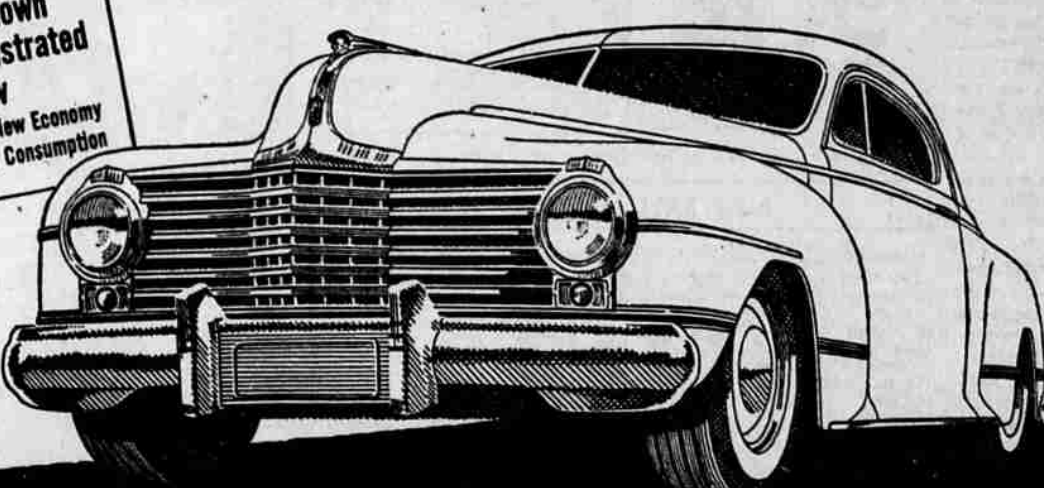
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
