

## ADMIRAL SAYS BLOCKADE MAY DEFEAT AXIS

OAKLAND, Calif., Nov. 12 (AP)—The United States navy is ready to attack an enemy far from American shores, "ready and able to fight a war to the finish," Rear Admiral J. W. Greenleaf, commandant of the 12th naval district, said Monday.

"If blockade is the most powerful weapon we have to use against the axis powers, then let it be a blockade such as the world has never known, a blockade by land and sea and air forces which will throw a wall of steel around the enemy," the admiral told the Kiwanis club here.

"Together with the embattled British, let us seize such a stranglehold on the axis aggressor that he will be brought quickly to his knees so that our own losses can be held to the minimum."

"When it becomes necessary for the United States navy to convey these armed merchant ships on their way to deliver the food and arms to England and other nations which we have promised to aid, the navy will be not only ready and able to carry out this mission, but eager to do so."

"Our fighting ships are always stripped for action, their magazines filled with live ammunition, the crews alert at battle stations."

"All of the nations whose peoples now live at the beck and call of ruthless conquerors," he recalled, "were first softened and disrupted, and left distraught and helpless by internal discord."

He singled out labor strikes as particular cause for alarm, listed the number of recent strikes, adding, "and the shocking conclusion of this report indicates that, if the present trend continues, we are in for a total loss of 25 million man days of labor during 1941."

"We can only wonder if, mighty nation that we are, we can afford this tremendous loss to the productivity of our defense effort."

## ONE-TIME BEER BARON GETS BOOT

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 12 (AP)—Waxey Gordon, who made millions in the lush, loose days of prohibition in New Jersey beer operations grabbed a plane out of here today just after a judge had cautioned him "I don't want to see you back here next week."

Gordon is trading in another kind of liquid now. He said he came to San Francisco with his business associate, Albert Mayer, of Philadelphia, to try to interest capital in promotion of a cleaning fluid.

Police found them at a hotel and booked them on a vagrancy charge. In municipal court this morning Judge Clarence Morris continued the case on condition the two get out of town. "The climate here is not good for men like you," Judge Morris cautioned. "The police don't want you here and I don't want to see you back here next week."

So Gordon and Mayer caught the noon United Airlines for Los Angeles. They will head for the east coast tomorrow, they said.

The prohibition era brewery operator — he quite cheerfully identified himself — and his associates were discovered yesterday at a fashionable hotel and taken off to police headquarters on vagrancy charges.

There Gordon explained his mission in the far west. "I came out here to get a bankroll," he told inspectors Frank McCann and William McMahon.

"What I mean is, I came out here to interest capital in a wonderful cleaning fluid which I will market as soon as I get finances to set up a company," he elaborated.

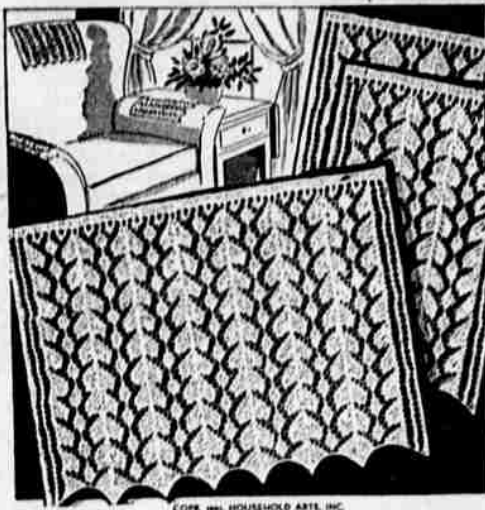

## Army Promised Excellent Dinner for Thanksgiving

FORT LEWIS, Nov. 12 (AP)—You couldn't do better Thanksgiving than be in the army. Here's what the soldiers will get for dinner November 20, the army announced today:

Turkey soup, roast turkey, mashed potatoes, sweet potatoes, cranberry sauce, giblet gravy, buttered asparagus, apple-celery, nut salad, olives, mince pie, candy, mixed nuts, bread, butter, coffee.

... And here's what the army has had to order to feed the 56,000 soldiers at the fort on Thanksgiving: 42,000 pounds of turkey or 2100 turkeys; 8400 pounds of potatoes; 12,600 pounds of sweet potatoes; 840 No. 10 cans of mince meat; 10,080 pounds of bread.

Also: 315 boxes of apples;

6300 No. 2 cans of asparagus; 3360 heads of lettuce; 2500 pounds of onions; 3,780 pounds of flour; 1260 pounds of lard; 840 No. 10 cans of cranberry sauce; 420 pounds of shelled walnuts; 1680 pounds of coffee; 420 quarts of mayonnaise; 420 No. 10 cans of ripe olives; 8400 pounds of mixed nuts; 5040 pounds of candy; 2100 pounds of sugar and 2100 cans of milk.

## CENTER OF U. S. POPULATION SET

CARLISLE, Ind., Nov. 12 (AP)—The new center of population of the United States is a fence post along a blacktop road two miles southeast of this southwestern Indiana village.

It's a corner post, with a winter wheat field on one side and a bluegrass pasture, complete with cows, horses, and two mules, on the other. Across the road is a corn field.

