

# Irish-N. U. Clash Heads National Grid Program

Unbeaten Mississippi State Meets Undefeated Duquesne in No. 2 Tilt

NEW YORK, Nov. 13 (AP)—Three significant collisions feature this week's football program: (1) unbeaten Notre Dame meets menacing Northwestern at Evanston, Ill.; (2) unbeaten Mississippi State invades perfect-record Duquesne at Pittsburgh, and (3) Oklahoma and Missouri, co-leaders of the Big Six, fight it out at Columbia, Mo.

The Notre-Dame-Northwestern brawl undoubtedly will command most attention since the Evanston Wildcats shape up as the most dangerous band the Irish have encountered this year and the last formidable barrier to Notre Dame's first unbeaten season since Knute Rockne's last team in 1930. Only Southern California, already defeated four times, remains on the Irish schedule.

This should be an electrifying contest because both teams are lightning fast and both favor the open game. It will match the deadly passing of Angelo Bertelli and the speed of Northwestern's ultra-brilliant backfield.

The Mississippi State-Duquesne and Oklahoma-Missouri encounters may have an important bearing upon bids to the Miami Orange bowl, at least, since all four schools have played there previously.

## Buddy Baer, Too, Is Sure He Can Plaster the Bomber

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Nov. 13 (AP)—Ham-fisted Buddy Baer, the biggest prize fighter in the market today, thinks he's hit on a sure-fire way to separate Joe Louis from his title when they meet again in New York, January 2.

(The date for the fight was announced by Baer's manager, Anel Hoffman, but has had no official confirmation from Promoter Mike Jacobs at New York.)

Baer says it won't be a cosmic punch, like the Lou Nova flopperoo or any other freak stuff either, merely a flock of old-fashioned jaw busters. The technique lies in applying them correctly.

"Louis beat me once but I learned a lesson and when we meet this time I think I'll win the championship," Baer said. The 6-foot 8-inch giant was deadly serious.

"I've re-fought that fight with Louis many times in my mind and decided the way to beat him, so far as my case is concerned, is to punch with him. Every time he throws one, I'm going to let fly with one of my own. Those six rounds in the ring with him convinced me that's the way to do it."

## 'Big Game' May Match Coast's Best Attack With Top Defense

SEATTLE, Nov. 13 (UP)—

Looking forward two weeks hence, it appears that the far west's "big game" will match the Pacific coast conference's leading offense (Stanford) and the most rugged defense (California). The American Football Statistical bureau disclosed the T formation is walking off with the offensive competition, with an average gain of 313.1 yards per game. And despite four losses against only three wins, the California stalwarts have allowed opponents only 176.3 yards per game.

Individual honors centered in the Los Angeles area, as Bob Robertson, Southern California quarterback, continued atop offensive statistics, and Bob Waterfield took over the passing leadership.

Robertson has gained 663 yards from rushing and passing in six games, 59 yards ahead of Waterfield who advanced from tenth to second place in two weeks. The sophomore Bruin back completed 11 of 29 tosses against Oregon State to take over first place in pass completions with 43.

Curt Mechem, University of Oregon triple-threat, leads punters with 41.02 yards per try, and Stanford end Fred Meyer is the best pass receiver with 11 completions for 204 yards.

SEATTLE, Nov. 13 (UP)—

Sophomore Bob Waterfield, spearhead of UCLA's hot-and-cold Q-T formation, is the hero of the moment in the Pacific coast conference football race.

Listed tenth among coast leaders two weeks ago, the Bruin quarterback ran wild against California and Oregon State to amass 336 yards from passing and rushing, and advance to second place in total offense ratings of the American Football Statistical bureau.

Waterfield completed 22 out of 49 passes in the two games, outdistancing Idaho's Howard Manson from passing leadership and giving Bob Robertson of Southern California competition for offensive leadership. Robertson has compiled 663 yards in six games, while Waterfield has 604 yards in seven games.

## Arizona, Duke Rise In Yardstick Race

Texas Drops to Fourth in Offensive Figures; Blue Devils Second

SEATTLE, Nov. 13 (AP)—The rise of Arizona and Duke in the fall of Texas and Texas A. and M., featured last week's yardstick battles for total offensive and defensive football statistical supremacy.

American football statistical bureau figures released today showed the undefeated Texas Longhorns, first a week ago, suffered more than a blow at their prestige in being tied, 7-7, by Baylor. The Texans dropped from first to fourth as a total offensive unit.

Meanwhile Arizona, winning its sixth straight game after losing its opener to Notre Dame, moved into first place with a 383.6 yard average per game from rushes and passes.

And Duke, 13th a week ago, rolled up 700 yards in punneling Davidson, 56-0, to go into second place with a 372.7 yard average.

The Duke Blue Devils, incidentally, suffered what might be called a collapse of their aerial game. In six previous tilts they had but two passes intercepted. Then last Saturday Davidson intercepted as many as had gone astray all season—another pair.

Duke has led the country in the low number of interceptions for the past five years. Now they're tied with Marquette, which otherwise ranks 14th as a passing team while Duke is 12th.

The Texas Aggies, after scrambling for a 21-10 win over SMU, dropped to third as a total defensive team at 113 yards yielded per game to rushes and passes, but they're still only a couple of yards out of first place.

Two teams with one game unreported—Texas Tech and Mississippi State, outstrip them by two and one strides, respectively.

## Deputies Named For California Pheasant Season

A number of special deputies have been appointed to enforce pheasant hunting regulations in Modoc and Siskiyou counties, it was revealed Thursday by Chester J. Main, head of the Tulelake, Calif., farm bureau's wildlife committee.

The season opens in the California counties, Saturday, November 15.

Hunters are asked to observe no-trespassing signs and avoid damage to private property in the two counties.

Game laws will be rigidly enforced, Main said.
