

SCHOOL GROUP HAS MONTHLY MEETING HERE

SPRAGUE RIVER — The Klamath County Superintendents and Coaches association met in their regular monthly meeting November 4 at Sari's cafe in Klamath Falls.

The evening was enlivened by a number of controversial issues, that kept the group in session for over three hours. The program opened when President Roland Parks of Sprague River introduced Superintendent Gralapp of Klamath Union high, who gave a report on the state high schools principals conference, which was held last week in Salem.

Gralapp stated that the big job of the high school is to prepare students to enter industry rather than to enter college. He stated that the modern high school must teach its students how to get along with other people. This quality is one that has been greatly neglected in our past program. Many industries prefer good personalities to good grade records.

A lively discussion resulted over the basketball schedule, which was released by schedule chairman, Max Marvin of Henley. The questions of Gilchrist's late entry; the playing of so many games and agreement on referees formed the bases of discussion.

E. E. Kilpatrick of Merrill told the group of the method used by his high school in collecting the new 10 per cent federal tax on admissions. The superintendents voted to have uniform activity admission tickets printed for the county high schools. These tickets would contain all of the information about the tax. President Parks appointed E. L. Coyner of Bonanza chairman of the ticket program.

Superintendent Peterson was called on to tell of his recent trip to the Atlantic coast. In an interesting talk he told of the changes in his home town since he left almost 40 years ago. He told of some states in the east having dozens of small struggling one-room schools, within a short distance of another school. Consolidation for a well supported and equipped central school is being fought in many cases by the local boards and communities in these states. Peterson told of the fine schools of Utah and of the splendid cooperation between the churches and the schools.

In a fiery discussion the group pointed out the weakness of the Oregon State Teachers association on many problems concerning the schools. It was pointed out by Carol Howe of Henley that although Klamath county supports the OSTA very highly, the state as a whole is far below the average of other states in membership. The school men discussed ways of strengthening the OSTA by showing the teachers that its support or non-support would determine important salary changes in the future.

It was revealed that Klamath county school men were not as prominent in state educational activities as many other counties. It was urged that a delegation of superintendents attend the next conference and take an active part in the affairs. E. L. Coyner will represent the group at the December meeting of the Oregon State Activities association. He will protest for the group the increased membership dues and will ask for a separate B school activities division in Oregon.

Last Ship Leaves For Japan After Thorough Search

SEATTLE, Nov. 6 (U.P.) — Tight-lipped about the future, 400 Japanese nationals were outward-bound to the Orient today on the Hikawa Maru on probably the last ship to leave the Pacific coast for Japan in some time.

After hours of delay and an exhaustive examination of passengers and cargo by customs officials, the big liner sailed at dusk Tuesday. The Japanese government had chartered it for the exchange of nationals with Canada and the United States. It brought Americans to this

country last week and took on about 250 passengers here. In addition to 146 previously at Vancouver, B. C. About 30 per cent of the passengers were searched, customs officers disclosed. Half a dozen

were found to have more than \$200 cash they can legally take out of the country with them and the excess was taken from them, to be frozen in banks for the duration. Many children were among

the passengers and numerous poignant and touching family scenes occurred. None would comment to interviewers on possibly grave things ahead. Read the Classified page.

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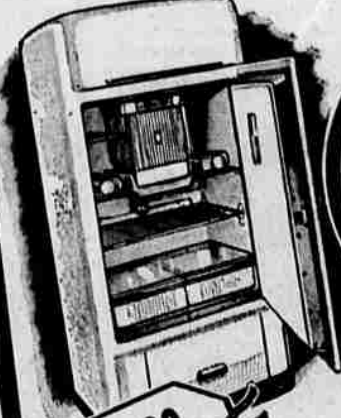
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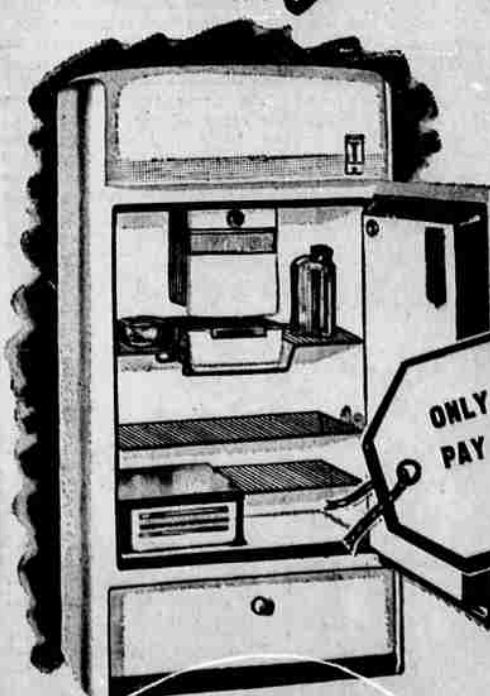
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
