

Conservation Theme DAR Monday Meet

State Conference of Oregon Daughters American Revolution To Be Held in Klamath

That the Klamath country is bountifully blessed in the matter of natural resources, the abundance of its water supply, the productiveness of its soil, its timber supply and grazing lands was among the highlights brought out by Mrs. B. E. Hayden in her presentation of her subject, Monday evening, at the meeting of Eulalona chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. Mrs. Hayden's theme was "Conservation of Natural Resources of the Pacific Northwest."

Mrs. Hayden based her information largely on the report of the Northwest Regional Planning Board for Conservation, headquarters in Portland, and read from the pamphlet published by this board. Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and part of Montana are included in this region. The six resources listed in this region are: Agriculture, forests, hydro-electric power, water resources, rain precipitation, mineral wealth, and manufacturing industry.

According to Mrs. Hayden, this conservation board has a twelve point program for the orderly and economic development of all human and physical resources of the Pacific northwest for the benefit of present generations and for generations to come. Mrs. Hayden is well qualified to present her subject. Her husband, B. E. Hayden, has for more than twenty years been superintendent of the US bureau of reclamation, headquarters in Klamath Falls. Incidentally, Mrs. Hayden brought out the fact that the reclamation project in the Klamath region is rated as one of the most successful in the whole United States.

Musical Notes

The popular Ford Sunday Evening Hour on November the sixteenth will present the world premier of Jose Iturbi's "Spanish Dance" . . . Iturbi won fame as a pianist and as conductor and enters the ranks of composers as a comparative newcomer. His "Spanish Dance" was written in the white heat of inspiration while on a concert tour in the south. Between concerts in Greensboro, N. C., and Wheeling, West Virginia, he slipped off to Columbia, S. C. There in the home of an old friend, Hans Schwiager, Iturbi worked feverishly until the music was captured on paper. "Spanish Dance" must surely reflect the fiery, tempestuous character of its composer and Iturbi admirers will be attentively turning their radios on November the sixteenth.

The Southern Symphony orchestra, under the leadership of Hans Schwiager, will also give a performance of Iturbi's "Spanish Dance" this season. The Southern Symphony of Columbia, S. C., is the only fully professional, all-union orchestra south of Washington, D. C. Organized by Hans Schwiager only two short years ago, this excellent symphony has won the approval and support of the entire state of South Carolina. Soloists appearing with the orchestra have also been warm in their praise. Last year John Charles Thomas said of Mr. Schwiager, "He's terrific! He not only makes the singers sing but also the instruments." Soloists to appear with the Southern Symphony this season include Jussi Bjorling, Zino Francescatti and Lauritz Melchior.

The Metropolitan Opera company will present "Hansel and Gretel" with Rise Stevens and Eleanor Steber on Christmas day. This will be the first performance of the fairy opera in five years. It was last given with Queen Mario and Editha Fleischner.

Reports from the west coast indicate that the San Francisco opera company continues to play to capacity audiences. A "S. R. O." sign marked the gala opening for "Don Pasquale" with Salvatore Baccaloni and Bidu Sayao in the leading roles. Featuring Rise Stevens and Lotte Lehmann, "Rosenkavalier," the second opera presented, was equally well attended.

November the first marks the opening of the nineteenth season of Young People's concerts by the Philharmonic Symphony orchestra under the direction of Rudolph Ganz. Carnegie hall is usually filled to capacity for these concerts and is sure to be packed on this opening morning when eleven-year-old pianist, Soudra Bianca of New York, will be featured playing the first movement from the Mozart D minor Concerto.

Venturists Enjoy Tour

Guests of Lamms to Continue Program of Project

One of the outstanding evenings of the year for the Venture club was that of October twenty-ninth when the members were guests of Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred E. Lamm on a conducted tour of Lamm Lumber company. This was in pursuit of the club's study program.

Dinner was served to the Venturists in the hotel dining room. The chef there has been with Mr. Lamm for twenty years and is renowned as an excellent cook.

After dinner Mr. Lamm explained the process through which a log goes from the felling of the tree in the forest to the final finishing of the lumber for various purposes, such as building, boxes and mouldings. He said that fifty per cent of the mill's output now is for defense, twenty-five per cent for boxes and twenty-five per cent for customer consumption. He told that in the early days of the lumber industry in Klamath county the largest demand for lumber was for boxes, which were used by California fruit growers, but since the opening of large mills in Washington the demand is supplied in the most part by that state. The moulding plant at the mill is the most recent expansion made to meet the demands of consumers, Mr. Lamm explained.

He went on to explain what would be seen in the mill as the tour was made from the boiler room to the box factory and moulding plant, where the club was to see the smallest piece of lumber manufactured.

The trip was then commenced, and after seeing how the power was made, the logs were followed through the cutting and sorting processes to the dry kiln, then through the finishing processes.

This entertaining and educational evening was enjoyed by sixteen Venturists and two of their advisors, the third being their hostess, Mrs. Lamm. She and Mr. Lamm were most generous in providing this opportunity to add color to the club's study of the county. Each member came away with a better understanding of the lumber industry.
