The dramatic story is entitled "40,000 Lives," and tells of a father whose bad example as a driver is to blame when his son, a high school student, is involved in a tragic accident. Robinson, as Steve Wilson, managing editor of the Illustrated Press, takes a hand in the effort to locate the unidentified driver and runs into several emotional experiences.

The "Big Town" show has a valuable safety lesson for adults and teen-age drivers, according to the council, and is expected to help greatly in the emergency safety campaign recently inaugurated by President Roosevelt.

TRAFFIC LIGHT WORK SET TO BEGIN MONDAY

With good weather and a bit of luck, Klamath Falls should see the last step toward the completion of the traffic signals underway by Monday, according to information received from City Engineer E. A. Thomas.

The 28 steel posts, 24 feet long, should arrive Saturday, November 1, and the contractors, Trowbridge and Flynn of Medford, stated work will start "immediately" upon arrival of the posts from the Union Metal company in Clinton, O.

The system will not be in use until all work is completed and the central control system in operation in the police department of the city hall. The system will be controlled by the officer on duty, it was learned. In this way when the city fire truck or ambulances find it necessary to use Main street, the signals will automatically control the traffic during the passing of the vehicles.

KLAMATH CITY JAIL PROBLEM SOLUTION NEAR

Klamath Falls' city jail problem, which has hovered over the heads of several sets of councilmen and various mayors, may be solved within a few months if plans now being drawn up by City Engineer E. A. Thomas are approved by the council and voting public, it was learned here Wednesday.

Thomas and City Building Inspector Harold Franey, have plans to submit to the council within a few weeks after an estimate on the proposed work is obtained from building contractors.

Present plans call for the entire basement space to be used as a jail, and the space formerly allotted to the city fire department, made into rooms for other offices now upstairs and in the basement of the city hall.

In the new unused area will go the city engineer's office, reception room, drafting room and vault, the offices for building, sanitary and meat and milk inspectors, and a hallway.

If the plan now being worked out by Thomas proves too expensive for the tastes of the city budget, the hopes of using the city hall for better jail facilities will have to be abandoned and other plans submitted to the voters. Upon approval of the council, it is quite likely the vote will be called shortly after the first of the year, Thomas stated.
