Everybody Writes to F. R.; Expert Crew Opens Bushels Of Mail for White House

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (UP) — President Roosevelt doesn't have to keep his finger on the pulse of the nation. The national heartbeat comes unsolicited to him by mail.

Four thousand seventy letters addressed to the chief executive were received today, 3812 yesterday.

One of the disarming characteristics of the lonely man in the White House is he makes people feel they can approach him personally on any subject from the imminent loss of 10 acres and a mule to lend-lease aid to Russia.

They do. They take their pen in hand and start out with anything from formalities approved by Emily Post to plain "Dear Boss."

With possibly a couple of other things on his mind the president does the best he can to attend daily to this astonishing conglomeration of suggestions, bouquets, retorts discourteous, appeals for aid and literary fireside chats.

"The man to see," advised Acting White House Secretary William D. Hassett, "is Ira Smith. He is chief of the White House mail room, down in the basement of the west wing, and has been since March 20, 1897.

picked out and set aside. Then another batch of their more important mail is selected to be opened by secretaries. Then the rest of the mail is set aside to be opened and classified as to the departments of government which it might have been sent to in the first place instead of to the president."

At 8 o'clock, 60 morning minutes ahead of the rest of the White House staff, the mail force reports for work. Thirty minutes later the mail is sorted. When others from FDR down are ready for the daily grind, their letters are on their desks.

Ninety-nine out of every hundred letters remain. These are run through a letter-opening machine and turned over to eleven readers. They decide the proper disposition of each. The president has left stricter orders than any Hollywood personage that every reasonable missive shall receive a reasonable reply.

The two secret service men spot the cranks. They keep an active file on cranks. There are only about two hundred regular ones and some occasional strays. Cranks usually start out mildly and work themselves up through a course of letters until vilification reaches an unprintable stage. By that time the FBI knows all about them, even though they have signed a different name each time, and takes action if necessary.

During the "March of Dimes" campaign, a clerk innocently put a batch of several hundred letters through the opening machine. For a while dimes flew about the mail room like grain from a broken corn sheller and several are still lodged in an air-conditioning grill.

Boeing Mystery Solved by Guard

SEATTLE, Nov. 5 (AP) — Mysterious breaking of floodlights at the big Boeing aircraft plant, coincident with reports like the crack of a rifle, aroused county and company authorities.

Sheriff's deputies patrolled the Duwamish river at the plant's rear on the watch for saboteurs.

Then Inspector Phil Sands of the plant guards exploded the mystery. He discovered raindrops were breaking the hot floodlight globes.

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
