

Roundup Indicates Deer Kill Lighter

Animals Heavier Than Year Ago; Wildfowl Hunting Same as 1940

Topped by a 263-pound buck, according to the best record available, the 1941 deer season in the Klamath country Thursday was looked back upon as bringing a slightly smaller kill than that of a year ago. Deer, however, were heavier, on the average, than those slain in 1940.

Largest buck entered in any of the numerous local contests was a 252 1/2-pounder shot by Robert Summers of Chiloquin on Buck creek. The animal won first prize in the Southern Oregon hardware contest.

Killer of the 263-pound deer was not known. The animal was turned into the Klamath Falls creamery for dressing but no records were kept. Lee Carter, rate clerk at the Southern Pacific depot, bagged a 254-pounder at Dog lake during the last week of the season.

John A. Smith of Sprague River captured the Gun Store prize for the largest deer foot. He got his buck south of Bly. Creamery officials reported that Klamath hunters in the early weeks of the season were bringing in smaller animals. Cold and stormy weather in the season's waning days, however, brought out the big ones from inaccessible areas.

Meanwhile, scattergunners in the Klamath region were reported to be finding wildfowl hunting on a par with last season. Geese were coming in this week but not in large numbers and the hunters were finding them lean from the long lean over the north. Game veterans, however, expected that the geese would fatten on Klamath grain in the next few weeks and improve hunters' bags.

Pheasant hunting is in the main successful, say reports. Shooting in planted areas is excellent, according to hunters.

Prep Grid Elevens Play in Blackouts

Mac-Hi-The Dalles Encounter Tops State Slate; Pendleton Meets Baker

In blackout and bomb attacks Oregon high school football teams enter the final month of play this week-end, and at least one more major eleven will drop from the undefeated and untied ranks.

The bomb attacks by army planes on maneuvers will be imaginary, but the western Oregon blackout will be real. Some teams have scheduled night games earlier than usual, but others will have to turn out the lights for 15 minutes in the last half. Scrimmage is to halt.

The top game, however, will be an afternoon affair at Milwaukie-Freshwater, pitting undefeated McLoughlin high and The Dalles.

The teams are rated even, with Mac high relying on its unorthodox "triple wingback" formation and the fleetness of its backs. The Dalles will depend on the ruggedness of its 11 starters, who played the whole game against Hood River last week, winning, 19 to 14.

That will be only one of eastern Oregon's prize games. Another will send Pendleton, runner-up to Mac high in the Blue mountain conference, to Baker, in an attempt to repeat an earlier 21-19 victory.

Western Oregon will have three undefeated, untied teams in action. Myrtle Point's Bobcats will engage Bandon, a team they defeated, 26 to 13, previously. Vernonia will attempt to remain unscored on against Hill Military of Portland, and Newport, whose perfect record was unnoted previously, will face its stiffest challenge so far this season at Reedsport.

In southern Oregon unbeaten Medford will journey to Eureka, Calif., heavily favored to win. Klamath Falls, beaten by Medford, trimmed Eureka last week. The Klamath team will end its southern Oregon conference play at Grants Pass. Ashland, another once-defeated squad, will play host to Yreka, Calif.

Corvallis, the no name league leader, will play one of the weakest Milwaukie teams in years, and Eugene will go to Oregon City in another league game.

Bend travels to Salem for its traditional contest, and Albany meets its perennial foe, Lebanon. Hood River will play at Marshfield and Roseburg at Cottage Grove.

TAKES LATERAL
DETROIT, Mich. — Ken Beeher, Syracuse center, faces his own backs, but Vince Banonis of Detroit is a center who takes a lateral off a pass play. Captain Banonis seems likely to get his name in the scoring column.

Against Indiana, the 210-pound Banonis ran 40 yards to set up a touchdown.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 30 (P) — In the United States airplanes fly at 8000 feet, but Mexico is starting its amateur golf championship today at 8000 feet altitude and with U. S. Amateur Champion Bud Ward already the leading threat.

Ward shot a 67, only one above the course record, in a practice round over the course which lies high above Mexico City.