The new population center, decided by the census bureau at Washington, is in a region of rich, black farms at the edge of Indiana coal fields.

Owen W. Collins and his wife live on a farm nearest the new center and operates a 225-acre farm on land which has been in the Collins family for three generations. Collins said "nothing very exciting ever happens around here," and "so far as I know there never even has been an automobile accident beside that fence post."

The new population center, as decided by the census bureau, is not the middle point from which an approximately equal number of people live in each direction. The selection was made by picking the spot on which the map of the United States could be balanced on the point of a pin if every living person had the same weight.

The new center is about 13 miles west and about 7.9 miles

south of where it was in 1930 and about 802 miles west and 22.5 miles south of the center determined in the first American census in 1790.

## Labor Shortage May Force Curfew On Gas Stations

TACOMA, Nov. 12 (AP)—Inability of service station owners to find men to work for them will probably necessitate a service station "curfew" from 7 p. m. to 7 a. m. in the near future, A. A. Wood, president of the Western Petroleum Dealers' association, said last night. There is an ample supply of gasoline, Wood said.

"Gasoline station owners simply cannot find men to work for them," he declared. "Union scale for pump attendants is just under \$30 a week, and where a year ago plenty of men could be found for this wage, almost none can be had today."

He said he believed able-bodied young men are being absorbed into higher pay defense jobs. No one would lose his job under the curfew as those eliminated in some stations would be placed in others immediately, he said.

## PINBALL BILL DIES

SALEM, Nov. 12 (AP)—The proposed city ordinance to legalize and license pinball games for amusement only was a dead letter today after sponsors decided to withdraw it. Alderman L. F. LeGarde, who with Mayor W. W. Chadwick, introduced the measure, said they found opposition was too strong.

## SPUD ALLOTMENT BILL REWRITTEN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 (AP)—House members from 23 potato growing areas undertook today to rewrite a bill (HR 5366) to fix marketing allotments for the crop.

Representative Fulmer (D-SC), chairman of the house agricul-

tural committee, asked the special committee to rewrite the bill or bring in new legislation. He said he hoped to get a bill to meet the needs of potato growers throughout the country.

The special committee is headed by Representative Cannon (D-Fla.).

Among other members are: Elliott (D-Calif.); Hill (R-Colo.); White (Idaho); Dworshak (R-Idaho); Hill (D-Wash.); West (D-Tex.) and Granger (D-Utah).

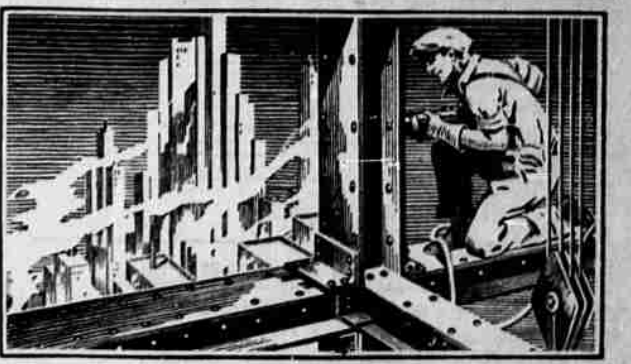

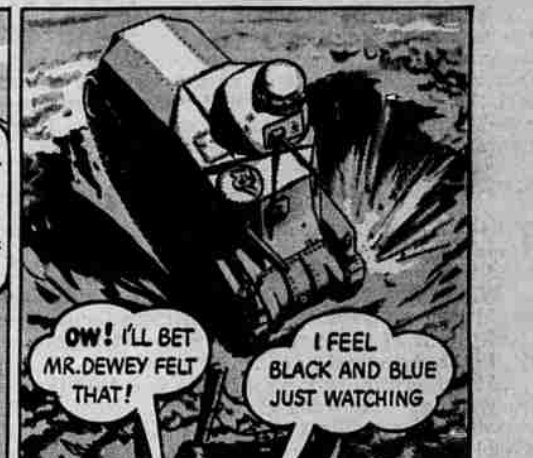

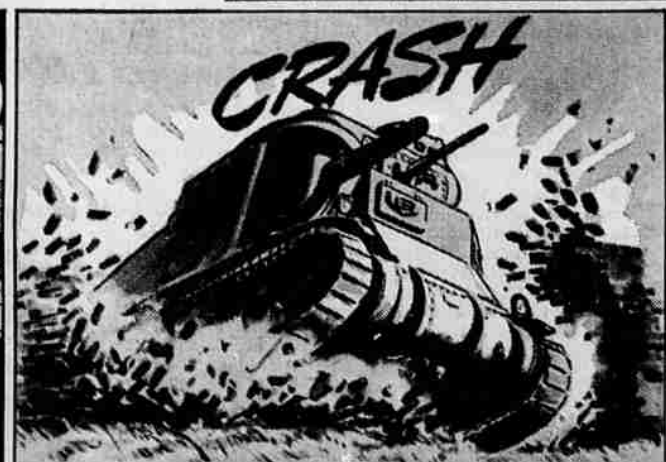
