

MOOSE LODGE TO DEDICATE NEW QUARTERS

On Saturday at 2 p. m., the Klamath Falls Moose lodge will dedicate its new home on Pine street near Eleventh with appropriate civic and fraternal ceremonies.

Many prominent Moose from over the state will be here for the event, and participating also will be Mayor John Houston and other public officials here.

W. E. (Bill) Heinke of Eugene, president of the Oregon State Moose association, will lead a delegation of about 25 Eugene Moose to Klamath Falls to take part.

Walter S. Wistrand, deputy supreme governor of Oregon, is expected from Portland and will officiate in the ceremonies.

The Klamath lodge, No. 1106, recently completed the new home, one of southern Oregon's most attractive fraternal buildings. The lodge purchased the brick structure formerly owned by the Hirvi bakery, completely remodeled it, and now has a structure boasting an attractive lodge room in the upper story, clubrooms and lobby on the main floor, and banquet room and kitchen facilities in the basement.

Migrant Pictures To Be Shown at Church Sunday

This Sunday evening at the First Presbyterian church, North Sixth and Pipe streets, a film portraying the life of the migrant workers in the west will be shown at the 7:30 worship service. The film has been produced by experts of the National Missions board of the Presbyterian church, USA, and is said to be exceptional in educational value from many standpoints. It is entitled "Windings of the West," and presents the life and work of the migrants as they go by families from community to community, assisting in the harvesting of the various crops in the west, including cotton, citrus fruits, peas, beans, hops, apples, pears, peaches and potatoes.

This film should be especially interesting to those living in the Klamath basin, as the harvesting of the potato crop is one of its big industries. The attitude of most communities where the migrants operate is that the farmers are "afraid they won't come and then afraid they won't go."

The government has been able to assist in the solution of this great problem by providing camp managers and other special workers who, at times, supply food, clothing, medical help, including physicians and nurses and trailer clinics and care for the sanitation of the various camps.

Watch Companies Indicted Under Anti-Trust Act

NEW YORK, Nov. 13 (AP)—The Hamilton Watch company, Elgin National Watch company, Waltham Watch company, 26 other corporations and 73 persons were indicted by a federal grand jury today on charges of violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

Three indictments were handed up to Federal Judge John W. Clancy.

The first named the Hamilton company, of Lancaster, Pa., its officers and 23 distributors and their officers, located in principal cities including New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Kansas City, Omaha and Dallas.

The indictment contains one count alleging a combination and conspiracy to restrain interstate trade and commerce in the distribution and sale of Hamilton watches, in preventing certain described persons, partnerships and corporations from buying, selling, distributing or dealing in those watches.

The indictment also charged that such dealers were discriminated against, arbitrarily eliminated as dealers, restricted or prevented from obtaining Hamilton watches by blacklisting and boycotting on the part of the Hamilton Watch company and certain distributors.

MARITIME SERVICE TO TRAIN SAILORS

The United States maritime service is meeting the need for skilled merchant seamen by training youths who have had no previous seagoing experience.

Young American citizens in good physical condition, 18 to 24 years of age, are being enrolled for a free seven months' course of instruction in the duties of the deck, engineers and steward departments. Enrollees are paid \$21 monthly while learning; clothing, food and quarters are furnished by the government.

The training course qualifies these young men for jobs on American merchant vessels where pay starts at \$72.50 per month with food and quarters furnished.

A limited number of applicants will be accepted for classes now starting at the new and modern US maritime service training station, Port Hueneme, California.

WOODSTOCK, Vt., Nov. 13 (AP)—Charging "wilful desertion," Newspaper Columnist Dorothy Thompson has filed suit for divorce from Sinclair Lewis, novelist and playwright.

Miss Thompson, whose legal residence is at Twin Farms in Earnard, nine miles north of here, filed the suit yesterday in Windsor county court. The petition was served on Lewis in New York and is returnable at the December court session.

The columnist asked custody of their child, Michael Lewis, a student in the Riverdale school on the Hudson. She said in her petition that Lewis, a former Nobel prize winner, deserted her in 1936. They were married in London in 1928.

Both had been married before. Her marriage to Joseph Bard terminated in divorce in Budapest in 1928 and Lewis' to Grace Hegger ended with a Reno divorce in 1926.
