Pine Orders Rise Over Previous Week

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 7 (AP)—Ninety three identical mills reported to the Western Pine association today that orders for the week ending Nov. 1 totaled 76,599,000 board feet compared with 72,567,000 feet for the previous week and 76,310,000 feet a year ago.

Shipments were 85,508,000 board feet against 84,398,000 the previous week and 89,469,000 a year ago. Production totaled 79,220,000 feet, 83,074,000 and 71,452,000 feet, in the same order.

Visitors Disappointed in Activities of U. S. Senate

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (UP)—This reporter went to the capitol today to find out whether the Mr. and Mrs. Smiths just visiting Washington could be agitated by senate debate on neutrality revision.

The galleries were jammed with Mr. and Mrs. Smiths but most of their comment was akin to that of fall-guys who had bought tickets to a whirling-girly show and found themselves looking at a troupe of all-male acrobats.

The trouble seemed to be from a cinema addict's point of view—that the senate, as reported, is really staid—so staid in fact that that is what caused most of the agitation.

As they gave up their seats or standing room to others and left, some of the spectators commented freely. Typical was a man who said he was from Oklahoma but who refused to give his name.

"I'll tell you," he said, referring to the senate, "congress is the biggest disappointment a man ever had."

"I been looking forward to this trip and timing it. I got here just right and got me a ticket. And I'll tell you, here we are hovering between hell and Hitler and they ain't even a quorum."

"I counted 14 senators sitting at their desks, mostly in pairs and swapping stories. Another fellow who looked like a senator was dozing off on one of those padded benches in a corner. And this Senator Wheeler is waving a handkerchief around his head and reading pieces into the congressional record out of old newspapers and then adding a eulogy of whichever reporter wrote the one he was reading."

A woman attired attractively in tailored gray and gray furs, said: "I've been sitting here for two hours and I am of the same opinion still. I wish they would repeal the whole law. It's high time we did something." Somewhat reluctantly, but "as a duty," she gave her name as Mrs. C. R. Pepper of Bristol, Va.

Another woman spectator said the same thing backwards. She said she enjoyed and agreed with Senator Wheeler's every word.

"I don't see how he stands up so long," she added. "Wheeler spoke for four hours."

Most of those flowing in and out of the five galleries, whispered and occasionally giggled to each other about the scene as

a whole. The comparative smallness of the senate chamber brought more comment than the speeches.

"Why it seems as if you could reach right out and touch him," said one feminine visitor in the representative and card section, as Sen. Warren R. Austin strode across the floor with a sheaf of documents. "Isn't he boyish?"

"Not when he is making a speech, he isn't," replied her companion.

That's what Senator Austin was waiting to do, but he didn't get to.

DEATH MENACES ELEPHANT HERD

ATLANTA, Nov. 7 (AP)—Death struck its seventh elephant in 24 hours on the Ringling Brothers, Barnum & Bailey circus lot Thursday and veterinarians worked desperately to save the remaining 40 of the immensely valuable herd.

After an autopsy on one of the first to die, the state chemist reported death was due to arsenic poisoning. Circus officials

were unable to explain how the arsenic found its way into the elephants' food.

Henry Ringling North, circus executive, said that the herd could not be immediately replaced. He added that untrained elephants can be purchased for \$4000 to \$5000 but they are worth \$10,000 to \$15,000 each by the time they have had long years of circus training.

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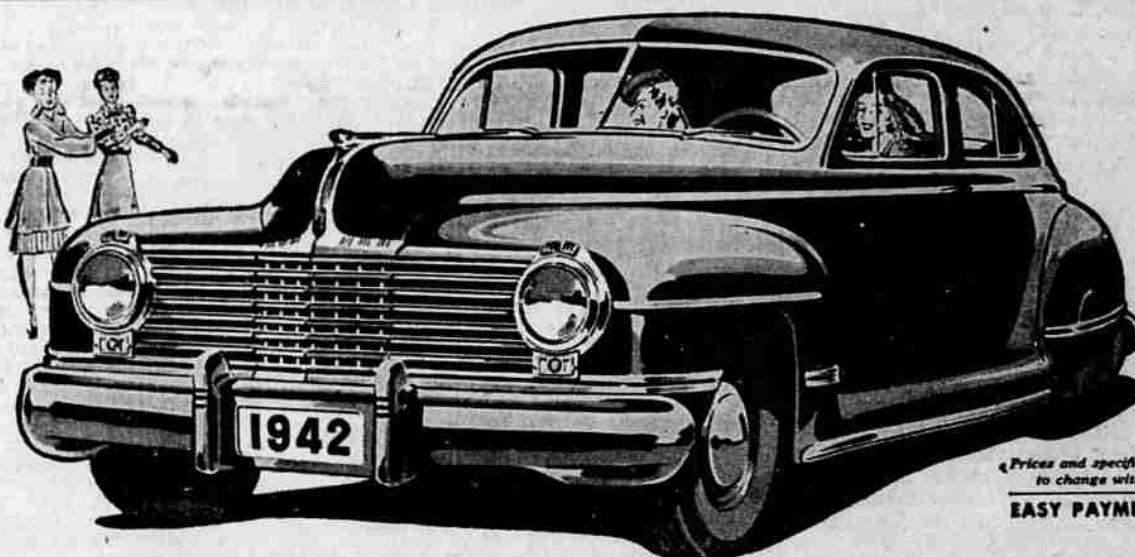
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
