

American Art Week Observed

Chairman Issues Appreciation to Committee, Participants in Exhibits

Wide attention had been paid by Klamath Falls residents to American Art week by the closing date on Saturday and great appreciation was extended by Mrs. Walter Brown, general chairman, for the interest and assistance of those who prepared displays and to those who otherwise assisted her.

From Wilford S. Conrow of the American Artists Professional league, sponsors of this week, came the following message:

"To all those who assist in celebrations of American Art week, November the first to the eighth, throughout the United States, the national executive committee of the league extends hearty greetings.

"You have the gratification within you of believing that you are being of use towards making a good idea a reality. This idea is that throughout our land all the people shall be aware of the works our artists—painters, sculptors, printmakers and craftsmen are producing, and shall come to take special interest in the works of their neighbors . . .

"We who work for American Art week feel a certain legitimate pride in its setup, because it is so essentially American. American Art week is carried on by local self-supporting volunteers, like the town meetings and congregational churches of colonial New England. This maintains the traditional self-reliance of Americans, everyone of whom can contribute ideas of his own that may be appropriate in local observance.

"American Art week, in idea and spirit, is an integration of the ideas of democracy."

American Art week has been observed in the United States since 1934. Oregon twice winning recognition for "distinguished participation." Klamath Falls has taken part for the past three years, and last year was awarded a certificate for greatest activity in the state.

The public school exhibit, showing examples of work done in the regular classes, opened Monday, November the third, at the Fremont auditorium. Those who have not seen this display are urged to do so on the final day that it will be open, Wednesday, November the twelfth.

Clubs and organizations were invited to participate in the observance of the week, honoring living American artists and their work. The American Association of University Women arranged a window in the office of the First Federal Savings and Loan association, displaying an oil painting and hand work by Mrs. William Kuykendall, a member of the organization.

Mrs. Marie Cone, art instructor, exhibited two classroom studies by two of her pupils in the windows at the chamber of commerce.

Both show windows of Goeller's paint store were devoted to interesting displays, one showing materials from their regular stock for use in arts and crafts hobbies, and in the other was an informative display on the origin of pigments. Also of especial interest in this display was an old-time piece of handwork, a horse embroidered in silk on bolting cloth, with the background painted in oil, owned by Mr. Jack Keep of Tulelake.

Mrs. Will Wood displayed some of her original water colors and other craft work in the window of Woods Drug store, while new books on art made an appropriate window at the Shaw Stationery company.

Invited to show her wood engravings and her recently published book on Oregon history, "The Old Days," was Miss Constance Fowler of Salem. These were on display in the United States National bank window. Miss Fowler is also currently showing engravings and paintings in oil at the Portland Art museum and is considered one of the outstanding artists of Oregon. She is head of the art department of the Willamette university, and both she and Mrs. Brown are members of the American Artists Professional league.

Toastmistress Club Hears Talk on Art

Mrs. W. R. Boyd Presides at Interesting Session Held Monday Night at Chamber of Commerce

At the meeting of the Klamath Falls Toastmistress club Monday evening, November the third, at the chamber of commerce, Mrs. W. R. Boyd, vice president, presided in the absence of Mrs. Archie Beckwith, Toastmistress of the evening, who had planned an interesting program on American Art.

Mrs. Hiram F. Murdoch spoke on the technique of etching which differs from engraving only in the process by which the lines on the metal plate are incised. In engraving, the lines are dug out with a sharp tool, etching with acid. From this etched plate, the print is made.

In her discussion on appreciation of art, Mrs. Hibbard said there was nothing bewitching, no esoteric meaning in the appreciation of fine art. "Art is a form of emotional expression," said Mrs. Hibbard, "and a kind of universal language. The joy, the patriotism or peace expressed by the artist must be felt again by the person who hears the symphony, sees the picture or views a noble building, then it becomes fine art." Mrs. Hibbard spoke of the similarity of music and fine architecture, saying that architecture is a music or melody of lines and that music is an architecture of melody.

The history of the Mount Rushmore Memorial park in the Black Hills of South Dakota was the interesting topic of Mrs. John Cashion. The heads of Washington, Lincoln, Jefferson and Roosevelt are being sculptured from solid rock. The work was begun by Gutzon Borglum.

Several very interesting anecdotes from the life of Benjamin West, father of American art, were related by Mrs. Carl Schubert, illustrating his early Quaker upbringing. "Sculpture is the art of shaping the human figures," said Mrs. W. R. Boyd, "in clay, wax, cut in stone, cast in bronze or carved in wood." Many of the modern sculpturers are choosing the different hard woods as their working material and are choosing the block forms or figures as their mediums of expression.

Pioneers of contemporary American paintings, said Mrs. Boyd, are John Curry and Thomas Benton, who weren't satisfied with Europeanisms, so they returned to America

and started painting modern American scenes. Modern painting is made up of many tendencies, but contrasted with the arts of the past its most apparent characteristics are probably its bold departures from the conventional both in subject matter and style of treatment. The American artist has developed a purely American style of painting, Mrs. Boyd said, due to the types of people and scenes portrayed.

Mrs. Carl Schubert was chairman of the round table discussion on "Inflation." After agreeing that inflation was here and that it was a menace and a threat to our future welfare, it was clearly brought out that the continued purchase of defense savings bonds and the curtailment of buying power was a check on the danger.

An interesting and unique art display which created many favorable comments was displayed by Mrs. Hiram F. Murdoch. It was an exquisite piece of ivory sculpture done by Captain Peter Foss, father of Mrs. Murdoch, during his world travels as a sea captain.

Mrs. Murdoch said this was the first time that this treasure of art had been shown in Klamath Falls. Also shown were specimens of beautiful Intarsia which is a hobby of Dr. Lloyd Goble.
