



Texas Squads Pace Nation in Figures

Texas U Leads Offense, Texas A & M Defense, Texas Mines Passing

SEATTLE, Oct. 30 (UP)—The Lone Star state was virtually alone, statistically speaking, at the forefront of the nation's collegiate football teams today.

The American football statistical bureau's weekly report showed:

University of Texas' steamroller attack at the head of total yardage figures with an average gain of 381.8 yards per game.

Texas A. & M. with the best team defense, yielding only 87 yards per game.

Texas Mines, led by Owen Price, was atop the team punting averages with an average of 42.39 yards.

Other teams gaining national recognition were Notre Dame in rushing defense, Pennsylvania in rushing offense, Detroit in forward-passing offense and Purdue in passing defense.

Coach Frank Leahy's Irish have held opponents to 35.8 yards per game on the ground in five games.

By completing 15 out of 29 passes against Arkansas, Detroit maintained passing domination by running their total to 71 completions for 1003 yards.

First 10 teams in total offense, which combines rushing and passing, are:

Texas, 381.8 yards per game; Detroit, 374.4; Northwestern, 373.0; Fordham, 364.0; Clemson, 363.6; Pennsylvania, 362.3; Arizona, 353.4; Syracuse, 350.6; Georgia, 346.6; Tulane, 346.0.

SEATTLE, Oct. 30 (AP)—Old "open date" threw Bill Dudley of Virginia for a loss last Saturday, and Sophomore Elmer Madarik of Detroit wrestled individual total offensive football ground gaining honors to put an end to Dudley's three-week reign.

Madarik, a stellar forward passer, compiled 611 aerial yards and 301 on the ground for a total offensive figure of 912 yards in 142 plays for five games.

Dudley's total offensive figure still stands at 825 yards, consisting of 376 rushing and 449 passing. He's totaled 127 plays in five games.

American football statistical bureau figures showed Johnny Grigas of Holy Cross continuing as the top rusher with 573 ground yards in five games. He's followed by Frank Sinkwich of Georgia, the boy with the broken jaw, who's broken the opposing line for 538 yards.

Owen Price of Texas Mines retained his forward passing lead with 48 completions out of 103 attempts for 481 yards. The bureau rates the passers on completions. Most passing yards have been made by Madarik—611. Highest completion percentage—739 belongs to Jimmy Richardson of Marquette who completed 34 of 46. Bill Sewell of Washington State, last year's leader, has had 11 interceptions to assume that dubious honor.

Price also leads the punters, with a 44.59 average, and seems headed for national punting leadership the second straight year. Howard Keating of Detroit has hauled in 20 of Madarik's passes for 236 yards to lead the pass receivers.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30 (UP)—The major teams may be stumbling over one another out on the Pacific slopes but tucked away in the fastnesses of Washington there's an eleven that stands out over its own company like Mount Rainier over a row of foothills.

Meet Pacific Lutheran, the United Press "Little Giant" for this week, unbeaten for two years and boasting in "Terrible Tommy" Tommervik a back that may be the Stanford or Washington could use.

The best tip-off on the Lutes' strength comes from the Gonzaga Bulldogs, who played a big-league schedule last season with fair results and consented to a post-season engagement with Pacific Lutheran. The little team from Parkland, Wash., won 16 to 13, and if Gonzaga needed convincing this season when Lutheran opened its campaign with a 26-13 victory over the same team. Since then Coach Clifford Olson's team has bowled over four other teams and appears well on the way to another perfect season and undisputed championship of small college football in the far west.

Chicago U Asked for Grid Return

Petitions Suggest Bears, Northwestern as Substitute Alma Maters

CHICAGO, Oct. 30 (AP)—The University of Chicago, where great football teams once abode but minus intercollegiate football the past two years, was asked today to return the spirit of grid wars to the campus by adopting a team—preferably the Chicago Bears, national professional champions.

In dormitories and eating places, students were circulating petitions suggesting the Bears as worthy successors to Maroon teams of old, while in a separate move the student magazine "Pulse" offered Northwestern as a suitable adopted alma mater.

Chicago has had no varsity grid team since the trustees in 1939 decided to abandon intercollegiate football, a move approved by President Robert Maynard Hutchins.

