MONTHLY NUTRITION MEETING HELD HERE

The regular monthly meeting of the Klamath Nutrition Council for Defense was held in the high school auditorium on November 6. Those present at the meeting were: Arnold Gralapp, superintendent Klamath Union high school; Clifford Jenkins, county 4-H club agent; Percy Wells, city school superintendent; Mrs. Dorothy Huffman, county health nurse; Mrs. Altha Urquhart, public welfare administrator; Earl A. Gardner, county FSA supervisor; Mrs. Winifred Gillen, home demonstration agent, and Mary Belle Beswick, county FSA home management supervisor.

Plans are being made by the nutrition council for intensified nutrition education of the people of this area. Announcements as to programs, dates, etc., will be made later.

Highlight of the meeting was the showing of a film entitled, "For Health and Happiness." This film was originally presented at the national nutrition council meeting in Washington, D. C., last May. It was prepared by the New York State college extension service. This film is to be available to any group or organization for presentation sometime around the first of February. Contact may be made with Mrs. Gillen, or Miss Beswick, in the department of agriculture offices on the second floor of the Federal building concerning reservations for use of the film.

Representing the local nutrition council at the state nutrition meeting in Portland on November 7 and 8, was Mary Belle Beswick, who is secretary of the Klamath council. Miss Beswick is expected to bring back information on what the national and state councils are doing and the plans for a coordinated program of the national, state and county councils in the drive for nutrition for defense.

The Klamath county council is a part of the nationwide program whose purpose is to improve the health and welfare of the people of our nation. Nutrition for defense is made up of a national nutrition council, individual state councils, and councils for each county. All three levels of the council are coordinating their program in an effort to provide for teaching of nutrition and physical fitness in the schools; adult education in nutrition; food buying and preparation; extension of infant and child health conferences; provision of school lunches for children; community gardens for

school lunches and low-income families; community canning centers; home food production and wider use of surplus foods.

It is the objective of the Klamath County Nutrition Council, and of the county councils all over the nation to make each family, each individual, aware of advanced scientific knowledge and to use it in building a healthier nation.
