Soroptimists Hear of Convention Held at Spokane

Interesting reports of the Venture club convention held in Spokane October the eighteenth and nineteenth were given to the members of the Soroptimist club at Thursday's luncheon when Margaret West, president of the local Venture club, and Dorothy O'Sullivan, past president, were guest speakers of the day. Introducing the speakers was Mrs. Rita Whisenant, organizer of the Venture club.

Following the reports Mrs. Coral Sabo gave a brief outline of the defense work accomplished by the Soroptimist club forming the Northwest region, the contribution of the Klamath Falls club to this cause being the purchase of a defense bond.

Outstanding in the Venture club reports given at the convention was that of the local club whose membership has increased over 25 per cent. Among the things accomplished since organization is work for the Red Cross, contributions to the fund for entertainment of the enlisted men, an elaborate tea for the purpose of raising convention funds, outstanding programs of civic interest, cooperation with other service clubs of the city, and furnishing hostesses for the annual dinner of the Santa Claus clan.

Mrs. Sophia Kenoff called the attention of the Soroptimists to the fact that letters or cards sent to their sister club of Brighton-Hove, England would have to be sent within the next few weeks in order to reach there by the holiday season. This brave club situated on the southern shore in the line of bomber flight carries cheerfully on, week by week. One of their members was speeding on her way to Hong Kong recently when she and her husband departed to take up appointments as two of the six war-tax assessors in that city. Inasmuch as the only white women allowed in Hong Kong are nurses and doctors, Mrs. Mathias may have to take a nursing course upon her arrival there.

An interesting event in the life of this English club was the privilege on May the twenty-seventh of viewing a fine collection of murals at the Brighton, Hove and Sussex grammar school before they were boarded up for the "duration," this work being delayed two days in order that the Soroptimists might see the panels for the last time until after the war. The paintings are nine in number and have been presented to the school by "Old Boys" and other friends.

This sister club of Klamath Falls Soroptimists has adopted two good causes as its own for the year, two collection boxes being present at each meeting, one for the Turner Home Extension, (for aged men and women), the other for the Guide Dogs for the Blind association. The thought of Soroptimists in this disturbed country giving of their limited means so generously gives one pause. Sacrifice is taken so casually there.

The Soroptimist club of Klamath Falls voted to purchase dolls to swell the toy donations of the local firemen at Christmas time.

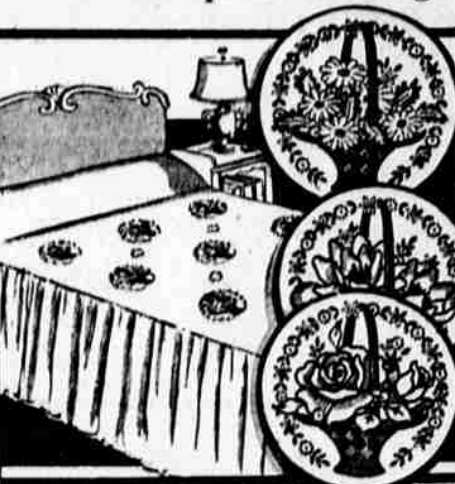

AP Manager Also Composes Songs

NEW YORK, Nov. 1 (Special News Service)—Kent Cooper, composer of "Dixie Girl," song of the south, didn't stop there. His musical talent, which he looks upon only as a hobby, has led him into other fields of tune-fu accomplishment.

Broadcast premiere at 8 o'clock Friday night of "Sunset," the second published composition of the general manager of the Associated Press offered a concrete demonstration. A ballad, it tells the story of the American home at the end of the long day when the wife's loved one returns.

After "Dixie Girl," which like "Sunset" was written several years ago but never published, was introduced by Dr. Frank Black in the Lucille Manners weekly concert, it received attention that put it into the dance hit class. Dr. Black thinks "Sunset" has all the qualifications of a tune that will live because of its particular melodic appeal.

The premiere of "Sunset" also is to come in the Lucille Manners program with Dr. Black directing the orchestra, aided by the vocal ensemble, Miss Manners, soprano, and Ross Graham, baritone. The broadcast is on the NBC-Red network.

DEFENSE FOOD SURVEY HELD AT SPRAGUE

SPRAGUE RIVER — Officials of the Klamath Indian agency and the Klamath division of the agricultural defense program spent Thursday conducting a survey of Sprague River and Beatty farmers. The meeting held in the Sprague River school was directed by H. E. O'Hara and Clyde James of the Agency and Boyd Bruner and Donald P. Hotchkiss of the agricultural department.

Farmers of the entire east end of the reservation were notified to appear at this meeting to work out a program that would increase the number of food crops for 1942. As each farmer was interviewed he was asked the amount of his 1941 crops and the possibilities for a noticeable increase for the coming year.

Although Sprague River is primarily a cattle country it was revealed by the board that there would be a large increase in the amount of dairy products, poultry, eggs, garden products and hay raised in the future. The addition of irrigation water to the land in this area results in heavy production of the crops that are found in other parts of the Klamath basin. Although the season is somewhat shorter here than in other areas many common crops do well.

Those farmers that were not contacted in this meeting will be contacted individually in the near future. Wednesday the farmers of the north end of the reservation were contacted. Both white and Indian farmers are working on the program.

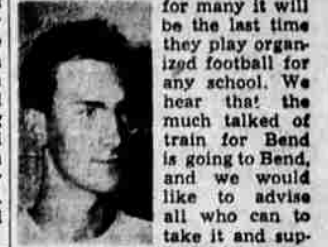
