

BROTHERFINED AS AFTERMATH OF WILD RIDE

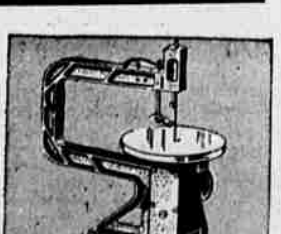
