Flatbush Gets Ice Hockey, or Almost

Brooklyn Americans Play in Garden; Opening Billed as All-Gowanus

NEW YORK, Nov. 13 (U.P.)—It's going to happen on ice in Brooklyn. Red Dutton, president and manager of the long-orphaned New York Americans hockey team, announced today the organization will be known henceforth as the Brooklyn Americans and possibly later as the Brooklyn Dodgers.

The rub is there's no ice rink large enough in the fabulous land of flatbush and this season's games will have to be played at the Americans old stand, Madison Square garden.

But in every other respect, Dutton said, the Americans will be strictly a Brooklyn institution and in time, when priorities will be relaxed sufficiently to provide materials for building a large rink in Brooklyn, he hopes the Americans will be accepted just as enthusiastically as the beloved Bums of baseball and the Brooklyn football Dodgers.

The Americans will open their season tonight in the garden against the Chicago Blackhawks and except for the location, in mid-Manhattan, it's going to be an all-flatbush occasion.

Brooklyn Borough President John Cashmore will dedicate the Americans to the greater glory of flatbush. The Brooklyn football Dodgers band will furnish the music.

Nancy Merki Named Top Woman Swimmer

PORTLAND, Nov. 13 (U.P.)—Fifteen-year-old Nancy Merki awakened to find herself a celebrity today.

Too stunned yesterday to feel much when the national AAU committee named her the outstanding woman swimmer of 1941, the Multnomah club's distance-event star was beginning to get excited.

By telephone and telegraph congratulations poured in. This, she told schoolmates, was something.

A junior in high school, she was baking a cake at home when the news arrived. She said she couldn't believe it.

She was rushed downtown to have her picture taken. She was interviewed. But she couldn't think of much to say, except that it was wonderful, and her parents were proud, only they thought she ought to spend less time swimming and more in the kitchen. She thought that would be all right, too, because she likes to cook.

Eight years ago there was no such choice. Nancy was stricken with infantile paralysis, and faced the possibility of being crippled.

But the disease was less severe than feared, and Nancy took up swimming to repair the damage. Within a few years she was threatening city records. For the last several years she has been in the top flight of American swimmers.

This year she won national titles in the 400- and 1500-meter events, and was named to the Olympic squad. She has been nominated for the Sullivan award, given annually to the athlete voted most outstanding.

Condemned Man Awaits Death for 'Henhouse Murder'

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Nov. 13 (U.P.)—Calmly, after preparing an itemized list of his personal effects, John Bruce Anderson awaited in state prison here today his execution shortly after midnight tonight for the "henhouse murder" of a Spokane valley neighbor.

The 38-year-old condemned man must hang for the killing of David Johnson when the latter caught Anderson raiding his chicken house more than a year ago. Anderson was arrested later at Yakima, where he had assumed the name of the slain man. Johnson's body was found in an abandoned north Idaho barn after Anderson's arrest.

Prison authorities said Anderson seemed more concerned last night about a misplaced fountain pen and two straight edge razors than about his approaching doom.
