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LABOR CAMPS OF SOUTHEAST TO MOVE SOON

MERRILL — Migratory labor camps in the Klamath basin will begin moving out by the end of this week with the Merrill camp to be the last to leave, it was announced this week by Charles Paddock, area supervisor for the three camps located at Merrill, Malin and Tulelake. The camp at Malin where the potato harvest was first completed will leave first with the camp at Tulelake to be taken down for shipment early next week. The Merrill unit is expected to be vacant by November 15.

Paddock stated that 2500 persons have been housed during the season with the peak registration of 1650. Tents and all other equipment will be stored for the winter to be reassembled in late April or early May in the fruit growing districts in the Willamette valley. It is expected that all three units will be returned here next fall for the potato harvest. A survey is to be made by Paddock on the possible need of a fourth unit to be located

either at Henley or Bonanza next season. Tents, lights, water, wood and surplus commodities were offered to residents of the camp, many of whom arrived here the middle of September.
