

ACCORD WITH U. S. SOUGHT IN NEW MOVE

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to "explain the Japanese situation to the United States leaders, including President Roosevelt."

This development coincided with a bold declaration in the Japan Times and Advertiser, controlled by the Japanese foreign office, of a seven-point program, it said the United States should "make effective on her own initiative" to ease the tense Pacific situation.

If the United States fails "to take the right turn in the road," the newspaper said, "she can face the alternatives."

The program outlined by the newspaper called for the halting of all military and economic aid to China, the stopping of alleged encirclement of Japan, acknowledgement of Japan's co-prosperity sphere, recognition of Manchukuo, lifting of freezing measures and restoration of trade treaties.

In another Far Eastern development, The Netherlands banned the export of high octane gasoline to Portuguese Timor, officials indicating they were seeking to forestall any accumulation of stocks which might fall into Japanese hands.

The reported crossing of the Yaila mountains appeared as a serious blow to the red armies' defense strategy. Soviet reports to London had said previously that Russian commanders made no attempt to stem the German sweep across the central Crimea after the break through the Perkop isthmus, gateway to the Black sea republic. Instead, these reports said, the Russians merely executed rear-guard actions while moving their main forces to strong positions along the Yaila range to cover Sevastopol and Kerch.

Welders Called Back to Shipyards; Plane Men Strike

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 5 (AP)—A welders strike spread into the aircraft industry today, just as a temporary settlement sent workers back to shipyard jobs.

Welders walked out at the Lockheed and Vega plants in Burbank at 12:30 a. m. (PST) and failed to report for work at San Diego's Consolidated factory when the day shift went on duty at 7 a. m.

Spokesmen for all three companies said production on allied military orders aggregating nearly \$1,400,000,000 was not immediately affected.

SEATTLE, Nov. 5 (AP)—By telephone and radio strike headquarters of the Seattle Welders & Burners council began summoning welders to return to work immediately on receipt of word from Washington this morning of a settlement to end the 15-day-old welders' strike which has crippled millions of dollars of national defense work in this area.

James W. O'Brien, council president, said he was notified from Washington by Dave Basor, council executive secretary, at 7:35 a. m.

The pair has not been heard from since taking off from Eugene for Seattle.

J. Irons, Glendale, said the reward would be paid by the Knu-Vise Products company, of which McKenna is president. Jeffries, who was flying the plane, is a former pilot for Film Actor Wallace Beery, Irons said.

21 Reported Held At Helsinki for Anti-Nazi Activity

NEW YORK, Nov. 5 (AP)—Twenty-one persons have been arrested in Helsinki as a result of strong anti-German demonstrations yesterday, the British Broadcasting corporation said today in a broadcast heard by NBC.

The BBC asserted that "angry crowds denounced Germany," with whom Finland is fighting against Soviet Russia.

Another broadcast by BBC, heard here by CBS, said Valno Tanner, socialist minister of trade, was asked at a stormy meeting of his party to quit the coalition Finnish government rather than accept any responsibility for continuance of the war on the side of Germany.

But Marshal Baron Carl Gustaf Mannerheim, Finnish commander in chief whom the BBC described as "Hitler's friend, virtually the ruler of Finland," was said to have rejected the American warning to make peace with Russia.

Hermiston to Return to Normal After War Boom

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Their attempts to spend it made this peaceful village overnight into an overgrown carnival working a 24-hour shift, hastily erected lunch rooms and hot dog stands, soft drink and beer establishments, a movie, grocery stores, shoeshine stands, and meat markets played to long waiting lines.

Living space became a luxury. Householders rented spare rooms, then rented front lawns and vacant lots for trailer space. The army erected barracks for 1700 single men at the depot, but married men and their families still swarmed in. One farmer threw away his plow and turned his 160 acres into sought-after trailer parking space.

With families still living in tents or under any shelter available, the state and federal governments stepped in. They provided migratory worker and trailer camps and augmented school facilities—just about the time the end of the job was sighted.

The army began clearing the 16,000-acre site early in March. By the middle of May steel work was well started. Soon after that concrete crews began pouring around the clock. By September they were able to pour 24 igloos in 24 hours—a record performance, compared with the pouring of nine igloos in a day by workmen at the Fort Wingate, N. M., depot—the best previous mark.

The igloos, which look something like a half barrel, measure 30 by 80 feet. The floor is laid on the ground. Each structure will house some 250 tons of munitions. As the structures are completed they are buried under dry sand. Entrance is through a vault-like door.

The magazines are scattered so that an explosion in one likely would not detonate munitions in others.

The depot will store munitions for the Boise, Idaho; Pendleton, Ore.; Spokane, Wash., and Portland, Ore., air bases, and for other military establishments in the Pacific Northwest. It will cost about \$15,000,000. The construction contract is held by J. A. Terteling & Sons, Boise, Idaho. Maj. Harry Schuppert of Frederick, Md., is construction quartermaster.
