

DRUNK DRIVER CHARGES FACE THREE MONDAY

Three men motorists, charged with operating vehicles under the influence of liquor, were arrested in a weekend roundup by city police.

One, Oak Major Myers, 46, 10 Esplanade Courts, was transferred to the county jail following his arrest Sunday at 7:15 p. m., at 433 Michigan avenue. City police said Myers was charged with the major offense and also having no operator's license. He had a previous conviction in Portland in 1938, traffic officers said, and was also arrested in Klamath Falls in 1939 while operating a car with a suspended license. Myers' arrest followed an accident in which his car and one driven by Herbert V. Rawlins, 2050 White avenue, were involved.

George Walter Qualley, 37, lumber employe, was arrested at Ninth and Main streets at 10:47 p. m. Saturday. He entered a plea of guilty and was fined \$100 and 30 days in police court Monday morning.

Third driver arrested was Charles R. Hutchinson, 337 1/2 East Main street, picked up at 7 o'clock Saturday night following an accident which also involved the car of Clifton LeRoy Donah, 2009 Darrow avenue. Hutchinson was charged with driving while under the influence of liquor on which he received a \$100 fine and 30-day sentence, failure to stop at the scene of an accident, \$25 or 12 days, and illegal stickers on the windshield, \$5 suspended. He was in jail Monday in lieu of fine.

City police were investigating an accident at Fifth street and Klamath avenue which occurred Saturday at 7 p. m. when a hit-and-run driver struck and injured Walter W. Tanner who lives on Klamath avenue near the Ackley mill. Tanner was moved to Klamath Valley hospital suffering from nose cuts and a possible broken shoulder.

A number of minor crashes were reported to city police over the weekend, the greater number caused by slick pavement and rain.

Twelve drunks and three traffic tickets made up the balance of Monday's police court report.

Roguish Artist Wins Prize For Painting of Old Door

CHICAGO, Nov. 3 (AP)—The Court Jester of American Art, a painter who started drawing the wounds of American soldiers in France and now puts varicose veins on some of his subjects, has won a \$500 prize with the portrait of a \$2.50 door rescued from a junk yard.

Ivan Albright worked 10 years on the picture of weather beaten wood which is attracting crowds at the American exhibition in the Chicago Art Institute. He values the painting at more than \$100,000 and is said to have turned down \$50,000.

On his father's estate in suburban Warrenville where the 44-year-old painter lives, he is known as a wag in artist clothing. Adam Albright, the father, was a great painter in his day, and used Ivan as a model for Tom Sawyer fishing scenes.

Ivan's twin brother, Malvin, is also an artist. When Ivan twitted him about placing second in alphabetical art catalogs, the brother took the name

of "Sissy." Now Albright and Sissy open and close most art programs.

In 1931 he started on a junk yard door. He set it on a tombstone and tacked on its panel a few wreaths which a Greek undertaker was unable to sell.

The canvas and frame for the picture were 10 feet high, so large he had to cut a hole in the ceiling and another in the floor for his feet when he painted the threshold. To give a dismal atmosphere, he blackened the studio walls, using three dozen eggs as a paint binding to prevent light reflections.

The painting, completed last summer, shows a woman's hand reaching for the door knob while the blue fumes of death ooze from the keyhole. It took a year to paint the hand because the model could pose only on Sundays.

The title, following Albright's penchant for long names, was "That which I should have done I did not do."

between 12,000 and 16,000 feet. They dropped into a pea soup fog. No one saw a thing until his feet touched earth. Their parachutes were found in almost a straight line.

Heard Parts Fall
Two of the fliers said they heard parts of the disintegrating plane whistle by them as they floated down.

At least three other fighting planes crashed in California Sunday after they became lost in dense fog. Pilots of two machines were killed, the third injured.

Private Robert V. Mosely, of Columbus, Neb., of the bomber crew, who had been reported seriously injured, was found to have suffered only severe contusions. The other seven men escaped with minor bruises.

Private F. E. Pekuri, of Seaside, Ore., was brought here with Mosely. Private A. H. Stookey, of Corning, Calif., and Corp. Sterling H. Isom, of Hurricane, Utah, were found last night and taken to the Georgetown ranger station.

Second Lieut. J. R. Mode, of Fort Worth, Tex., the copilot, and Staff Sgt. Eugene M. Clemens, of Chamberlain, S. D., stayed most of the night in a cabin at the Bassi ranch where Mosely and Pekuri were found. Before dawn, however, they set out to look for the wreckage of the bomber and their comrades.

Harry Balderston, Georgetown storekeeper who led the four fliers to the ranger station, said he found the first evidence of the plane crash near Tella Peak and a short distance further on found one motor buried six feet in the ground.

At San Anselmo, north of San Francisco, Lieut. R. E. Speckman and Thomas Leroy Truax rode to death against Bald Hill in their fast P-40 pursuit ships last night. The planes struck only 20 feet apart, caught fire and were demolished.

