

Joan Horton Bride In Church Ceremony

Attractive Maid Weds Lawrence Eddy Hardman
On Sunday Afternoon at Two o'Clock

One of the loveliest brides of October was Miss Joan Barbara Horton, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence John Horton of Poe Valley, whose marriage to Mr. Lawrence Eddy Hardman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Hardman of Tulelake, took place at two o'clock Sunday afternoon in the First Methodist church. The Rev. Hugh Bronson read the service in the presence of two hundred and fifty guests.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, was charming in traditional white satin, her gown fashioned with a V neckline, long snug sleeves ending in a point of the hand, and a full skirt with a sweeping train. Her white illusion net veil edged with wide lace fell from a coronet of seed pearls and she carried a shower bouquet of gardenias and bouvardia centered with two hybrid orchids.

Just before the ceremony Miss Norma Selverson of Astoria, at the piano accompanied Miss Margaret Bell of Yakima, Washington, who sang, "At Dawning," and "Because." Miss Selverson also played Lohengrin's procession, and Mendelssohn's recessional.

Vows were exchanged before a lovely bank of white chrysanthemums, and small pom-pom chrysanthemums. The many white candles were lighted just before the ceremony by the bride's brother, Mr. John C. Horton.

The matron of honor was Mrs. Jack Chapman of Klamath Falls. She wore a gold colored taffeta frock made with a deep net yoke, brief puffed sleeves and full floor length skirt. She carried an arm bouquet of bright gold bronze chrysanthemums.

Mrs. Kenneth Roberts of Berkeley, California, Mrs. Gilbert Osborne of Tulelake, Miss Beverly Beier and Miss Bonita Bonner, both of Portland, were charming bridesmaids. They wore identical frocks of delphinium blue velvet basques with full floor length taffeta skirts of the same blue, the hems banded with the velvet. They carried large arm bouquets of oakleaf chrysanthemums with bands of the smaller oakleaf chrysanthemums in their hair.

Mr. Gilbert Osborne of Tulelake was the best man and ushers were Mr. John C. Horton, brother of the bride, and Mr. Murrel Long of Macdoel and Mrs. Jack Chapman of Klamath Falls, fraternity brothers of the groom.

Immediately after the ceremony a reception was held in the church parlors. The young couple received before the fireplace which was banked with large white chrysanthemums. The bride's table was covered with a lovely lace cloth made by her grandmother. Her square cake was beautifully decorated and, atop the four tiers a white wedding bell was surrounded by lilies-of-the-valley with a garland of bouvardia and adiantum at the base. The bride cut the first piece of cake which was later served by her mother.

Presiding at the coffee table, centered with white chrysanthemums flanked on either side by tall white candles, also used on the bride's table, were Mrs. C. J. Hansen of Portland and Miss Jane Hansen of Medford, aunts of the bride, and Mrs. J. C. Heyting of Portland, aunt of the groom.

Assisting about the room were five sorority sisters of the bride, Miss Francis Balin, Mrs. Murrel Long, Miss Genevieve Murray, Miss Norma Selverson, and Miss Margaret Bell.

The bride's mother was attractive in a stone blue crepe gown with gold beading on the pockets, a matching hat and brown accessories. Her corsage was of gardenias and bouvardia. The groom's mother wore black crepe with black accessories and a similar corsage.

Immediately after the reception the young couple left by motor for Los Angeles, planning to return over the coast highway to Corvallis where they will be the guests of school friends for the homecoming game, November the eighth. Upon their return they will make their home on Mr. Hardman's ranch near Tulelake. For traveling the bride wore a gray wool costume suit, a large draped off-the-face hat of black, and a corsage of orchids.

Mrs. Hardman is a popular member of the younger group and was widely feted before her marriage. She was graduated from Tulelake high school, spent one year at the University of California at Berkeley, and three years at Oregon State college, Corvallis, where she was affiliated with Alpha Gamma Delta.
