

NEW MOULDING MILL DOUBLES CAPACITY HERE

A 100 per cent increase in the production capacity of the Conifer Lumber company, Klamath's new lumber mill, was disclosed Friday by C. W. Huson, manager of the Klamath river plant. The moulding concern, which began operations last summer with a 10,000 square-foot floor space, has just completed the construction of an addition which will provide a total of 22,000 square feet of interior mill area. Installation of a third new moulder, a second rip saw and another resaw machine will be finished by the end of next week, Huson said. Approximately 20 men will be added to the existing payroll of over 40 employees when operation in the new unit is begun. Loading and shipping facilities have been increased with the laying of a 200-foot railroad spur extension to the 350-foot piece constructed last spring, Huson revealed. Figures on the cost of the enlargement program were not available.

CAPITAL ACTIVITY DESCRIBED IN TALK

Impressions of Washington were given to Rotarians Friday noon by Frank Jenkins, Herald and News publisher. Jenkins told of the tremendous activity in the nation's capital, which he recently visited. "It is truly the county seat of America," the publisher said. Lee Jacobs, co-chairman of the city-wide airbase committee, presided as chairman of the day and as a preliminary to Jenkins' talk told of the work of that committee in the past two months. Jenkins expressed the opinion, on the basis of observation in Washington, that strategic considerations would rule in the location of sites for army defense activities. Lloyd Prock and Lee Hendricks, new members of the Rotary club, were introduced.

RUSSIANS RETREAT IN CRIMEA, CLAIM

have attacked the ports of Yevpatoriya, on the west coast of the Crimea, and Kerch, on the east coast. In waters around the peninsula five soviet merchant ships aggregating 13,000 tons were reported sunk. Resolute soviet defense of Moscow, as well as of Leningrad, was acknowledged by German military sources.

MOSCOW, Oct. 31 (P)—The Tass agency declared today that the German onslaught against the defenses of Moscow had dwindled away to attacks by small detachments except on the northwest flank, where the nazis continued a strong offensive with infantry and tanks. Even there, the news agency reported in a broadcast, heavy red army fire and repeated counter attacks checked the German advance. Along Moscow's western and southwestern fronts Gen. Gregory K. Zhukov's forces were said not only to have held their defense positions but in some salients to have improved them. Behind the German lines another Russian guerrilla leader, known only as "The Raven" was added to the lists of swift-striking raiders whose steadily increasing operations were described by the Russians as striking terror to scattered German garrisons and wrecking supply stations and lines of communication. "The Raven" and his band, Tass reported, swarmed into one German-garrisoned town near Kirovograd, wiped out a German force of 75 men and slipped away as quickly as they struck, with captured German guns and munitions to help in their next attack.

they would be rehired regardless of past difficulties. The tension broke and cheers resounded. Loren J. Houser, eastern regional director of the CIO's United Automobile Workers of America, aviation division, said his men were ready for work and full cooperation with the army. Robert E. Fowler, company public relations director, said he and President F. Leroy Hill would report to see whether they would be rehired. With 700 workers, the plant is comparatively small in the New Jersey industrial picture. But its products are essential for Martin bombers, Brewster dive-bombers, Airacobra fighters and other warcraft. It holds \$5,000,000 in defense contracts. A clash between returning CIO strikers and non-union workers precipitated the president's action, the third time the federal government has taken over production stopped or threatened by labor disputes.

that we cast aside all pretense, declare war and go after Hitler. PLENTY of pressure is being brought on our government to do that. So far, the bulk of this pressure is coming from the outside. As long as it comes ONLY from the outside, it may be that it will be resisted.

Especially if the people of the United States indicate their understanding that we are committed to do a job and are grimly determined to go through with it, regardless of provocation to do something more drastic. But if our own people get excited and emotional and demand ALL-OUT war, as they did in 1917, there will be all-out war.

That is about the way the situation stands.

Big-Scale Bomber "Attack" Slated In Western Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 31 (P)—Massed flights of "enemy" bombers will converge on this blacked-out city tonight in a major test of coordinated military and civil aerial defense under simulated war-time conditions. As night falls, the Pacific northwest maneuvers will shift their emphasis from western Washington to western Oregon. Invading bombers will find lights extinguished, trains, buses and automotive travel halted from the Cascade mountains to the sea.

And, most important perhaps, more than 6000 spotters will phone their observations to filter centers for relay to Portland where the course of the bombers will be traced.

At 10 p. m. the invasion forces will converge on Portland. All lights in the city are to be out, with 7000 women assigned to the task of warning householders where lights show. The fire fighting force will be augmented by 1142 civilian auxiliaries who have been in training for several months. The police force will be strengthened by 500 World War veteran volunteers, 2500 Boy Scouts and 165 mounted police reserves.

