Higher Education Change

THOSE of us who know Rollo Groesbeck are well aware of his method of decision. Mr. Groesbeck was a member of the curriculum committee of the state board of higher education which moved the restoration of science courses to the University of Oregon. It is certain that he made up his mind only after definite conviction and, before that, thorough and careful study. In this community, that begets confidence in the action of the state board. Upon his return from the board meeting, Mr. Groesbeck gave an interview in which he stated frankly the reasons for the board's action and his views on the matter. The university, he said, was the only school of arts and letters in the country without degree-granting privileges in science. It had requested a restoration of these functions, and the matter had been up for four years. A decision was urged, his committee made its recommendation and the board approved. He added that the board action takes nothing from the state college and, finally, that Oregon higher education is scholastically strengthened as a result.

There will be repercussions. Already the state college has signified it will ask the return of its school of commerce, removed at the same time the university was deprived in 1932 of its degree-granting privileges in science. The board may be in for some strenuous times; there may be requests from either school which, on the basis of the latest board action, are fair and reasonable and supported by proper evidence. There will probably be others which go too far in returning to a duplication of courses and expense.

It is to be hoped the board will be able to withstand political and other "pressure" influences and make its decisions on the basis of educational evidence and proper economy.

Helping Defense Savings

KLAMATH'S life insurance men and women are deserving of a pat on the back for the effort they are putting into the defense savings program.

At a recent meeting of their organization, the life insurance people agreed to set aside definite time to work on the sale of defense bonds and stamps. They have since translated this decision into action. We know, because we have had one of them in our office for several days giving us "the works."

This work by the life insurance folks is generous and unselfish. They no doubt could spend the time, more profitably to themselves, selling insurance. In a sense, defense savings are actually competitive with insurance, another form of savings. But the country comes first, and its solvency and undiminished power are essential to the welfare of all of its institutions and individual citizens.

Similar effective work in behalf of defense savings is being done by our banks and the savings and loan associations. They are all looking at the larger picture, which calls for a generous investment by Americans in their government through defense savings.

What's Going On

NO doubt many people, like ourselves, have been not altogether clear as to just what is going on in connection with the western Oregon and Washington black-outs of the current period.

Terse and to the point is this description of the exercises by the headquarters of the second interceptor command at Seattle:

The second air force, augmented, is conducting an interceptor command exercise in Oregon and Washington during the period October 28 to November 1, inclusive. During that period there will be three seven-hour alert periods, and a continuous alert from noon October 31 until noon November 1, during which many northwest cities will undergo black-outs. Enemy invaders will be simulated by airplanes of the second bomber command, ground and air corps observers will maintain continuous watches, filter and control centers will be fully manned and pursuit squadrons will take the air to intercept "enemy" attackers. ARP organizations will function when necessary. It should be understood that this is not a two-sided maneuver, not a mock battle but a test arrangement to determine the effectiveness of the present aircraft warning service organization.

That tells the story. The Klamath area is not included. Perhaps it will be in a later test. There is much yet to be done here to develop aircraft warning service.

News Behind THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 — Repeal of the neutrality act constitutes a declaration of unlimited naval war against Germany, a war that can be carried right up to Nazi shores if the president wants.

First, at the start of this war, Mr. Roosevelt was only scouting out his offshore territorial waters. Next he extended his defense patrol to an indefinite zone further out. Then he acquired the bases from Britain and moved his fighting zone out near the mid-Atlantic under a hemisphere defense theory. Lastly, he pushed upward into Iceland. Now the senate repealer proposes to take off all the limits and let him go as far as he likes.

While this must plainly mean war, unlimited naval and air war in the Atlantic, to every conscious man in the street, officialdom here expects it to be something considerably less. Of course it all will depend upon what Mr. Roosevelt chooses to do.

Off the record officials suggest all F. D. R. wants now is to convey American merchant ships right up to British ports. Their safety while loading and unloading, is supposedly to be left to British aircraft. In fact, they say, most American merchant ships are too busy in Latin America and the Far Eastern trade to be spared for their work. Consequently they reason that the psychological effect of the new program will be greater than the practical effect.

