northwestern division, said that an investigation would open at 9:30 a. m. Wednesday at Fort Wayne, Ind.

Two hundred yards of track were torn up, and the damage was estimated by one authority at about \$250,000.

A control tower at the intersection of the Pennsylvania and New York Central lines was wrecked by the train, but two occupants leaped to safety. Tangled pullmans and coaches blocked both lines.

Speeding along at better than 60 miles an hour, the train's locomotive suddenly began "swaying back and forth" as it approached the crossing, said Roy Schwartzkopf, tower operator. Five of the eight cars upset. Only one remained on the rails.

The "Pennsylvanian" was the newest train on this division of the Pennsylvania, making its first run Sept. 23.

Most of the victims apparently were passengers in the third coach back of the locomotive. It literally was split and flung apart.

The local club will conduct the meeting and all service club members from Klamath Falls are cordially invited to attend the luncheon.

Orville Provost, head of the local Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, commonly known as the Mormon church, and a member of the Lions club, was the principal speaker at the regular luncheon of the club last Tuesday. His subject was the Mormon church.

He started his address by telling of records the church has that their people settled on the coast of South America from Palestine as early as 600 B. C., and that the church received the name "Mormon" from a man by that name that lived on this continent about 400 A. D.

The speaker touched on polygamy, which was permitted by the church from 1847 to 1890. It was started when a large number of unattached women, who had become converted to this faith and joined the colony, Provost said. It became quite a problem to provide a livelihood for these women in this frontier colony and so the members of the church that were able to maintain more than one home were allowed to marry more than one woman, he said.

Elder Roland Wright also spoke, answering a series of questions asked by the speaker. Paul Sken acted as chairman of the day.

VFW to Meet for Liberty Breakfast Tuesday Morning

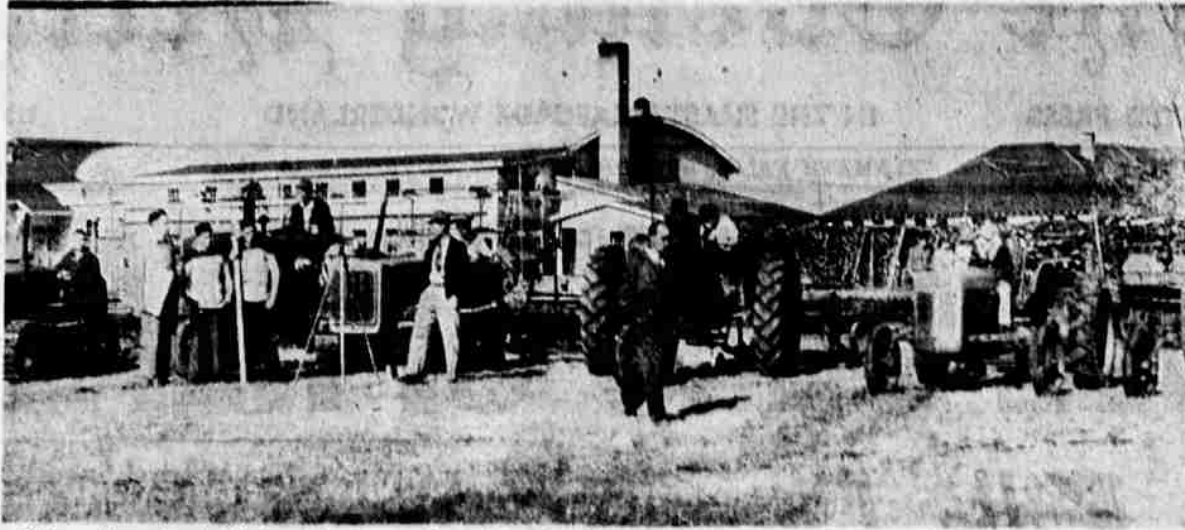

Extensive plans for the Christmas holiday season were advanced Monday by members of the Klamath Retail Trade bureau which met at the chamber of commerce.

Street decorations, it was announced, were scheduled to be up by Saturday, a full two weeks before "Christmas opening" on November 29. The Kem Advertising company has been put in charge again this year and has promised some new decorations in addition to lights and cedar garlands.