Then, as the bombers roar in, dropping flares, searchlights from a score of vantage points will pierce the sky. Anti-aircraft guns will blaze and pursuit planes, lurking high above, will dive screaming on the attackers. The blackout will last about 15 minutes at the various cities to have lesser attacks before the 10 p. m. blow at Portland.

BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, Oct. 31 (AP)—There was a limited demand today for domestic wools in Boston. Occasional sales of graded fine territory wools were made at mostly \$1.08-1.10, scoured basis, for good French combing wools. Fine combing Ohio delaine brought \$1.10-1.13, scoured basis, of 44-45 cents, in the grease, for wools shrinking around 59 to 60 per cent. Sales of graded quarter blood combing territory wools were made in limited volume at 90-92 cents, scoured basis.

The navy said it would not release a list of officers and men on the destroyer until information regarding their fate had been obtained, saying this might take two or three days or longer. The Reuben James was described as the navy's an O-type flush deck destroyer said to be similar to the type traded to Great Britain.

Commissioned September 34, 1920, the vessel was built by the New York Shipbuilding company and carried four 4-inch naval rifles and a battery of anti-aircraft guns.

She was the third American warship to be fired at and the second to be hit by a torpedo since President Roosevelt ordered the navy last month to pursue a policy of "shoot on sight" in taking all steps necessary to protect munitions shipments from the United States to England.

First target of a torpedo in the north Atlantic was the destroyer Greer, one of the old type ships, 50 of which were traded to Britain a year ago.

Two weeks ago today, October 17, the destroyer Kearny, engaged in a night battle against a German submarine wolfpack which had attacked a convoy southwest of Iceland, was hit amidship by a torpedo and 11 American seamen were killed and 10 wounded.

The Kearny, a much larger vessel than the Reuben James, had a displacement of 1630 tons and carried a crew of about 190 officers and men. She was of much sturdier construction than the Reuben James having been completed and put into service only last year.

The Reuben James' commander, Lieutenant Commander Edwards, was described by the navy department as a native of San Saba, Tex. He was 35 years old and the navy said his permanent home was listed as San Saba.

SINKING AROUSES CONGRESS LEADERS

ter Senator Brooks (R-Ill.) had concluded a speech in opposition to the pending legislation.

Maloney declined to announce his own position on the bill, which would permit arming merchant ships and allow them to travel anywhere, but said that several senators who wished to make speeches were not present today and should be given an opportunity to speak. O'Daniel made his announcement after Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) of the foreign relations committee had informed the senate solemnly of the sinking of the United States destroyer Reuben James last night west of Iceland.

Interrupting senate debate on the pending legislation, O'Daniel said he thought the "psychological moment" had arrived for the senate to give its decision on proposed changes in the act.

"I am wondering if the men aboard that ship took the time to debate for days and days the question whether or not this nation was neutral," O'Daniel said. "It seems to me the psychological moment has arrived for the senate to seriously consider announcing its decision."

Senator Brooks (R-Ill.), asserted in the debate that the proposed revision would send the nation "full speed ahead, shooting its way into active participation in the second world war."

Administration leaders earlier had set Wednesday as the deadline for senate action on revising the act.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (P)—The sinking of the U. S. destroyer Reuben James brought congressional expressions today that the incident would lead the nation closer to an all-out war with Germany and would hasten senate action on legislation revising the neutrality act.

One opponent of administration foreign policy, Senator Gillette (D-Iowa), told reporters that "America will protect her seamen, no matter what mission they are on."

Repeal Asked
Remarking that the navy had announced the Reuben James was on convoy duty west of Iceland when a torpedo sent it to the bottom, Gillette added that "It does not matter how unwise may have been the vessel's duty the fact remains that the sailors were obeying their government's orders and they thus were justified in feeling that America should give them every precaution."

Senator Bridges (R-N.H.), an advocate of outright repeal of the neutrality law, said that "This is just one more indication that the United States must stand up for its rights. We cannot afford to be driven from the seas."

Bridges and Senator Gurney

(R.S. D.), said the incident demonstrated that the neutrality statute should be repealed, instead of amended. "This clinches the argument," Gurney declared. Senator Taft (D-Ohio), said that the sinking was an "inevitable result of a shooting war. Sinkings of the U. S. vessels can be expected if on convoy duty."

Senator Lucas (D-Ill.), said the incident was "further proof of a well designed Hitler scheme and terrorist plan to drive all naval and merchant vessels, regardless of nationality, off the Atlantic ship lanes."

Senator Nye (R-N.D.), said "You can't walk into a bar room brawl and hope to stay out of the fight. That's what the administration's policy contemplates."