Spectacle
The "Pulse" sports editor, Demarest Polachek, declared "members of the university like the spectacle, the thrill of football."

"But, in the same breath, sensible members of the university know full well that to hope for return of the autumn sport in the accepted sense of the word is foolish as long as President Hutchins and the board of trustees x x control policy x x x."

"Remedy there may be: if students express desire strongly enough, reduced rates on season passes might be forthcoming from other schools, such as Northwestern, logical choice as adopted alma mater, where games are big, well-played, colorful enough to satisfy the most rabid follower of the pigskin."

The petitions were offered by five students—William Durka of Waukegan, Ill.; Dick Hill of North Bend, Wash.; Richard Mershon of Fort Madison, Iowa; Dave Heller of Centralia, Ill.; and Gordon Tullock of Rockford, Ill., who declared:

"The Bears would undoubtedly be a winning team, and although we have time for only three more games this season, we could still win the Big Ten championship by whipping Minnesota, Michigan and Northwestern. The Bears could play these games Saturday as a warmup to their Sunday games."

Rich Golfing Tour Carded For Winter

NEW YORK, Oct. 30 (AP)—A winter golfing tour that promises to be the richest and most extensive in the history of the Professional Golfers' association was outlined today by Fred Corcoran, tournament manager of the PGA.

More than \$100,000 in prizes will be offered the nation's top-ranking pros with the \$10,000 Miami, Fla., open Dec. 11-14 and the \$10,000 Los Angeles open Jan. 9-12 standing out.

At least three new tournaments are on tap. One, a \$5000 open at Harlingen, Tex., Dec. 20-22, will ring down the curtain on professional golf's 1941 campaign during which an all-time high of \$200,000 in stakes was reached.

The western open championship again will be played on the winter swing, this time at Phoenix, Ariz., Feb. 6-8.

The tour will begin with the mid-south open at Pinehurst and close a week later than usual with the ninth annual masters' invitation affair at Augusta, Ga., April 9-12.

November Ends State Big Game Hunting; Elk Opens Saturday

November will bring down the final curtain on 1941 big game hunting in Oregon, the Oregon State game commission pointed out Thursday.

The eastern Oregon elk season opens November 1 and continues through November 16, while bear hunting will be in order during the entire month of November. Trapping of bear is unlawful this year, according to the commission.

Because of heavy rains in the elk area, chains will be necessary on cars in 50 per cent or more of the area, according to reports of field men employed by the game commission. Hunters should also be equipped with shovels.

Elk are generally running in large herds according to reports and, while very abundant in all areas, are widely scattered. Elk are using the most dense thickets they can find, and because forage is abundant, they are not forced out into openings and meadows to feed.

One elk of either sex is the bag limit this year. A special elk tag for residents costs \$5 and is required in addition to the regular hunting license. Out-of-state hunters must pay \$15 for a non-resident hunting license and \$25 for a non-resident elk tag.

All hunters must check in at stations before entering the elk areas and must also check out, regardless of whether or not they have bagged an elk. It is necessary to retain the checkout slip as long as any part of the elk carcass is in possession.

Game regulations make it unlawful to hunt elk with guns smaller than 30 calibre except, when using cartridges with bullets of not less than 1400 foot pounds energy at 100 yards distance, or weighing not less than 150 grains or with any other than long bows and broadhead hunting arrows.

Game department officials warn hunters that elk carcasses must be cared for properly. To do this, the carcass should be bled and the entrails removed immediately after the elk has been killed, then should be left hanging until thoroughly cool. Under no circumstances should an elk carcass be transported until the cooling-out process has been completed.

Any part of the elk, such as the head, hide, or pieces of meat that does not have the elk tag attached, must be tagged separately with a metal tag which is obtainable at checking stations for five cents each.

Checking stations will be maintained from October 30 to November 18 at La Grande, Enterprise, Pendleton, Ukiah, Pilot Rock, Heppner, Milton, Long Creek, Dale, North Powder, Sumpter, Starkey, Seneca, John Day, Baker, Blue Mountain, Troy, Juntura, Drewsey, Brunson, Halfway, Ironsides, Elgin, Spray, Fossil and Meacham. These stations will be open from 7 a. m. to 9 p. m. Part-time stations will be maintained at Unity and Prairie City.
