COURT TO OFFER TWO RESOLUTIONS

LAKEVIEW — The Lake county court has intimated that it will offer two resolutions at the state convention of county judges and commissioners which will be held in Portland this week.

The court will seek the support of the convention for a bill recently introduced in congress by Representative Walter Pierce and Senator Charles L. McNary, which bill provides for the payment to the counties in cash of 25 per cent of the value of the national forest timber which is used to finance land exchanges.

The other resolution will ask the president to halt the present national forest timber exchange program which is sweeping hundreds of thousands of acres of private property from the tax rolls, until arrangements are made to protect the existing revenue of the local government.