Lieut. Walter D. Radovich, flying another P-40 in the same squadron of 13, parachuted to earth near Santa Venica, six miles away, and broke a leg in landing. Army men hunted the wreckage of his plane.

Lieut. Richard N. Long of Connellsville, Pa., missing ten days, was still being sought in the mountains east and north of Fresno. His pursuit plane and four others—their pilots later located—disappeared from the same P-40 squadron, then numbering 19 and northbound, from which Speckman, Truax and Radovich were lost yesterday on the return trip from Washington state.

driver motion to some one on the sidewalk.

"This citizen watched the car. It turned and stopped on Lincoln street, crossing Ninth, and the driver began a conversation with a girl who was walking on Ninth street. The girl, answering Miss Russell's description stood some distance away, then walked over and stood at the running board, and finally got into the car.

"Our informant had the presence of mind to take the license number of that car."

The license was Oregon 79-876. A check showed the car registered to Eugene Smith of Medford. Smith was arrested.

Admits Visit
Sisemore said that when Smith was questioned in Medford, he admitted driving his car, a dark green 1935 Ford sedan, to Klamath Falls on October 25. He told officers he drove the car to Fort Klamath and Sprague River via Chilquin, returning to Klamath Falls by the Lakeview highway.

Smith denied, however, having picked up anybody in Klamath Falls or knowing anything about the Russell incident.

Authorities said Smith's car, after being returned to Medford, was placed in an auto body shop for minor repairs.

Hearing Stated
District Attorney Sisemore said he hoped that other citizens may come forward with information which will help trace the course of Smith's car on the day of the Russell incident.

In Medford, Smith hired an attorney, and was expected to furnish \$2500 bail late Monday. A preliminary hearing will be held in Klamath Falls later in the week, it is expected.

Smith was said to have come to Klamath Falls on business in connection with his interest in service stations. He is married and has two children.

Package Found
When Miss Russell left her mother about 2:30 p. m. on October 25 to walk to their home in Shippington, she carried a handbag and a package containing red suit material which had been purchased downtown.

Last weekend a state highway employe found the package of suit material on the fill north of Algoma. The purse has not yet been found.

Discovery of the package of material has re-convinced officers Miss Russell was riding in a car and went out at the time of her injuries. It was apparent that the driver of the car threw the package of suit material out when the machine reached the Algoma fill.

Miss Russell's skirt was found about three quarters of a mile north of the place where she was lying beside the highway. A passing motorist told officers he observed a car on the highway that afternoon with a piece of cloth flapping from its side.

BRITISH SHIPPING LOSSES DECREASE

had lost 236 planes over the channel and over Germany, while London admitted losses of 143 aircraft.

The Germans did not estimate their own losses, but the British said they had destroyed 100 German planes.

In their own losses the British listed 52 fighters, 89 bombers and one other plane shot down over Europe, and one plane, shot down over England. They said the Germans had lost 23 planes over Britain and 74 fighters and three bombers over Europe.

In the Middle East, the British acknowledged the loss of 41 planes to 18 for the axis.

Meeting Arranged In Weed Lumber Plant Strike

A meeting between a committee representing striking millworkers and the management of the Long-Bell Lumber company of Weed, Calif., has been arranged for Tuesday, union sources announced Monday.

The parley will be the first held since the strike, which has thrown 1200 Long-Bell employes into idleness, started on October 20. Sitting in with the principals will be Andrew J. Gallagher, federal labor conciliator who has been working with both sides toward a settlement.

Meanwhile AFL union officials in the Klamath Labor temple have announced that over \$8000 has been collected for strike relief from the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners and various other AFL locals. The brotherhood has donated \$5000, according to Wilbur Yeoman of the union.

Finland Warned By U. S. to Make Peace With Russia

can minister reminded the Finnish government of the information previously given to Finland's minister here regarding the possibility of bringing about a peaceful settlement of outstanding Finnish-soviet difficulties.

The United States now is awaiting the Finnish government's reply.

The secretary explained that on August 18 the Finnish minister in Washington, Hjalmar Procope, was informed that the state department had learned that the soviet union was prepared to discuss a Finnish-Soviet peace on the basis of territorial compensation to Finland.

But no Finnish spokesman, either here or in Helsinki, Hull continued, has subsequently indicated any desire to investigate this possibility.

The United States has realized, Hull said, that there may be some difficulty for Finland in making peace with the soviet union at this time because of German pressure; but he emphasized that this cannot alter the fact that if Finnish policy is continued, it must be because the Finnish government is no longer a free agent of the Finnish people, or because this policy is the free choice of the Finnish government and people with the full knowledge that it entails a serious threat to the security of the independence of all anti-nazi countries of the world including Finland.

Graded quarter-blood combing bright fleece wools had some demand at 50-51 cents, in the grease. Fine combing Ohio Delaine sold in limited quantities at 44-45 cents, in the grease. Fine territory wools of average to good French combing lengths were moved at \$107-110, scoured basis.
