PRICE SHIFTS
AGAIN UPSET
STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, Oct. 30 (AP)—Contradictory price shifts again left the stock market with a ragged appearance in today's session. Transfers were around 550,000 shares.

Westinghouse, which not long ago was off about 30 points from the year's best, came back about 2 as opinion gathered headway this bellwether may have been oversold.

American Tobacco Common and "B" edged to new lows for the year before attracting bidders. Commonwealth Edison and General Electric also touched bottom for 1941.

Backward shares included Chrysler, American Can, DuPont, Johns-Manville, International Harvester, Union Carbide, American Telephone, Woolworth, Sears Roebuck, General Motors, Glenn Martin, Texas Corp., and Eastman Kodak.

US Steel, Bethlehem, Youngs town Steel, Inland Steel were up a shade at times. Others in the resistant class were Dow Chemical, Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Southern Railway, J. I. Case, Pepsi-Cola and Certain-Ted Preferred. Bonds were uneven.

WHEAT RETREATS
AFTER EARLY GAIN

CHICAGO, Oct. 30 (AP)—After trying to extend their recent recovery with early gains of about a cent a bushel, wheat prices retreated below previous closing levels today as the market bogged down due to late profit taking.

Strength during the forepart of the session was attributed to buying of mills and traders covering previous short sales and was associated partly with gains a cent in corn and about three cents in soybeans. Overnight rains with more wet weather forecast for Illinois and Indiana, heart of the soybean belt as well as important corn area, were expected to hold up the already late harvest of many fields. There were reports from central Illinois that weather is damaging beans.

Wheat closed 1-1/2 lower than yesterday, December \$1.14 1/4, 1-1/4; May \$1.19 1/4; corn 1-1/2 higher; December 77-77 1/2, May 83-1/2; oats 1-1/2 up; rye unchanged and soybeans 1-1/2 higher.