Their expectations are further strengthened by the fact that British ship sinkings were lower in August and September than in any two previous months of the war. Obviously the British did not require this step. Indeed, no practical necessity for it has been offered in any of the debates.

Nevertheless, the legal extension of our defense zone to the shores of Britain and beyond, entails the responsibility of fighting in that new area—the extent of fighting being restricted only by the remaining law against an AEF going out of this hemisphere, and the president's undisclosed naval and air intentions.

Some mighty choice names are on that Dies committee list of supposedly subversive government officials which is being guarded more closely than Mr. Morgenthau's gold pile. To give you an idea, those who have had a quick glance at it, have noticed the mention of no less personages than:

Robert M. Lovett, secretary of the Virgin Islands.

Paul Sifton, bituminous coal commission.

Louis Bloch, member, maritime labor board.

Paul Appleby, under-secretary of agriculture.

The machinery of the government is apparently grinding to get out all against whom subversive activities can be proved, but it may grind exceedingly slow. Rumors and counter-rumors that many have already been required to walk the plank are in circulation, but the situation is far from that yet.

The Dies list of 1124 federal employees has been turned over to the FBI for the fullest investigation. The FBI has reports from other quarters mentioning many other employees and these are being investigated. The Dies list is not considered official proof.

LABOR ARGUMENTS

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore. (To the Editor) — A letter to the editor appeared in your issue of the 25th by A. A. Oyler, IWA, CIO, organizer in complaint of an article appearing in the "Central Labor Council News" of October 18.

I wrote that article. I am at a loss to understand why the CIO organizer, Oyler, did not comment on all the progress that was made for the benefit of the men working in the lumbering industry by members of the American Federation of Labor. Not one contradictory statement was made by Mr. Oyler as to the benefits that the men and women working in the lumbering industry have received as a result of the work of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers union, AFL.

I do not know personally if the IWA local 6-12 ordered a special assessment for the defense fund of this alien Bridges, who has been found a communist by a special examiner of the Department of Justice of the United States Government, and ordered deported, because of his communist activities, but I do know that men that were and are working in the Weyerhaeuser camp, that say they did. I am also told that last fall when the United States government compelled all aliens in the United States to be fingerprinted, that Mr. Oyler held a meeting in the same camp, and blasted the government of the United States for so doing.

I am at a loss to understand why Mr. Oyler wants the people to know what their constitution says or means, for if the general practice of the IWA in other districts is the same as this, and I have no doubt that it is, it is

only "a scrap of paper to them." In addition to the part Mr. Oyler quoted of the IWA, CIO, constitution, there is another clause, which says that a strike cannot be called except by a two-thirds majority, how can he explain the situation that 10 men struck the Klamath operation last spring. A less number I am told struck the Chiloquin plant this summer, and 18 men struck the Klamath Timber company, operation of 120 men, not long ago, over a dispute over their log scale, when the scale was checked it showed that the fallers had been overpaid, or that they owed the company 47c this action caused a loss of one week's work, and wages of approximately \$6000—rather an expensive action don't you think to find out that they were indebted to the company for 47c.

It is now known that the loggers strike that the IWA called in Washington last spring by Micky Orton, president of the IWA, and the executive board of the IWA, which was reprimanded by the IWA convention in Everett, Washington, just past and was not called in accordance with their constitutional provisions. And this strike by the way was called to get the same things that our union had already obtained by peaceful means. Many other strikes have been called in a like manner by the IWA causing untold suffering and hardship on their members, and gaining absolutely nothing for their members in return.

These things can't and don't happen in the "Lumber and Sawmill Workers union, AFL."

As to our constitution, or our affiliation with the "United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America." We have nothing to apologize for.

Section 15 (E) of the general executive board shall have the power to AUTHORIZE strikes in conformity with the constitution and laws of the brotherhood. In the past the IWA has said that the word authorize means order, and I presume this is the idea that the IWA is trying to get

over now. They evidently don't understand the meaning of the word authorize, or is it an intentional mis-statement?

When a local under our international wants to strike and have complied with the constitution the strike can then be authorized or approved by the executive board, and then the strikers receive \$1.50 a day strike benefit.