The home lighting contest this year is under the sponsorship of the Junior chamber of commerce, whose representative, Estle Afflick outlined the plans to the bureau. Great effort to stimulate every home to display even a wreath or short string of lights will be made this year, Afflick said.

A new plan to encourage city-wide participation in the home lighting contest will be the awarding of prizes to the most unique displays which cost only a few dollars. The exact cost limit has not yet been decided by the junior chamber.

Another method to stimulate home lighting Afflick said, will be handled through the city schools and the PTA. A bicycle will be awarded to the child who secures the most signatures to entry blanks, and the PTA will check the entries and make sure some sort of display is actually set up in each case.

Business houses will be asked to cooperate in decorating their windows to help create a Christmas atmosphere in the downtown area.

The Fairland parade planned for Saturday, November 29, will be the biggest Christmas parade ever held here, according to members of the trade bureau. Tony Sarg balloons of animals have been arranged for, and floats and bands will add to the interest in addition to the inevitable Santa Claus. upon local action, Klamath mill workers would carry out the council's intent.

According to Pavolka, several local mills are known to be cutting Long-Bell orders. Action, however, must wait various locals' decision upon the issue, he said. Regular meetings of Klamath locals will be held within the next two weeks.

3-Man Board
Meanwhile Andrew J. Gallagher, federal labor conciliator who has been working on a settlement of the Weed dispute, waited the outcome of his proposal for a three-man board of department of labor representatives to hear grievances of both the union and company. In Susanville, Calif., Friday he said the union had agreed to the suggestion but that a company reply had not yet been received.

In another basin labor development, Earl Edsall, business agent of the Teamsters' union (AFL) announced that negotiations had been completed with the Crater Lake Beverage company and the Coca Cola Bottling Company for new contracts covering a raise in pay and a week's vacation with pay for their employees.

A contract with the Klamath Packing company has also been signed, Edsall said, calling for a \$5 per week raise for the firm's truck drivers and a week's vacation with pay.

Edsall also announced that a second meeting of Klamath Falls grocery clerks will be held in the Labor Temple Thursday night. The meeting, originally scheduled for Tuesday night, was postponed due to the holiday.

Edsall was to leave Monday night for Portland to negotiate a contract with Sears, Roebuck officials covering warehousemen in the Klamath Falls store.

No further developments were revealed concerning the dispute between the AFL Building Trades council and P. L. Kemp, contractor building the \$30,000 tourist cabin project south of the city for Willard T. Mann, operator of Bratton's Tourist Cottages on Oregon avenue. The BTC Friday stated that none of its members would handle orders for merchandise destined for Bratton use. Kemp a month ago was declared unfair by the BTC for hiring non-union labor.

At the Sunday meeting, the Klamath basin council elected Floyd Shadel recording secretary to replace Marshal L. Coade who resigned to enter national defense work at Tacoma, Wash.

Kenneth A. Gordon was elected to fill a vacancy as three-year trustee, and Ed Brondenburg was elected executive board member for the northwestern district council.

SCIENTISTS STUDY BUTTERFLY FLIGHT

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 10 (AP)—Scientists sought today to unscramble the mystery of millions of butterflies winging southward from Canada in a migration like that of geese. No one knew whether they came down like tourists or were fated to fly into the Gulf of Mexico to die.

Swarms of the golden-brown insects, called Monarch butterflies, fluttered down on Subtropical Louisiana after a 900-mile trip. They will remain until deepest winter. But after that?

Biologist Percy Vlosca Jr., said there were records of the butterflies wintering in southern California and Florida but nothing to show what happens after December to those that come to Louisiana.

"Maybe they just keep on flying south and out into the Gulf of Mexico to die," Vlosca suggested.

In the spring months Vlosca has found a very few of the butterflies in Louisiana heading north. He does not know whether they are remnants of the swarms that passed southward months earlier or stragglers from those that wintered in Florida.

He and his staff have gathered bags full of the insects and will either place tags on their fragile wings or spray them with a dye. If they are found north of New Orleans thereafter he will know something of their journey.
